Dungarvan District Court.

Before District Justice O'Donovan. Mr. Kenny, solr. (on behalf of Mr. Williams, solr.) was granted an occasional license for Ocean View Hotel on Sunday, May 10th. He was granted a similar application in connection with a symkhana at Colligan on 26th inst., and for a dance in the Town Hall the same night.

He was also granted a special exemption order on behalf of Egan's Hotel on 11th May from 9.30 to 3 a.m.

Mr. Kenny's application for the renewal of the licence for the Dungarvan Club was granted, there being no objection.

There was a long list of no light, no reflectors, dirty number plates, etc., cases in which the usual fines were imposed.

Case Dismissed.—Mrs. Hannah Dromey, 25 Loughmore, sought an order to bind Mrs. Kate Donnelly, 25 Loughmore, to Mr. Kenny, solr., for complainant and Mr. Morrissey, solr., for defendant.

Complainant said on the 22nd March defendant abused her, calling her an informer of Mr. Ryan and saying that she was full of T.B. She had previous trouble with the woman about five years ago and she was in fear of her and wanted to have her bound to the peace.

To Mr. Morrissey.—Mrs. Donnelly is always at the neighbours. She (complainant) is not out with any of the neighbours in Loughmore.

Mr. Morrissey sent it a fact that Mrs. Donnelly only passed one remark to you? No.

Mr. Morrissey read a letter which he had sent for his client which complainant received on 21st March and stated that complainant then ran along to get her first.

The Justice, dismissing the case, said there was no efficient evidence to warrant an order.

LARCENY CHARGE.
Supt. O'Mahony charged Michl. Nagle, Catha Brugha Place and Patrick, Connors, do., with, on the 30th Jan., the larceny of 10 pigeons, the property of Patrick O'Connor (Jnr.), 155th and O'Connor side value £2.50, and the larceny of eight pigeons, value £3 15s., the property of Kevin Dwan, Kilminton. Defendants pleaded guilty in both charges.

Supt. O'Mahony said all the birds had been recovered except five.

P. O'Connor said five of his were missing, value £3.

Mr. Morrissey, pleading for leniency for defendants, said Dungarvan was a very pigeon-mongering town. These lads adopted the offence and promised not to do it again.

Supt. O'Mahony said in these cases the defendants went deliberately to the premises at night and took the pigeons out of the dove crates.

A fine of 10s. each was imposed with 30/- compensation on each of the defendants, with two months in gaol.

CHILDREN'S COURT.
Supt. O'Mahony charged James Monahan and his sister, Nora Monahan, Shandon, with three charges of larceny: (1) On 30th November stealing a handbag and money from Mrs. Nora Hourigan, Mountain Castle, to the value of £1 17s. 8d. (2) From December 1st to March 14th stealing cigarettes and cash from Miss Dooney, Shandon, to the value of 15/-. (3) From Mrs. Sheridan, Shandon, a handbag and articles, value £2 15s. 6d.

Mr. Morrissey, for defendant, said his parent knew nothing about this matter. There was no previous conviction against defendant. His mother promised to make good the loss.

The Superintendent said if it wasn't an actual case where he would be sent away it was very near it. It was obvious he hasn't been kept under proper supervision for some time.

The Justice adjourned the case until the first court in August to give defendant's mother a chance to pay.

Service of Summonses.—On the application of Mr. Morrissey, solr., the Justice made an order that, due to the fact that there was no summons server in the area the service of summonses and civil bills be carried out by registered post.

I COURSED AND TRACKED

Greyhound Racing at Youghal.
FRIDAY, MAY 14th.
The feature event on above night proved very disappointing from the punter's point of view, as the fancied ones ran very badly, and it was a very easy victory for Mr. J. Desmond's Brindle Mona, who led almost from the "off," and was never troubled.

The second race was won by Pluckane's "Teddy." This fellow simply made hacks of the opposition, and improved a lot on his trial form. Wallamine was a hot order in the race, but was never going like a winner.

The sprint was again won by Drishane Beg in about the same time as his previous win. This dog is very consistent and should win more races.

The Cork dog, De Balo, a well-backed runner in this race, had no chance, as he was left at least four lengths in the trap, and then seemed to run unsighted. The time returned in the seventh race was very bad, owing to interference, and the form shown by some of the runners can be ignored, as a few of them never got a chance of doing their best.

Protest Against Ireland Act Bill.

