WEST WATERFORD NEWS

Fianna Fall Meeting—Mr. J. Ormonde, T.D. was present at a largely attended general meeting of the Mountstuart F.F. Cumann and addressed the members. In the course of his remarks Mr. Ormonde said it was fifteen months since the Parties forming the Coalition had joined together to oust F.F. from office. Each of the Parties had a different policy and since assuming office had done nothing for the country. The people of Ireland had given no mandate to the Coalition Parties to put out F.F. and substitute a Government dominated by F.G. All of the Parties had made wonderful promises during the election and had strongly criticised F.F. Now that they have the responsibility of office they had conveniently forgotten all their promises to reduce the cost of living, increase employment and improve the position of the farmers. The cost of living had actually increased, while unemployment had reached unheard of proportions. During the war years scarcity of essential raw materials had reduced employment somewhat, but in 1947, the last year F.F. were in office emigration had almost ceased and employment was increasing rapidly. At present increasing numbers of their youth were fleeing from the country because of their inability to secure employment. The Government had set up an Emigration Commission over a year ago, but that body had, as far as was known, done nothing while emigration went merrily on. The Government was evading its duty and the setting up of this Commission was bluff and eye-wash. They all knew the negative policy of F.C. Its whole history had been one of incompetence. The two Labour Parties had sold out completely to F.G., while C. na P., who put up 93 candidates at the election and returned only ten, had put their policy in abeyance. In conclusion, he congratulated the members on their great work and asked them to be prepared in case an election would be called for them. The Coalition would cling to office as long as they could because they knew that if they faced the electors what the result would be.

Geesh Sports—The annual big sports meeting will be held in Geesh on Sunday next under N.A.C.A.I. Rules and under the auspices of the Geesh Sports Club. Prominent athletes from all parts of Co. To his bereaved family and relatives much sympathy extended. The remains were removed to Grange Church and the accompanying cortege was of large and representative proportions. The interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a big concourse of mourners.

Passing of a Lovable Priest.

LATE REV. M. POWER, C.C. KILL.
Our Kilmacthomas correspondent writes:—The news of the unexpected death of the Rev. Michael Power, C.C. Kill (which occurred at the curate's residence there on Tuesday morning, 24th inst., in his 42nd year), was received with feelings of dismay and intense regret by the people of these parts.
Son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Power, 62 Percy Terrace, Waterford, the late Fr. Power received his early education at De La Salle Schools, Waterford, and Waterpark College, do. and he studied for the priesthood at St. John's College, do. He was ordained in Waterford Cathedral in June, 1909, and his initial appointment was as chaplain of the De La Salle Community at Fablea. He served as curate at Ballynaneen for a year, and at Clashmore for six years before being transferred to Kill four years ago.
Both priests and people came from many parts near and far in impressive large numbers to the removal of the remains on Wednesday evening to the Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Kill, and to the funeral therefrom on Thursday to St. Mary's Cemetery, Ballynaneen. In these demonstrations of affectionate regard for the departed clergyman was strikingly displayed the very general esteem in which he was held and the deep extent of the regret occasioned at his passing, for the labours of the late Fr. Power amongst the various parish committees whom he served throughout the years of his priestly mission were too well appreciated to be forgotten when it came to paying him this parting tribute. Were he in a position to have a say in the matter he would probably be the last to expect his fellow-priests and the members of the laity to travel long distances to do him the honour thus paid to his memory, for he was of that disposition of character that was humbly itself—a man who never courted that popularity that came to him as spontaneous recognition of his priestly and manly worth. The silent morning assemblage that watched the remains being consigned to the earth, bore testimony more eloquent than words to all this. Where little groups of people were seen, the consolation they found an outlet for their feelings in exchange of whispered regrets at losing so lovable a priest and so kindly a friend. They recounted some of the best of ways in which deceased had so unselfishly placed the span of his sacred calling at the absolute disposal of the parishioners, regardless of whether their station in life was one exalted or of the humblest degree. It was in fact this beautiful trait in Fr. Power's saintly character that watched the affection of all classes wherever he ministered and it will take a long passage of time before those cherished memories of him in the Waterford-Lismore diocese can be effaced.
