"In Your Kitchen Garden"

Winter Spinach coming along must be thinned to about six inches so as to help the plants to withstand the winter better than if they would be left in a crowded row. Continue to earth up celery becauses the more attention it receives now the better blanched sticks will be available when the time comes to lift it. As large plants are not usually liked it would be as well to lift this crop and store in a cool dry shed, or falling this, put in a pit and cover with some dry straw and bank up earth around it. This operation should be done in fine weather. Plant up all spare sprouts of July or August sown Cabbages and plant at about 1 foot apart for small varieties and every second plant can be removed in the autumn and the remainder left to develop and fully occupy the ground.

FRUIT. All Black Currants should be pruned by this time, also red and white Currants and given a good mulch of farmyard manure if the soil is light and if the soil is heavy they should be well watered and dressed with a dressing of basic slag at the rate of 1 lb. per square yard of ground. Each Square give a dose of Sulphate of Ammonia—1 oz. per square yard and about every three years give a dressing of Sulphate of Potash, 3 ozs. per square yard in April and it will make good use of their opportunities and the half-time score of 4-3 to nil in their favour was about a fair reflection of their superiority. Now we possess the full evidence of all these qualities, the evidence of personal experience. "It will be a joy to tell you people in America and all others of the wonderful progress Ireland is making towards a new, prosperous and a united future. "But, it will also be a pride to tell them that Ireland, even with its present progress and future hopes is not losing the charms of the past, nor the faith that sustains her through sad centuries, nor happily gone.

New Beet Harvesting Machines Demonstration

Under the auspices of Comhult Suicire Eireann, Teo., a most interesting demonstration on beet harvesting took place on the farm of Mr. Navratil, Ballyedekin, Midleton, on Friday last week. The harvesting of sugar beet is a practical proposition, and that the hardships which have been endured in former seasons in the lifting, crowding and cleaning of the crop will no longer be endured, was demonstrated by the different machines which are capable of performing the work from the most economical and satisfactory viewpoint. Various types of machines were on show, from the large International of American origin and design which was capable of topping, lifting, cleaning and cartage into a lorry for transport, all in one operation. The "Roersley" machine, of Danish invention, depicted the single row lifting, cleaning and winnowing unit. A notable feature of the demonstration was the use of the hand topping hoes which have been used in Holland, Denmark and Belgium for many years. An ordinary farm hand could, it appears, top and place into rows a half acre of beet in one day. The Ford Motor Co. of Cork demonstrated their sugar beet and root lifter which is of recent origin. This machine is a lighter, cleaner and winnowing only, and unlike other machines, lifts two rows at a time, but is used in conjunction with a tractor, as the cleaning apparatus is operated from a tractor power take off. It was emphasised that by extensive use of these machines sugar beet production per acre could be increased with lesser cost. In recent years many farmers had cultivated a lesser acreage of sugar beet, due to the shortage of labour, than their normal rotation would permit, but the machines now in operation would considerably ease the labour problem. Mr. J. Glavin, Chief Agricultural Adviser to the Department, was the chief announcer to the many who witnessed the demonstration, and to him may be attributed the great credit of the venture, which also included the lime and fertiliser-spreading lorries, a novel feature indeed.
