DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

At the adjourned estimates meeting of the above on Wednesday night of last week, Mr. McCarthy, chairman presided. Present were—Senator Butler, T. A. Kyne, T.D., Mr. Clancy, N. Kelly, J. Goode, the Manager and J. Condon, B.E.

The Chairman extended a welcome to their newly-appointed member, Mr. Jas. Goode. The other members associated themselves in the welcome. Mr. Goode, returning thanks added that he would always do whatever he could for Dungarvan and the people of Dungarvan.

Arising out of the Managers Order on the report of the Town Planning Consultant recommending that permission be refused to Mr. J. P. Flynn for conversion of his premises at Coolagh Road into a garage, on account of the unsuitability of the road there, Mr. Kyne said that Mr. Jas. Canty wanted to start a garage there and earn a living in his own town. He guaranteed that no cars would be allowed outside the garage door.

The Borough Surveyor said this was not a function of his but of the town planning engineer. If Mr. Kyne's assurance was given he saw no reason why the application should not be granted.

The Chairman corroborated Mr. Kyne's remarks.

Mr. Goode—If Mr. Canty makes a success of it would give employment to others as well and save them going to England.

It was decided that the matter be reconsidered by the Manager and Town Planning Consultant.

PARKING OF CARS

The Chairman drew attention to the congestion caused by cars parking in the narrow portion of O'Connell Street and said that it should be made that cars be parked on one side only.

County Manager—I thoroughly agree with the Chairman. There is plenty of room in the Square.

Mr. Veale suggested that some regulation should be made where cars should be backed into the kerb on the Square instead of the present zig-zag fashion.

Manager—I don't think we have any by-laws.

Mr. Clancy—we must adopt by-laws. Mr. Clancy then suggested that the Garda submit their suggestions to a committee, including the Chairman, Clerk, Manager, Borough Surveyor, and Messrs. Butler and Kyne, and be appointed to look into the matter with the Superintendent.

GROUNDING OF BOATS IN HARBOUR

The Harbour Master (Mr. Jas. Curran) reported that the grounding of boats in to harbour was not caused by under mud but the boats came in on very low tides.

Senator Butler said that the gravel in the harbour opposite the Look Out could be removed by a few men in a couple of days.

Manager—The Harbour Master has made no recommendation that this work be done.

Clerk—Some work was done recently under the quay wall.

Mr. Kyne—I have my own very definite view about the grounding in the harbour and it is not sitting.

Mr. Curran agreed that the pilot brought boats off the quay.

Mr. Goode—Whose responsibility is it when a ship is damaged?

Mr. Kyne—The person who hires the pilot.

Referring to the grounding of a boat recently, Mr. Clancy asked what was the cause—was it misjudgment?

Mr. Curran—He (the pilot) took a chance.

Senator Butler—Is it good business to take a chance?

Mr. Goode—In this case it was very bad business.

Mr. Clancy—I think we are being led astray in the whole matter. Mr. Kyne—As there are defects in the Harbour Master's report, account for a ship grounding at the moment? Harbour Master—No.

When other matters arose concerning condition and repairs to the quay wall, etc., the Borough Surveyor said he was acting as Borough Surveyor, not Harbour Engineer, but he was glad to be happy to do the harbour work in an advisory capacity.

Manager—I agree with you; we'd want a Harbour Engineer.

PROTECTION FROM FLOODING

A circular letter from the Department relative to a scheme for a grant for protection from flooding was read which asked that the engineer submit proposals.

Mr. Kyne thought the quay wall and Abbeyside wall would come under this scheme.

The engineer was directed to put up the necessary proposals.

WAGE INCREASE

Regarding the adjourned application by the A.T. & G.W.D. for a 10% increase for Council workers, Mr. Kyne said the general town rate had been increased by 5% that evening, from 23 10s. to 23 15s.

The Chairman said the Council was never out to cut wages. It was not much to give a 10% increase.

