Dungarvan District Court.

Dungarvan District Court was held on Tuesday, before District Justice O'Riain.

Mr. Williams, solr., on behalf of Mr. P. J. Kinnison, was granted an ad interim transfer of licence lately held by Mr. J. J. Carroll in respect of premises at the Square, Dungarvan.

Mr. M. Landers was granted a transfer of the licence held by the late Miss Margaret Landers.

Mr. Morrissey, solr., was granted an occasional licence for a dance in the Town Hall on Wednesday, 27th April.

Mr. Williams, solr., was granted an area exemption in respect of Bridge Street from 3 to 7 on Sunday next in connection with the Fianna Fall Convention.

DECREE FOR TRESPASS.

Mrs. Angela Kieley Old Cappagh House had a civil bill for £5 against John McGrath, do., for trespass.

Stating the case, Mr. Farrell, solr., said six rooms at the west end of this house had been let to John McGrath. Plaintiff got an injunction at the recent Circuit Court restraining defendant from trespassing on her property except on a certain portion at the back of the house. These proceedings were in respect of property at the front of the house. Defendant brought a lorry of logs and dumped them in front of the house on February 22nd last. Next morning he cut the logs there. The lorry also done an amount of damage there. Plaintiff now wants to restrain defendant from doing anything unsightly there in future.

Mr. Williams, solr., for defendant stated the logs were cut on a Sunday and were not brought to the house until Monday. It was a trifling action as there was no damage done.

Mrs. Angela Kieley said there were 24 rooms in the house. Six at the west end were let to defendant with an area of 19 ft. x 24ft. at the back of the house. On February 22nd between 8 and 9 o'clock defendant unloaded a lorry of timber between her hall-door and his place. The lorry rooted up the grass there. There were about five logs in the lorry. When she approached him he told her 'to go in and sleep it off.'

Next day there were four men cutting the logs leaving the ground very sawdust and lumpy-looking and the railing was damaged. She wanted privacy there for her visitors and her friends, she continued. She had to get up and bring small logs in a wheelbarrow to her house.

Mr. Williams—the only trespass was he left the logs 14 or 15 hours on your front? Yes.

I put it to you it was too dark to remove the timber into the house? It wasn't dark.

Mr. Williams—I suggest you are bringing him before this court just to annoy him—to make McGrath's life a misery. I put it to you that you and your husband before you are investigated mad.

Mrs. Kieley—I want peace and quietness in my place.

To the Justice, defendant said he took two hours to repair the railing. Mr. Kevin Kieley, son of plaintiff, gave corroborative evidence.

John McGrath, defendant, said he had a wife and seven children. He made carts, prepared wheels etc. On the evening the timber arrived three of them worked for about an hour bringing it in before it got dark. He shifted it in first thing next morning. It was necessary for him to bring it through his kitchen. He cleared the place up as good as he could. The lorry did not do any damage. He tried to cause as little damage as possible there. Plaintiff put the railing there to obstruct his passage to the door.

Cross-examined by Mr. Farrell—He couldn't cut the timber where he got it. He didn't do any damage to the railing. The railing was causing the whole trouble.

Justice—Do you think it is reasonable to cut logs on Mrs. Kieley's lawn? To the Justice, defendant said he was prepared to cut logs into four foot lengths.

The Justice said he was satisfied some damage was caused to Mrs. Kieley's front, but he would not suggest it was very extensive. In doing what he did defendant acted beyond his right. He should not have cut logs on the lawn. A decree for £5, with costs was given.

BREACHES OF LICENSING LAWS.
An O'Connell Street publican was charged with breach of the Licensing Act on St. Patrick's Day.

Mr. Morrissey, solr., for defendant, pleading guilty, stated this was a very well-conducted house.

A fine of £1 with 2/6 on each of the men found on the premises was imposed.

