Notice To Foster Parents.

THE attention of persons who undertake for reward or the promise of reward the nursing and maintenance of infants under the above Acts is directed to the following provisions of Section 3 of the Children Act, 1934, viz.—

(1) Where a person undertakes, for reward or promise of reward, the nursing and maintenance of one or more infants under the age of nine years apart from their parents or having no parents, he shall, at least forty-eight hours before the reception of any such infant, give notice in writing thereof to the local authority.

(2) Where a person undertakes, for reward or promise of reward, the nursing and maintenance of an infant already in his care without reward, the entering into the undertaking shall, for the purposes of this Part of this Act, be treated as a reception of the infant, but in such cases the notice required by the next preceding sub-section of this section may be given at any time before or within forty-eight hours after such reception.

Failure to give to the Board of Public Assistance the notice above referred to constitutes an offence under the Acts, for which very severe penalties are provided.

At the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture, held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Saturday last, Mr. M. O'Ryan, Vice-Chairman, presided. Present were Messrs. H. F. Walsh, M. McGrath, T. Morrissey, M. Hartly, D. Leary, R. Barron, J. Mansfield, W. Dwyer, T. Power, and D. Coughlan. Misses M. Mullins and M. Walsh, Messrs. P. O'Shea, P. O'Sullivan, D. Walsh and M. O'Sullivan (Instructors), and Mr. P. Conroy, C.A.O., were also in attendance.

Show Subsidies.—The following subsidies were allocated to County Shows: Co. Waterford Sheep Breeders' Association, £100; Dungarvan Show, Waterford Show, £60; Ballyduff Show £20.

Poultry Stations.—Mrs. E. Walsh, Ballymore, and Mrs. O'Donnell, Dromore, Villierstown, were approved of under the poultry stations scheme, 1950.

The sacred ceremonies concluded on Tuesday morning when Miss Cantata was sung.

Kelly's Cross F.F. Cumann.—Mr. Jas. Megley, vice-chairman, presided at a largely attended meeting of the above recently. On the proposal of Mr. James Mansfield, M.C.C., seconded by Mr. M. Salimon, a vote of congratulation and appreciation was passed to Mr. Paik, Burke, Organising Secretary, on his outstanding work on behalf of the F.F. Organisation.

Lime Prices Questioned.—Mr. Barron drew attention to the price of lime which was being charged by a plant in the Kilmacow area. He stated that he understood the Minister had laid it down that the price to be charged per ton for ground limestone was to be 16/6, yet he had information that this plant was charging £1 per ton. He asked to have the matter looked into, and this was unanimously agreed to.

Increases of Salaries.—A communication from the Department on the question of adjustment of remuneration of officers was read and which stated that as the salary of the County Committee of Agriculture should be £1,200, the salaries of the officers, 5/6. The Minister also suggested that the increases be paid retrospectively from 1st January, 1948. For those in receipt of £350 or less, it was suggested that they receive an additional increase from May to November.

Mr. Conroy, in reply to questions, stated that the increases would mean an additional expenditure of £200 per annum.

The Chairman proposed that they grant the increase, which was seconded by Mr. Morrissey.

Scholarship Sought.—First Time in Many Years.—Mr. Conroy stated that for many years a scholarship stipendable at the Albert College, Glasnevin, was not won by any county boy, but this year he felt glad to be able to report that one had been awarded to Thomas Brown, a native of Dungarvan.

On the proposition of the Chairman, a vote of congratulation was passed to him on his outstanding success.

Bees Hives Grants Questioned.—Arising out of the making of grants to bee-keepers, it was stated that grants were being made to people who would not afford to buy their own hives, and it was now felt that it was a ruling was made as to who were entitled to the grants.

Mr. Morrissey pointed out that it would not be fair to do so, as all those interested in the production of honey should get all the co-operation possible.

Mr. Hartly agreed, stating that if a man is interested in this industry, he does not have to be a farmer, but can be anything, including teachers and garda sergeants.

Mr. Leary—But why should we subsidise the people who people who well afford to buy their own hives?

The Chairman agreed, and added that it was time the line was drawn. Mr. Morrissey pointed out that the cost of the hives was only 30/6, and he felt that they should not curb the industry by limiting the grants.

Mr. Barron held that it was time they stopped limiting the raisepayers of the county in keeping hives with men of thousands.

Mr. O'Shea stated that if the industry was left in the hands of those, then it would be dead long ago.

Finally, after further consideration, it was decided to adjourn the matter to the next meeting.