At Waterford County Council.
At the quarterly meeting of the County Council on Monday, Mr. D. Heskin, chairman, presiding, Mr. O'Ryan moved the following resolution, which was passed unanimously: "That we, ourselves, in union with the Irish race the world over, to accept the challenge of the British Government to declare the perpetration of our country and to declare that we will use every means in our power to undo the demon of partition of our country. We call on our race the world over to come to our assistance and to unmask the British Government, who are condemning Russia and have condemned Germany for doing the self-same thing for which they are responsible in Ireland."

Speaking on the resolution, Mr. O'Ryan said he would unite the Irish people the world over. This act has proved what the British are—a nation of hypocrites. They were trying to keep our people under the heel of the rottenest tyranny in the world. In 1919 Mr. O'Ryan said British Labour refused to load ammunition to fight the Reds but they didn't refuse to load it to send to Ireland.

Mr. Roche—They didn't send enough.

Senator Butler, seconding the resolution said it was only right that they should protest against this interference by the British Government. He agreed that it would have the effect of uniting Irishmen and women all over the world. He said the Government and opposition were trying to prepare ways and means to meet this British measure to dictate to this country. He was glad to see the Waterford Co. Council standing firm behind the action of the Government.

Mr. Norris said that only by unity could they achieve their end.

WEST WATERFORD NEWS

Late Mr. Thomas Torpey, Clashmore.—The death occurred recently of Mr. Thomas Torpey, Knockenaris, Clashmore. The remains were removed to Clashmore Parish Church, where Requiem Masses were offered up for the eternal repose of his soul. Subsequently the remains were placed in the adjoining cemetery. The Very Rev. Fr. W. Flynn, P.P., Rev. Fr. D. Slattery, C.C., and Rev. Fr. J. Foley officiated at the interment.

Irish Classes.—The Irish classes held in Clashmore and Mounstuart for the past few months were attended by big numbers of language enthusiasts, and good progress was made. The programme of instruction included Irish step-dancing, drama, etc. The success of the classes was chiefly due to the untiring efforts of Mr. Seosamh O'Fathgha, O.G.

G.A.A.—All trials lead to Dungarvan on Sunday next for the Waterford v. Cork senior hurling match, and a record attendance is expected.

Concert at Clashmore.—A very successful concert and dramatic and variety entertainment was presented in Clashmore National School by the members of the Gleiding Dramatic Society. The programme included two one-act comedies, vocal and instrumental items, and exhibitions of Irish step-dancing, as well as Question Time. For Question Time the comper was Mr. J. Neville, and Mr. J. Ruse was judge. The winners were Mr. J. Russell, Clashmore, 2nd; Mr. John Forrest, Kinsalebeg; Mr. J. Ruse was a capable M.C., and at the conclusion of the entertainment returned thanks to all who had contributed to the success of the event.

Flanna Fail Organisation.—Mr. P. J. LITTLE, T.D., and Mr. S. Cronin, T.D., will visit this area during the first week in June and address a number of meetings at different centres. Full details will appear later.

Avonmore Selection Committee.—A meeting of the Avonmore (Divisional) Selection Committee was held at Lismore. Present were Messrs. Curran (Chairman, Western Board), D. O'Sullivan (Secretary, do.), M. Power (Treas., do.), J. F. O'Donnell, Lismore; J. Hickey, Ballyduff; J. Power, Glen Rovers; J. Fraher, Cappoquin, and M. V. O'Donoghue, B.E. It was decided that Mr. Eves (St. Augustines) be co-opted on the Senior Football Selection Committee.

Avonmore Senior Hurling Team.—The divisional senior hurling team played their first game in the 1949 championship on Sunday last, when they lost to Dungarvan following a good game played in a clean, sporting manner. Avonmore were not at full strength, yet at half time the scores were even, and following the resumption the divisional team actually took the lead. In the concluding stages the training and experience of the Dungarvan team were telling factors and the Western fifteen had to submit to defeat. The manner in which the game was played augurs well for the future of the Association in Co. Waterford, and both teams are to be complimented.

Avonmore Senior Football Team.—The divisional senior football team will be selected in the course of the next few weeks. Avonmore meet St. Otterans in the first round of the championship.