On a similar charge at 10.40 on March 25th against the proprietor of the Central Bar, Mr. Morrissey, solr., also admitted the offence. He said defendant had given explicit instructions to the barmaid not to serve any drink after hours, but those on the premises prevailed on her to do so.

Supt. O'Mahony said at 10.40 on the 25th March, as a result of a complaint by a woman on the street, Guard Farrell entered the premises and found a number of men there.

A fine of £2 was imposed with 2/6 each on those found on the premises.

There was a similar charge against the proprietors of Lawlor's Hotel at 10.25 p.m.

Mr. Farrell, defending, said 25 minutes was not a big lapse. The manager was in charge of the premises and the girl in charge was busy in the kitchen. The boots were in

GOOD RACING AT YOUGHAL

DANGEROUS DRIVING CHARGE
DISMISSED

Supt. O'Mahony charged John S. Finlay, Cabra, Dublin, with dangerous driving at Abbotside on 18th February.

Mr. F. Lanigan, Solr., appeared for defendant, and Mr. Farrell, solr., held at watching brief for an interested party.

The case was a sequel to an accident at Sexton Street, Abbotside, on February 18th in which Lee O'Leary was knocked down by a lorry driven by Finlay.

Supt. O'Mahony said Lee O'Leary, aged 10, was sent by his mother to Mrs. O'Connor's for measles on that date. It was a wet day. O'Leary had a coat over his head and when he left the shop he went diagonally across the street and collided with a lorry coming from Waterford at the left of the street which knocked him down. It was raining very heavily at the time.

O'Leary said he remembered it was a very wet and windy day. He didn't go straight across the street. After the accident Mr. O'Connor took him to the hospital. He was the lorry nearest to the footpath struck him. He was running when it struck him. Mrs. O'Connor grocer, Sexton St., said she served O'Leary at about 1.20 p.m. and he went out immediately. She told her husband to go out and she went out after him. She saw the lorry under the front wheel nearest to her side. The lorry was at its right side of the road.

Mr. P. O'Connor said when he went out he saw O'Leary under the right-hand wheel.

Guard Straine said he investigated the accident on four days statement (read) from the driver of the lorry. At the scene of the accident the road was 30ft. 3ins. wide. If the child ran diagonally to this spot he would have travelled 45ft. It was raining very heavy at the time. It was a 1946 24 h.p. Morris commercial lorry to carry three or four tons of peats. The Justice said on the facts he would dismiss the charge of dangerous driving and make it a charge of careless driving.

John Finlay, defendant, said he first saw O'Leary leaving the footpath when he reckoned he would be about 12 yards away. On account of weather conditions he did not blow the horn as it meant he should take his hand off the wheel. As a driver he did not think it would be proper to swear to the right. He swerved to the left so that the lorry would save any skid. He was 17 years driving.

To Superintendent—It was a 2-ton lorry. He left Dublin at 8.30 that morning and reached Abbotside about 1.30. He did everything in his power to avoid the boy.

The Justice said he was satisfied there was no question of dangerous driving, but he was satisfied on this occasion that an error of judgment by the driver amounted to careless driving. A driver of his experience should have shown more foresight. Mr. Finlay had been very candid in his evidence. He was satisfied he acted on what he believed in the best interests. He applied the P.O.A. the dangerous driving charge being dismissed.

BOUND TO PEACE.

Jas. Costigan and his wife, Cathal Brugha Place were found to the peace for six months on his own recognisance of £5 or in default one month's imprisonment with £1 8s. expenses.

This case arose from a complaint of abusive language by Patk. Coffey and his wife, residing also at Cathal Brugha Place.

Complainant stated he was in bed when he heard Costigan and his wife on the street abusing him and his wife. Costigan was drunk and was looking for a fight. He got up and reported the matter to the Guards.

James Costigan and his wife denied abusing complainant.

SCHEME FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF FOXES, 1949/50.

THE above Committee have adopted a Scheme for the Destruction of Foxes in County Waterford.