The Manager said it would not be fair to the ratepayers of the town to give more to the local employers than the employers felt their workers were entitled to. It was not a question of reason why they should think so.

Mr. Goode—The principal thing to-night is that up to now the Council workers were not getting a living wage. Now we are trying to give

The last race winner, London City, was well backed and just held on to score from the fast finishing Miss Zebob. them as near as we can to a living wage.

A resolution proposed by Mr. Kelly and seconded by Mr. Kyne that an increase of 10% be granted was recommended to the Co. Manager.

When seconding the motion Mr. Kyne remarked he would certainly second any resolution for an increase to the workers.

The re-option of a new member to fill the vacancy in the Council was adjourned to next meeting.

WALL AT CAUSEWAY.

Mr. Kyne again speaking on the necessity of this wall asked if there was any chance of a loan to cover the expense of this work to be levied on the Abbeyside area.

Manager—I doubt if you can make a local charge on that area.

Mr. Butler suggested the grant scheme for looting.

Mr. Clancy said he saw no point in Mr. Kyne's argument. People coming from other parts of the town got just as wet. It would be real desecration of the Causeway.

Mr. Kyne said he would be loathe to ask the ratepayers to pay another 2500 now or any time. In spite of what Mr. Clancy said, he believed it was a hardship.

The Manager and Mr. Veale suggested a hedge there.

The matter was referred to the Borough Surveyor on the suggestion of Senator Butler.

It was decided to communicate with the Dickens Leather Co. again in connection with the sewer near the premises with a view to coming to some arrangement.

Mr. Butler referred to the sweeping of the streets at closing time on Saturday nights and asked that people be requested not to do so.

It was decided to put a notice in the Press in this regard.

Sympathy was tendered to the relatives of Mrs. Ryan, Friary Street; Miss M. Hogan, Michel Street; Garda M. Deary, and Mr. D. Power, Abbeyside, on their recent bereavements.

Non-Municipal Housing Scheme

At a meeting of the County Council on Tuesday, the County Manager reported that in accordance with a request from the Department he has submitted, following consultation with the Council's officers and the housing architect, a draft programme which provides for the commencement of 100 houses in each of the years 1949-50 and 50-51, and for the acquisition of sites for 589 houses with proposals for site development under the Non-Municipal Towns and Villages Housing Scheme. This is quite apart from the Rural Cottage Scheme of 420 cottages. The Department now asks that the proposals be submitted to the Council. The housing programme under this scheme amounts to 589.

The County Manager went on to state that the approximate economic rent of each house would be 12/- per week plus rates, and the financial effect on the rates if lettings were made at less than such rent. For every 1/- per week by which the economic rent is reduced, the rates must bear 1d. in the £ on each 100 houses so let.

Assuming that the County Council agrees to provide 100 houses in the present year, and to proceed with the acquisition of all sites required for the full scheme of 589 houses, the initial year's expenditure as estimated by the architect (as reduced by the anticipated Transitional Development Fund Grant) would be approximately £20,000.

The Council therefore will be requested to authorize the raising of the necessary loan from the Local Loans Fund, the precise amount depending on the programme finally decided upon.

The following are the areas and number of houses proposed to be now built:—Aghis 5; Ardmore, 7; Ballyduff, 4; Ballyrunner, 6; Ballymacarbery, 4; Bawnrobin, 1; Cappoquin, 4; Clashmore, 4; Cheekpoint, 2; Dunmore East, 8; Kilmacshomus, 12; Kilmessen, 8; Passavee East, 8; Portlaw, 20; Rathgormack, 10; Stranabally, 6; Trarua, 2; Villiersstown, 10; Lismore, 20. Tallow and Ballinacorney not yet defined.

The Chairman asked if the tenants of 177 houses in the area were the Council going to let? How were they going to face the situation if few new working people could pay this rent? Were they going to provide houses for people who could build them themselves? He mentioned the areas of Lismore and Cappoquin and said very few of the working class in those areas would be able to pay more than 4/- a week for their houses. He said if responsible repairs were carried out in Botany, Lismore, the houses there could be made fit for human habitation.

