TOURANEENAS AND DISTRICT NOTES

Touraneena Parish.—The modern parish of Touraneena is practically the ancient Eskineen and Lisconnan, but with some later additions, viz.: Caherbrack, Knockmealton, Carrigrohane, taken in 1874 from Kilbrackney. The church, Touraneena, is a fine example of the style, was erected in 1826 during the pastorate of Rev. P. Quirk. The present parochial house of Touraneena was built for the private residence of Dr. McGrath, on whose death it came into the hands of Mr. Healy, residing at Old Affane, and he was in 1704 registered as parish priest of Affane, Modeligo and Eskineen. He had been received by Holy Orders in France. Rev. C. Anglin was successor of Father McGrath, but whether the latter had any children there is no evidence to decide. Rev. James Greene died parish priest of Eskineen in the seventeenth century. His tombstone stands in Knockboy graveyard, but neither the year of his death nor his age is now legible. He lived at the parish priest residence, and the next pastor of whom anything is known, he died 1781. Rev. Wm. Power, residing at Knockboy, was evidently the next pastor, he died in 1827 at the age of ninety, of which he spent as pastor of Eskineen. Rev. P. Quirk, who succeeded him, died in 1832. During his term of office the present church was erected. He was transferred to Clashmore in 1832. From that time until 1838, Rev. John Kelly, who was transferred to the parish of Touraneena, 1832-53. Rev. Ed. Kearney, 1832-53. Rev. Edmond Walsh was the parish priest from 1853 to 1870, and he died in the church at Touraneena. Rev. Wm. Power, 1870-86. Rev. Thomas McDonnell was appointed in 1886, but he died before he had taken office. Rev. Richard Dunphy translated from Agheside, was created a Canon of the cathedral of Dublin, and died in 1891. Rev. J. Kearney, 1891-97. Rev. J. Maher was P.P. 1920-27. Rev. Hannah Hackett, who was transferred to Mothel in 1933. Rev. Thomas Kelly, 1933-35. Rev. John Cullane was appointed P.P. 1935. He was transferred to Ballylooby, County Wick, in 1937.