CONDITIONS OF SCHEME

1. The following awards to be given:—as for each Cub, Dog or Vixen.

2. Every applicant for an award must in the financial year 1949/50, take the head and brush of each fox, in respect of which he claims an award, to the nearest Garda Station, and there complete a form of application, which when certified by the Garda Sergeant must be forwarded by the applicant to the Committee's Office. The tongue of the fox must be removed in the presence of the Garda Sergeant.

3. Payment of awards will be made only in the following areas:—Ballinacorney, Ballyduff, Ballymacarby, Cappoquin, Dungarvan, Kilmacshane, Leamybrien, Lismore, Portlaoine, Rathgormack.

4. The completion of the certificate on the application form does not necessarily entitle the applicant to the payment of an award.

5. The Committee reserves the right to terminate the Scheme without notice at any time within the period above-mentioned.

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

At a meeting of the above on Friday night of last week Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., presided. Present were: Senator Butler, Messrs. Clancy, Kelly, O'Hara, Harty and Walsh.

LETTING OF HOUSE. During the course of a debate on the recent letting of a Council house the Chairman said it was purely a Managerial function. Although they could make a recommendation to the Manager, he need not accept it.

There were 23 applicants for the house in question, some after discussion the members approved of the Manager's action. The Borough Surveyor reported that the estimated cost of a hedge at the Causeway would be £100. In view of the fact that the horticultural representative had already advised that there was practically no hope of growing a hedge there, he would not recommend that this work be carried out.

Mr. Clancy said he believed a hedge could be put up for a very small sum. The Chairman suggested a trial piece. Senator Butler—You haven't provided an answer for a hedge. It was decided to ask the horticultural representative to meet the members to discuss the matter.

HULLING IN PARK. Mr. Clancy drew attention to the fact that a portion of the Park was being used as a playing pitch by local youths. Instead of grass this was now red clay there and this should not be tolerated.

Mr. O'Keefe, Inspector, said this would be the case for the course in the Urban Council see the Guards' Chairman—One resident, Miss Walsh, asked me to bring up the matter. On two occasions her window was broken. He thought they should see the Superintendent about it.

Mr. Goode said the caretaker should be there all the year round. There was work there for him. Mr. Kelly suggested that the Clerk make a recommendation that be taken on next week.

Mr. Goode proposed that a man be kept there all the year round. Mr. Clancy said he was going into the Park for 50 years and he never saw it in the condition it was now. Some of our men could cartake it, he added, they meant to do so.

The Chairman agreed with Mr. Clancy that there is some official to deal with this work. The Chairman said that men should be sent to the Park to cut the grass, etc. If those youths were warned off he thought they would keep clear.

Mr. Clancy suggested that the attention of the Manager be drawn to it. This was agreed.

ERECTION OF HOUSE TO LET. An application from the D.L.C. for a grant for the erection of a house to let was before the meeting. The Clerk said the maximum grant was £400, spread over a period of 10 years for five-roomed houses, two-thirds of which would be refunded by the Minister.

The Chairman said it was a good thing to encourage people to build houses for their employees. Mr. Butler was in favour of making the grant. It would induce others to build houses. When poor local valuation was put on it it gave further revenue and it also gave employment.

Clerk—We can't make a grant if the Minister has already given a grant under Section 16. The matter was deferred for inquiries.

QUAY STREET. The Borough Surveyor gave an estimate of £750 for the proposed new sewer at Quay Street.

Chairman—Whatever the cost we have responsibility to give proper sewerage to the factory and the people there. Mr. Clancy—Do you know where that sewer starts? Chairman—I understand it is the length of the road.

Mr. Kelly said he understood the factory purchased pipes to run a sewer out there. They might give the pipes and £100 now seeing the estimate is increased.

Mr. Goode—It doesn't look that way to me. Mr. Kelly—There's no harm in trying it. Senator Butler—Not a bit. I think they should co-operate.

