WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL Special Meeting.

At a special meeting of the above council held at the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Monday last, Mr. D. Heskin, chairman, presided. Also present were Messrs. M. O'Ryan, P. A. Kyne, T.D.; M. A. Walsh, T. Morrissey, F. Roche, M. Hart, M. McGrath, J. Kirwan, T. Power, J. Mansfield, D. Leary, W. Dower, M. Kelly, J. Quirke, P. Butler, W. Norris and Senator J. Butler. Also in attendance was the County Secretary (Mr. S. G. Dowling) and the County Manager (Mr. S. J. Moynihan). The engineers (Mr. J. J. O'Connell, Mr. O'Rourke, Mr. Mil. Keane, Mr. Dunne, and Mr. Doyle.

Cottage Rents. - Considering the suggestion that higher rents be charged for rural cottages in areas adjoining boundaries of county boroughs, boroughs, urban districts, and in non-municipal areas, Mr. Ryan asked from what source the suggestion came, to which the Secretary replied that it came from the Minister. He stated that it was his contention that the many men who are to-day working in the factories and in the towns are not getting their cottages at a price which would afford to pay more for them than the agricultural labourer, but nevertheless he felt that it would be much better to have some way of levelling the rents of the cottages everywhere. The Chairman stated that it was better for all concerned if the tenants of their cottages could see their way to buy them for the price which would be paid for the cottages to be built, and he would be prepared to maintain them because this would mean that they would have no increased rents to pay as they would remain the same as they are at present.

Mr. Quirke—I think it is not right that factory workers living in these cottages should be allowed to get away with paying the small rents the same as the agricultural labourers. Mr. Kyne—The position is that we are discussing something that is already being carried out. Certain occupants or tenants are already paying higher rents for their cottages and that is a well-known fact. Senator Butler—Are you sure the Minister made that suggestion with regard to the cottage rents? I'm almost certain that he never suggested that the rents should be raised, and especially in the case of the cottages which are being built, and especially in the case of the cottages which are being built, and especially in the case of the cottages which are being built.

Mr. Kyne asked if the tenants would be asked to pay more for the house, to transfer it to another member of the family. He pointed out that he would like to have the Minister's statement on this matter. Mr. Kyne stated that he looked into this matter very carefully at the time, but the council's decision made it very plain that the case should be cleared up if it would have to be taken into the courts and as this would cost money the council was not in a position to afford it. What I would like to know is, stated Mr. Kyne, why the council will not let the tenants know the facts of this scheme, and especially its terms. We do not know them and it would be hard for the tenants to know them. He suggested that all tenants should be given a synopsis of them written in plain English so as they will be really understood.

Mr. Hart stated that these had been fully discussed here before but unfortunately he could not remember the full facts of the scheme. Mr. Kyne—I wonder could the Manager give us an idea of what the rights of the tenants are during the term of purchasing, not after purchasing. He wanted to know if he could give it over to his son during that period. The Manager replied that he thought he could. Finally, after further discussion on the matter, it was agreed that they circulate all tenants and inform them of the council's intention to increase the rents and to offer the alternative of purchasing the cottage. With this circular they would enclose a copy of the memorandum of rights, etc. It was agreed to discuss the matter at differential rents at a later date.

Portlaw Housing Reconstruction.—A letter from the Department in connection with a loan for the reconstruction of a number of houses in Portlaw, stated that the Minister was not willing to sanction the loan of £14,375 for more than 25 years. The council wanted to get the loan spread over a period of 50 years, but it was pointed out that such a long period for repayment was only applicable to new housing schemes. After considering the position it was proposed by Senator Butler, seconded by Mr. Kyne, that the loan be over a period of 25 years. Missing Loan.—Arising out of the previous matter, Mr. Quirke asked if the Council could give him any information on the eight houses being built, some actually built, under the Small Dwellings Acts. He stated that it was a very long time ago since he brought the £5 deposit to the council for those people who were applying for the loan under this scheme and up to this date none of them had yet received the loan. He pointed out that every day he was being asked about the matter but he was never able to give a satisfactory answer and now as a last resort he was asking Mr. Kyne about it. He would like to know what was holding it up and asked the County Secretary to get something definite on the matter. The Chairman (Mr. Heskin) asked the council if they would be prepared to consider adding a number of houses to the scheme at Ballinacorney where they would be provided with the free plot of land as the creamery authorities there felt the need for the extra houses was really very great.

