Tributes To Late Minister.

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. ADJOURNS AS MARK OF RESPECT.

Proposing a vote of sympathy to the relatives of the late Mr. T. J. Murphy, Minister for Local Government at last Friday night's meeting Senator Butler said that Council had suffered a great loss in the death of Mr. Murphy. When he came here he showed a great interest in this town. He knew Mr. Murphy for 30 years and felt his passing a personal loss. He had represented the Labour Party in the Dail for 23 years and there was no slier advocate of the Labour cause. He always helped everybody. Since he became Minister he worked so hard that it was the principal cause of his early death. If he was spared he would have solved the housing problem in a very short time. He was a great loss to the Government. He knew Local Government law inside out. He is a great loss to the Labour Party too. The greatest loss is to his widow and six children—a grander father never lived.

Mr. Clancy, seconding, said he wished to endorse Senator Butler's remarks. He knew Mr. Murphy for over 20 years and was very impressed by him. He was a very sincere public man and a great advocate of the cause of Labour. He was a most popular man and not alone had he the support of Labour but of all the people. His loss to his family was the greatest. He was untiring in his efforts as Minister for Local Government. They all knew what he had done in connection with the building of houses. His loss was a national loss and they would be failing in their duty if they didn't adjourn the meeting.

Mr. Goode said he was very impressed when he met the late Mr. Murphy. He had no politics whatever. He was out for the cause of the working man to house the country. Had he lived he would have made this country compare favourably with any country in the world where housing was concerned.

Mr. Kelly, endorsing the remarks of the previous speakers, said the late Mr. Murphy had his heart and soul in housing. He was a man who would do his best for everybody.

Mr. O'Leary said that the greatest tribute that could be paid to the deceased was to see that the plans he had were fully carried out.

The Chairman said he was glad to see this praise of the late Mr. Murphy by Senator Butler in 1923. They were great friends since. When he was elected Minister he knew they had a man who would carry out his duties. He was not a dictator but a man who would listen to advice. When he came to Dungarvan recently he asked everybody for their advice on housing, which he listened to and appreciated. Were it not for his initiative the foundations of the Abbey-side houses would not be dug yet.

The clerk on behalf of the officials asked to be associated with the vote.

Sympathy was also tendered to the relatives of the late Mr. W. Whelan, the late Mr. Jimmy O'Shea, the late Mrs. Flynn, Abbeyside, and to Mr. M. Connors on the death of his brother-in-law.

The Chairman welcomed the newly co-opted member, Mr. O'Leary, in which the other members joined.

Mr. O'Leary suitably replied.

The meeting then adjourned.

Urban Council Protests Against Ireland Bill

Before adjourning the Urban Council meeting on Friday evening last, Senator Butler proposed and Mr. J. Goode seconded that—

"We, the members of the Dungarvan U.D.C. hereby pledge our support to any action considered necessary by the Government to restore the Six North Eastern counties to National jurisdiction."

Proposing the resolution, Mr. Butler said the British Government had introduced a Bill by which the Northern Government would have to agree before Partition could be ended. It was a terrible thing that the British Government should shirk the issue at this moment and he thought that they should support the Government in whatever action they took in this matter.

Mr. J. Goode, seconding, said that Irish people the world over should be called on to bring the greatest possible pressure on the British in this regard.

The Chairman said he was certainly delighted to see all the Irish people united when it came to this test. They should all agree with the Government in this respect. He was sure they would do nothing wrong. It was a grand thing to see the opposition falling in with the Government. He hoped this resolution would bear fruit. Mr. Kelly, associating himself with the resolution, said it was a grand thing to see all Ireland united. It would show the British Government when it was Ireland against England, Ireland was united.

Mr. Clancy also associated himself with the protest.

Milk Case.

The Waterford County Council charged Mr. F. J. MacCabe, D.J. Licentiate, with offering a sample of milk to Guard Rice, Kilmacthomas (Food and Drugs Inspector), which was 37.33 deficient of the minimum amount of milk solids. Defendant was not in court and there was no appearance for him.

In reply to the District Justice, Guard Rice stated that there was no reason of which he was aware why defendant was not in court.

Mr. Hally—It's a rather bad case, your Worship.

District Justice (to Guard Rice)—Do you know defendant? Guard Rice—Yes, your Worship.

District Justice—Perhaps you will go out and see if you can locate him. The court then rose and after ten minutes the Justice asked that Guard Rice be recalled and the case was proceeded with, when it was learned that defendant was not in Kilmacthomas that day.

Mr. Hally stated that Guard Rice called to defendant's premises on the evening of the 12th April last and requested a sample of milk. There was none available at that time, but after a while one of defendant's children came along with a pail half full of milk and from this the Guard was given a sample which was the subject of the present summons.

Guard Rice corroborated the previous witness's evidence and said defendant was in a small way of business and just sold milk to casual callers. He had about 7 or 8 cows.

District Justice—How does defendant account for this amazing deficiency?