Dr. O'Farrell, County M.O.H., said the standard of houses in the area was based on that of the labourer's cottage with 500 square feet floor space. These houses hadn't sufficient floor space, the roofs and walls were unsound, and the sanitary accommodation was not correct.

Mr. O'Farrell—Yes, provided the engineer is satisfied that the expenses are not too much.

Mr. Keskin said a meeting was held in Lismore about this. It was held in economy to scrap these houses.

Dr. O'Farrell said all houses in New Street and Church Lane were unsuitable for human habitation as they did not conform to the standard.

Mr. Kelly agreeing with the Chairman, added that a small cost these houses could be done up.

Referring to nine condemned houses in Ballymacarbery area, Mr. O'Ryan said he would like to see the people who did not want them. It was absolutely ridiculous. "You will have a revolution if this takes place. He added that he would like to see the scheme until the scheme at present on hand is finished.

Continuing, he said that by building houses now in villages they would be forced to erect sewerage schemes for these places.

Chairman—What proceedings could the Council adopt to acquire houses like Cappoquin and Lismore? To what extent would you get a grant from the Local Government?

Mr. Keane, B.E.—The Minister gave a grant to the landlord.

Dr. O'Farrell asked why should the landlord not be asked to repair the houses and make them habitable and not the local authority?

The Chairman suggested that Deputy Kyne and Senator Butler interview the Minister regarding the standard demanded by the Local Government Department.

County Manager—There will be at least 200 houses that could be made fit.

Mr. Hartly suggested the re-survey of the houses in the county and added that the local authority should make the landlords repair the houses or let the Council acquire them.

Senator Butler—Any house capable of reconstruction at reasonable cost should not be demolished. The Minister agrees with that.

Mr. Roche, referring to the terrible housing scarcity in Portlaw, said there were people there, trying to bring up their families in one room. He did not think it advisable to postpone this matter again. For two years there was nothing done only surveying. People there will pay anything to get a roof over their heads. He was all for going ahead with the scheme. He said there were over 40 families living with

other people.

Mr. Kyne—I think 26 houses very low for Portlaw. There is need for much more houses.

Manager—There are 33 in the course of reconstruction.

Chairman—In Portlaw people can pay the economic rent.

It was decided to go on with the Portlaw scheme.

Mr. Dower, referring to Villiersstown, Aghis and Clashmore said he didn't think the people there would be able to pay 12/6 per week.

On Mr. Kyne's suggestion, it was decided to have the engineers and officials meet the members of the houses in different areas to survey the houses there.

Mr. Kyne said it was their responsibility to give houses at a cheap rent and put it on the rates.

The County M.O.H. said he could not recommend the lowering of the standard of the houses.

Mr. Roche—What type of house are we to have at the price (£1,250)?

County M.O.H.—Three rooms and a kitchen.

Mr. O'Ryan—If you build houses can you compel people to go into these houses?

County M.O.H.—A demolition order can be served on the owner or occupier of condemned houses.

Mr. Leahy—If a man now paying 2/- a week has to pay 15/- in new houses and finds he can't pay it and is evicted where is he to go?

Mr. Norris—To the poorhouse—the rates again must pay.

Mr. Kyne said it was madness to allow people to live in hovels. When they get T.B., he said, they come to us.

He agreed with the County M.O.H.'s recommendation that the standard should not be lowered.

OTHER MATTERS.

To Mr. Roche Mr. Doyle, B.E. said there was not any question of bye-passing four cottages to be built near Portlaw. It was all part of a large 21-year scheme and they had not reached them yet.

To Mr. Dower, the County Manager said the original applicant would get a new cottage, but if not available it would be advertised in the ordinary way.

Mr. Doyle reported excellent progress in the cottage scheme, of which 30 were already completed, for which he was complimented.

Mr. Kyne asked to have the direct labour scheme extended as much as possible in the different areas.