After some discussion on the matter, they agreed to find out if the parties concerned would be willing to pay an economical rent and not expect them to pay the cultural labourer rate. The matter was then adjourned until they hear from them on this point. Ballynacorney Cove Still a Problem.—Further to the deputations call on the Minister with regard to the proposed extension of a landing pier at Ballynacorney Cove, a letter sent to the members of the deputation, which comprised of local T.D.s and Senator Butler, was read. It stated that the Minister would be unable to give a high grant for the scheme. The best he could do would be to give a grant of 50 per cent. to the council and then they would be held responsible for the maintenance of the landing pier. The estimated cost of the landing stage is £11,000. It was pointed out that the pier was in Ballynacorney at present was that they had no landing pier there at all, and the fishermen of the district had to take their boats to Dunmore rocks which is a very dangerous as well as very inconvenient method. This provision of the pier would be mostly for the convenience of the fishermen of the area as at the moment they cannot take in their boats there and have to take them to Dunmore almost three miles away. It was decided to adjourn the matter to the next meeting to get the views of the councillor of that area on the matter.

Strabally Development Committee Seeks Recognition.—A letter from the Strabally Development Committee seeking recognition by the council as an approved local council was read. It stated that the committee had ambitious plans for the village and district and that they would fight for the opening of the Cove, which is a very important attraction to tourists everywhere as it had been before. Mr. Kyne asked how the committee had been formed. Was it

representative of the residents of the district and was it formed by public opinion. He suggested that they adjourn the matter until they find this out. Mr. O'Ryan—This we should find out how it was formed as Mr. Kyne has suggested, but I also think that we should act with regard to the closing of the Cove by the English occupiers, the reminders of the past days. This is something that should not be ignored. Indeed, we went through enough of this for over 700 years, and the few that are left in this area and which were determined by methods again, of which we are only too well acquainted.

After further discussion on the matter it was adjourned. Purchase of House.—After a long discussion it was agreed that the council should purchase the house known as the gashouse for the sum of £945, to be let to an employee and his family. Increases in Remuneration for Vets.—Proposals from the Department for the increase of veterinary (surgeons) inspectors' remuneration came before the council and having pointed out their scale to the same level as other officers of the council. It was proposed by Mr. O'Ryan, and seconded by Mr. Kyne, that they should be increased. Arising out of this matter, Mr. Quirke drew attention to the fact that there was a vacancy for a surgeon for over two years now, and he asked that they should do something about it. He was supported by Mr. Walsh, who proposed that the vacancy there and in Lismore be filled without any delay. Mr. Kyne seconded the proposal. The Chairman said that he would like to suggest to Mr. Kyne that when the Dail returns he should put forward a Parliamentary question as to the matter for vets. and doctors throughout the country are not being filled. He suggested that he would stress the two points of (1) the inconvenience being caused by the lack of them in the various areas, and (2) the unfairness of the present arrangement of six months after the position has become vacant.

Mr. Kyne agreed to do this on the resumption of the Dail. Mr. Quirke asked if the council would do something about the doctor in Ballyduff. He pointed out that the council had provided him with a house in Ballyduff, yet he was living in Lismore with the result that the people of the area were suffering a great inconvenience. It was agreed to put the matter on the agenda for the next Board of Assistance meeting. Extension of Water Supply at Ardmore.—A letter from Mr. Kyne, on behalf of a number of farmers and farmers in the Ardmore area for the extension of the water supply there, was read. He stated that the cost would be £2,000, but added that the extension was needed to Broderick's Cross. Speaking in support of his letter, Mr. Kyne said that the main line in Ardmore stopped about one mile outside the village. The extension as requested would serve five farmers and nine cottiers, and in his opinion it was a scheme well worthy of their consideration. The water supply in the area had for too long been an old complaint and they should improve it now. There was a pump there for nine months of the year it was dry and for the other three months it was only a trickle of water come and it was scandalous to see areas without water like this and he felt that they should make every effort to give them the extension they required.