The following notice of motion was moved by Mr. Morrissey: "I hereby give notice that I will move or cause to be moved at the next meeting of the Committee that applications for bee hives and appliances be fixed on a valuation not exceeding £40."

Be Industry Fighting Great Difficulties.—Proposing the following resolution, Mr. Morrissey said that the honey industry in this country was facing its darkest hour, and unless the Minister puts a stop to the importation of foreign honey, the industry of this country is doomed.

"That we specially request the Department of Agriculture to prohibit the importation of foreign honey into Ireland. We also request the attention of the Minister to the large stocks of Irish honey which have accumulated over the past few years in storage and for which there is no market. We also wish to state that there is also no market for this year's crop, which is the biggest for the past 25 years. The sale of honey is causing great anxiety to stock-holders and members of the Irish Bee-keepers Association. We also request the Minister to request the price for this year's section and run honey, otherwise the bee industry, which is the oldest in Ireland, will be all but lost."

URBAN COUNCIL MEETING

At the meeting of the Urban District Council held in the Town Hall on Friday night last Mr. T. McCarthy, Chairman, presided. Also present were Messrs. T. A. Kyne, L. A. Veale, M. O'Leary, J. Goode, M. Clancy, and M. O'Meara, Acting Town Clerk. Mr. P. Walsh, Sanitary Inspector, was also in attendance.

Terms Under Which Town Hall is Let Are Questioned.—Arising out of the Manager's orders, Mr. Kyne asked if he could have full details of the terms under which the Town Hall is let, and if it would be possible to have them for the next meeting. He stated it had been represented to him that there were a number of cases of questionable letting and as a result of the most anxious consideration the council's attention on the matter and to determine if the cases were true or not. It was stated that recently the excursions to the town centre were let to a private individual for the purpose of running a dance and whether this was true or not they did not know.

The Clerk pointed out that some time ago it was the practice that all applicants for the hall would have to give evidence that they were club officers requiring the hall for the purpose of raising club funds.

Mr. Clancy stated that the letting of the hall was no longer a function of the council and all members wished to have the public know that it was carried out under regulations laid down and approved of. Whether these regulations were being adhered to or not they were not aware of. However, when Mr. Kyne gets the information asked for it is expected that the matter will be carefully looked into and thoroughly examined.

Proposed Local Tourist Development Association.—When Mr. Veale's proposal for the formation of a local Tourist Development Association came before the council he stated that since the excursions to the town centre commenced the need for a tourist development Association became more and more apparent. If a meeting were not going to be held, he suggested that they would see what could be done. Mr. Veale added that if the matter was attended to in the right way, men it would be a great boon to the town.

Mr. Kyne agreed with Mr. Veale's remarks and stated that at the last meeting of the council it was pointed out that there was already in existence such an association. If there was then they had heard very little of it in the past. He thought that with such an association what was needed was action and continuous action, and if the existing association was not going to give them this, then he felt that they should form one.

Mr. O'Meara pointed out that such a committee did exist but was more or less incorporated with the Industrial Development Association of the town. He felt that they would have to be a separate body.

Mr. Clancy—It was never there in reality. The trains taking the excursionists to the town came on Sundays when the tide was out. If the association was there they would be able to ensure that this would not happen. They would be able to advise C.I.E. on all such matters.

Mr. Clancy asked what steps they would take to initiate such an association, to which Mr. Veale replied: "Invite all representatives to a meeting with the purpose of forming a committee and to make plans for the future of the town's tourist trade and see that they were put into effect."

Mr. Clancy stated that he felt that it was now too late to start an association as by the time next summer came the members would have lost interest in the future of it. He suggested that they form the proposed association early in the new year. He also pointed out that if the people of the town really wanted to see to the future of the town they should give very careful attention to the amusement end of their programme.

Mr. Veale pointed out that if they had the interests of the town at heart then they would stick to their plans. If they did not then they would be no use to the committee.

Mr. O'Leary—If such an association was formed now as it should be, then it would have the long winter to raise funds by way of a "Ladies' Day" which would enable them carry out the many improvements necessary and which would help out the council to a great deal. If the many social clubs can do this, I cannot see why the proposed association cannot do the same.

After further discussion it was decided to call the meeting on the 17th September, and invite all those interested.

Acquisition of Sites.—It was decided to adjourn the discussion on the acquisition of sites for the Gallows.

Foreign Apples Not Wanted.—The following resolution was proposed by Mr. Morrissey and seconded by Mr. Walsh: "That we request the Minister to prohibit the import of foreign apples up to Christmas, owing to the huge crop of good quality home-grown in the country this year."