Guard Rice—I don't know. I have been taking samples there over a number of years and this is the first summons issued. My cows are 19/- a cow. Our cows are not less than 3 guineas, but I will leave it to your Worship.

District Justice—I will say a fine of £1 with 2s 2d costs.

Youghal Greyhound Track

Late Mrs. K. O'Halloran, Clashmore.—We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Kate O'Halloran Clashmore. A member of one of the best known families in the Co. Waterford, deceased, was a great favourite, known for her many amicable characteristics. She was widow of the late Mr. Jas. O'Halloran, who was Captain of the famous old Clashmore football team and leading inter-county player. Her demise has occasioned deep regret and much sympathy is extended to her daughter, Mrs. J. Flavin, and other relatives. The remains were removed to Clashmore Parish Church, and the cortege was one of the largest and most representative ever seen in the district and was a fitting tribute to deceased lady. Mourners were present from all parts of Co. Waterford and East Cork. Following Requiem Masses for the eternal repose of her soul, the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a very large concourse of mourners in addition to a big gathering of relatives and immediate friends. The officiating clergymen were Very Rev. Fr. Wm. Flynn, P.P., Clashmore; Rev. Fr. D. Slattery, C.C. do.; Rev. Fr. M. O'Donovan, C.C. Tramore; Rev. Fr. D. McGrath C.C. Lismore; Rev. Fr. J. Foley, Rev. Fr. J. Ward. Amongst the general public was Mr. M. Sheehan T.D., Lord Mayor of Cork. Representatives of the G.A.A., Old I.R.A. and F.C.A. were also present. A big number of Mass cards and numerous messages of sympathy were received. R.I.P.

KILMACTHOMAS COURT

Before Mr. F. J. MacCabe, D.J. Licentiate, on the application of Supt. Lyons, Tramore, the case of the Attorney-General v. Pat. Dalton, M.P.—The case was adjourned for one month, owing to the absence of Mr. W. Keller, solicitor, Waterford.

Nicholas Power Kilbarrysteaden, Kilmacthomas, was fined 2s for allowing two cows, his property, to wander on the public road. The fine was subsequently remitted by the Justice when defendant appeared in court.

The usual nominal penalties were imposed in the case in which several defendants were summoned for minor breaches of the Road Traffic Act and for school attendance and unlicensed dogs.

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Vocational Education Committee.

At a meeting of above on Monday, Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien presided. Present—Messrs. M. H. O'Hara, M. F. Walsh, D. Coughlan, M. Clancy, J. Mansfield, N. Kelly and D. Cullinan C.E.O.

Correspondence.—The Department wrote granting permission for teachers to attend Oireachtas from 15th to 23rd October, provided the classes were maintained.

The C.E.O. said one of the teachers attended in the past up to last year and may ask for permission to go again. Similar permission was granted for two days at Oireachtas in Muman.

A Department circular stated there were four summer courses for vocational teachers this year.

C.E.O.—There are two applications for the four regular Department courses and three for the three extra courses.

£60 was approved for expenses in regard to same.

The Department wrote sanctioning the payment of travelling expenses and subsistence allowance to delegates to the annual Congress.

The Department approved of the absence of Diarmuid O'Driscoll as adjudicator at Feis Luimnighe.

Farrier Course.—The Department wrote approving of above course.

Mr. Coleman Farrier instructor, wrote accepting the invitation of the committee to take charge of the course.

Teacher Honoured.—The Department wrote asking for services of Miss Kelleher to act as examiner for the Department's Practical Domestic Economy Test; also to conduct a course in Domestic Science at Tourmakeady in July.

Granting the application, the Chairman remarked it was a great compliment to her teacher.

Household Management Course at Cork.—The C.E.O. wrote dealing with committee query of last meeting and said the course was being considered.

Classes at Knockanore.—The C.E.O. reported the resumption of classes at Knockanore under the jurisdiction of Miss Malone.

The C.E.O. said he had got quotations in Cappoquin from hockney owners to take the instructor to these places and accepted the lowest.

The Committee agreed with his action but Mr. Kelly thought each hockney owner should be given a lucc at the rate of 1/- per mile.

It was decided to put gravel on Dungarvan school yard.

It was decided to dispose of surplus material in the store by auction.

It was decided to grant Mr. Douglas St. Clair Hill an honorarium of £5 5s in connection with his recent lectures on the painting exhibitions in Dungarvan and Cappoquin.

Flour and Bread Rationing.

The Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order entitled the Flour and Bread (Rationing) Order, 1946 (Sixth Amendment) Order, 1949.

This Order provides for the exclusion of flour confectionery from the definition of "bread" for the purposes of rationing as from the 21st May, 1949.

On and after that date no further supplies of flour of 85% extraction may be obtained on foot of permits or certificates on Form F.B.R.5 for the purpose of making flour confectionery. Manufacturers who make flour confectionery only should, therefore, cancel their requisitions for this class of flour as from the 20th May.