The Manager asked if it was possible to improve the pump there. Mr. O'Ryan—Was it not laxity of foresight in building those cottages one and a half miles from water. We all know that it is cheaper in the long run to bring the water to the cottages than to pump it there. The members of the deputation stated that they were living close by the village pump for the past 16 years and for nine months of the year it was dry and for the remaining three the supply was not worth talking about. They

have at present to travel miles in the evenings after their work to bring in water for household use. The council put a blast into the supply there some time ago but instead of improving it, it played the mischief with it. They made it very clear that the need for the extension of the supply in the Ardmore area was very great and they would be willing to pay a reasonable amount for its provision. After a short discussion on the amounts they would be willing to pay, one of the deputation stated that he would be prepared to pay £12 for three cottages. Finally, it was decided to adjourn the matter until they get a report from the county surveyor and the medical officer. Another Housing Problem.—Mr. Roche drew attention to the fact that he knew a man who was earning £4 16s. a week and who was a tenant in one of the council cottages paying a rent of 8/6 a week. He said that agricultural labourers were getting these cottages for the sum of 4/- a week and his point was, did the council think it was just in having such a big difference in the rents of these two tenants. The Chairman stated that they would hold over further discussion on this matter until they hear from the Department on the question of the differential rents. Mr. Roche said that he would go even further in his statements by saying that there was a tenant in one of the council cottages who was earning around £6 a week, yet he was only paying the sum of 4/- for a week. The County Manager said that this was a very serious case and he could not say how such a thing came to pass. However, he pointed out it just goes to show that in the future all applications for council cottages will have to receive further investigations. Mr. Roche stated that he would not say any particulars of the particular case. Mr. Roche also asked about the reconstructed houses in the Portlaw area and said that he did not think it was proper that they should be raised in rents as they are being at present 100 per cent. It was decided to have the matter looked into.

Fish Canning Industry for Helmsdale.—A letter was received from parties interested in the establishment of a fish canning industry at Helmsdale, Dungarvan, asking for a strip of land to be used as a right of way to the proposed factory. WATER AND SEWERAGE Schemes Passed by County Council.

£177,030 Involved.

Opening the discussion on the County Waterford water and sewerage schemes, the Secretary (Mr. Bowling) read a letter from the Department of Home Government in which it urged councils to accelerate work on such schemes and pointing out that grants made from emergency schemes vote are required to be expended in the year in which the grant is sanctioned.

Having read the letter, Mr. Dowling dealt with the reports on the various schemes, which were as follows:— Lismore-Cappoquin Water Scheme—Estimated cost £46,000. Remarks: Supply very bad there at present and in great need of scheme.

Tallow Water Scheme—Estimated cost, £16,335. Supply so poor that it is necessary to fit fittings recently installed in old houses cannot be connected.

Stradbally Water Scheme—Estimated at £13,344. Lismore Sewerage Scheme—Estimated at £10,500. Ballymore Water Scheme—Estimated at £4,500. Fourmilewater Water Scheme—Estimated at £14,400. Dunmore Water Scheme—Estimated at £43,200. Cappoquin Sewerage Scheme—Estimated at £30,000. Total amount of the schemes, £177,030.

The County Manager, Mr. S. J. Moylan, stated that all of the above schemes were on the priority lists and were essential. They would cost about £60,000 of a grant, it was hoped over a period of 50 years' loan.

In reply to a question, he said that this would mean roughly £100,000 in the £2 on the £100,000, but that this would go towards maintenance.

Mr. Quirk here drew attention to the water supply in Ballyduff and said that it was really desperate. He said the water supply was sufficient as far as he could see, but it was really not fit for human consumption. It was very bad water. He thought this was being caused by the water being standing in it during the day at the source of the supply. In the morning it was all right, but as the day wore on the supply became dirty and unfit to use, with the result that the people of the village could be seen every evening going with buckets in their hands to the well to get water. He pointed out that something should be done about it immediately.

Mr. Quirk said he thought it would be much better to leave this matter to the new Council, but he thought the health of the people was in this matter more important, and he felt that they should proceed with the scheme in the Helvick area at least immediately. He said they had seen old women of 80 years who were going to their homes from far away, and he knew that these people would only go willing to leave their homes in their area, but he would not support county at large charges.