Chairman—If we incur big expense it will go on their rates, too. I think they should help us. It was decided to get in touch with the D.L.C.

TOWN HALL IMPROVEMENTS. Reporting on the proposed Town Hall improvements, the architect stated they had discussed the matter of electrical installations with the L.C. engineers, and was their opinion that the new scheme will have to meet the requirements of the new fire prevention regulations coming into force shortly and to which all Government controlled institutions must conform. They felt it more desirable to have this more urgent requirements carried out at an early stage, i.e. the new roof, which though not completely fire-proof would at any rate in an emergency burn sufficiently slowly to enable the hall to be evacuated instead of the present roof of light wood-work. Equally urgent is the provision of suitable exits. The estimated cost of the emergency lighting system is £230.

The Chairman said the Minister's note was in case of tragedy he would be held responsible for the Chairman, it was decided to forward a copy of the architect's letter to the Minister.

HOUSING PROGRAMME. A circular from the Minister referred to the draft housing programme submitted on January 25th. The programme should now be submitted to the Council for consideration. It added that the 1950/51 programme might provide for the acquiring of sites for a further 33 houses required after the 1949/50 programme is undertaken to enable all needs to be met by a continuous programme.

The Clerk said there were 74 houses in the Abbotside scheme and 66 in the Galloway scheme. The Chairman said they hoped to reconstruct a number of houses after building the Galloway Hill houses which should give adequate housing to the people.

It was decided that the Council did not propose to go any further at the moment. SEWER AT SEKTON STREET. The Chairman suggested that a sewer be put down at the back of the houses on the right side of Sekton Street at Abbotside.

The Borough Surveyor was asked to report on the matter. The Borough Surveyor reported that no responsibility rested on the Council to repair the bulwark east of the old church. If the Council accepted the responsibility for that, he added, they should also accept responsibility for all the other drains along the SYMPATHY.

Sympathy was voted to Mr. Hugh Foley, Abbotside, on the death of his sister, to Michael Fitzgerald, Tallacore, on the death of his wife, and to the relatives of John Kennelly, Abbotside.

Vocational Education Committee.

Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., presided at a meeting of the above on Monday. Present were—Senator Butler, An Fear Mor, Messrs. Cogan, Kelly, O'Hara, Harty and Walsh.

Correspondence was read relative to an order by the Minister extending the Vocational Education Act to include music, both vocal and instrumental. Leave of absence was granted to Mr. Maher to visit the Spring Show with the Dungarvan and Ballinacorney Young Farmers' Clubs.

The Department approved of the purchase of film strip projector and a clock for the kitchen. The Department of Posts and Telegraphs wrote asking for the submission of a list of pupils who would be eligible for training in postal engineering.

Irish Scholarship Scheme, 1949. It was decided to grant 20 scholarships of £11 each for one month at an approved Irish College the same as last year.

Mr. M. Kenneally, Ring, was appointed to set and mark question papers and conduct the oral Irish test.

The City of Cork Vocational Education Committee wrote stating that a whole-time course in Household Management would be held at the School of Domestic Science, Morrison's Island, Cork, beginning this year.

Blacksmiths' Training Course.—At the monthly meeting of County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held on Monday, 25th inst., a scheme of supplementary training for young blacksmiths in rural areas was adopted. The scheme provides for the award of 12 bursaries to six weeks' course of intensive training in farriery, smithwork and oxy-acetylene welding, especially as applied to the repair of farm machinery.

The course, which will commence in June, should be of immense benefit to young men of the county in the important blacksmith trade. Expert tuition by a master farrier should ensure that the students who complete the course will be well equipped to make a fit slice for any condition of hoof or road. Welding and workshop practice will help the students to keep abreast of the increasing mechanisation of farms by familiarising them with the repairs and maintenance of farm machinery. There is no doubt a good deal of waste makes place through the discarding of broken machine parts by farmers. A blacksmith equipped with an oxy-acetylene welding plant and able to use it would be a great asset to any rural area.