Waterford.—No championship games will be played in the West on Sunday next, owing to the Cork v. Waterford senior hurling match at Dungarvan, for the purpose of assisting the finances of the County Board. Every Gaelic enthusiast in the county should attend this game.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Tribute to late Minister for Local Government
Only the very essential business was transacted by the Waterford County Council at the quarterly meeting on Monday last before it formally adjourned as a mark of respect to the late Mr. T. J. Murphy, T.D., Minister for Local Government.

Proposing the resolution of sympathy, Senator Butler said he would advise the Council to adjourn this meeting as a mark of respect to the late Mr. Murphy, Minister for L.G. By his death this Council had suffered a great loss. Mr. Murphy and himself were intimate friends and a more sincere friend would be very hard to find. He was a great and sincere advocate of the Labour cause. He had left his mark, especially in the housing section of that Department. He had thrown all his energy and strength into it. Had he lived long enough he would have solved the whole problem. He hoped that this vote of sympathy would in some way lessen the grief of his wife and family.

Seconding the resolution, the Chairman said apart from his capabilities as Minister, he was one of the most decent men he had ever met. As Minister for Local Government his approach to problems must be admired by all. His mind and his office were always open to hear everybody's views. His death is a national loss and he regretted this occasion had presented itself to second the resolution.

Annual Meeting.—27th June was fixed to hold the annual meeting.

Regional Orthopaedic Hospital.—It was approved by the Council that Kilkenny House, Kilkenny, be the Regional Orthopaedic Hospital for the county.

A Department of Health letter stated it was intended to bring several areas, including Waterford City and County, into this region instead of Dublin as heretofore.

Public Lavatories at Cappoquin.—The County Surveyor reported as to local objections to the proposed site of the above at the Square.

Mr. Leahy—it's a real open space, on which the County Surveyor said he would report.

The County Surveyor said he thought there was no real objection to it.

Mr. Walsh, Mr. O'Ryan and Mr. Mansfield brought up the points about which the supplement had been asked on which the County Surveyor said he would report.

A question by Mr. Quirk as to why the rents were doubled in Ballyduff was adjourned until the Council were dealing with the question of cottage rents.

Overdraft Accommodation.
An application was made to the Department for approval to apply for overdraft accommodation of £5,000 in connection with the Forth Housing Scheme pending receipt of the loan.

The Chairman asked that the matter of asking their treasurers to give the rate for housing at a lesser rate be put on the agenda for next meeting.

Special Grant Scheme.—The Chairman referred to the special grant for flooding and said that the interests of the people should be safeguarded in the event of damage being done to their property during the carrying out of the above work.

The County Manager said it was very important to know who is responsible if any damage is done. Mr. McGroarty—The other alternative is to leave the work undone.

Mr. Barron—They can't do as much damage as the flooding.

Chairman—It is a very dangerous loophole unless it is remedied.

Wall at Ballinacourty.—Mr. Kelly asked if anything had been done about the wall at Ballinacourty.

The County Surveyor said he had discussed the matter with Mr. Dunne, B.E., but nothing had been done yet. Mr. Kelly—If something isn't done before the winter this house will be swept away.

Old Age Pensions.—A meeting of the Youghal No. 2 (Rural) Old Age Pensions Sub-committee was held at Clashmore. Mr. E. J. Russell (Chairman) presided and the other members present were Messrs. T. Curran, M. Foley, T. Bage, and M. J. Power (Clerk). Two claims were before the meeting. One application was passed and the other was refused.

On The Land.—Agricultural work is well advanced, and so far all crops are making good headway. Rain is urgently required, however.

Salmon Fishing.—For the past few weeks the salmon fishing on the Blackwater has been rather slack. The season as a whole has, however, been fairly good so far.

Aglis Mission.—The Mission at Aglish, conducted by Rev. Father Murphy, C.S.S.R., and Rev. Father Curran, C.S.S.R., continues to be attended by large congregations, who listen with rapt attention to the impressive sermons of the Reverend preachers. Big numbers receive Holy Communion each morning.

Bishop's Visit.—Early next month his Lordship the Bishop will pay his biennial episcopal visitation to Clashmore parish and administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to the children of Clashmore, Piltown, Tinnock and Ballycurrane N.S. Schools.

P.E.A. Training.—At present a number of N.C.O.s and potential N.C.O.s, drawn from Clashmore Piltown, E.C.A., are attending a special course of training in Dungarvan. The course is being conducted by Army N.C.O.s under the direction of Commandant E. J. Willis, area officer.


