### TOURANEENA AND DISTRICT NOTES

Touraneena Parish .- The modern parish of Touraneena is practically the ancient Seskinane and Lickoran, but with some later additions, viz.: Caherbrack, Knockmeal, Carrigroe, taken in 1874 from Kilbracken. The church of Touraneena, cruciform in plan, was erected in 1826 during the pastorate of Rev. P. Quirke. The present parochial house of Touraneena was built for his private residence by Dr. McGrath, on whose death it came into the hands of the parish priest. Rev. Nicholas McCanny, residence at Old Affane, was in 1704 registered as parish priest of Affane, Modeligo and Seskinane. He had been thirty of registration and had received Holy Orders in France. Rev. C. Anglin was successor of Father McCanny, but whether the succession was immediate there is no evidsion was immediate there is no evidence to decide. Rev. James Greene died parish priest of Seskinane in the seventies of the 18th century.
