Poultry Hatcheries Act, 1947.

THE Minister for Agriculture has made regulations under the Poultry Hatcheries Act, 1947 (No. 41 of 1947), the object of which is to modify the Poultry Hatcheries Regulations, 1948 (S.I. No. 273 of 1948). The new regulations, which will be in force from the 1st November, 1949, are operative as from the 1st November, 1949. The principal modifications relate to the classes of poultry hatcheries exempted from licensing, the measures to be adopted at licensed poultry hatcheries and supply farms for the purpose of tracing disease in poultry, and the submission of applications for hatching licences and supply farm permits.

COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

The monthly meeting of the above committee was held at the fourhouse, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. P. R. Morrissey, chairman, presided. Also present: Messrs. M. McGrath, M. A. Walsh, D. Coughlan, M. O'Ryan, W. Dowse, J. Leary, T. Morrissey, R. Barron, M. Harty, T. Power, D. Heskin, J. Mansfield, W. Dowse. Also in attendance was the C.A.O., Mr. P. Conroy, and all Department instructors.

Bees Hives Set a Problem.—The following notice of motion, which had been handed in by Mr. Morrissey, was read and discussed:—"That applicants for beehives and appliances be fixed on a valuation not exceeding £40 or £50 in any one year. Speaking in support of his resolution, Mr. Morrissey said that he would like very much to take the opportunity of pointing out that through this scheme beekeepers get only a grant of one-third of the cost of the hive, which is the usual value of a hive, and costs £4 10s. unpainted or plus 6/- painted. At this price they are, of course, equipped with cross sections and frames, and were not getting the hives for nothing as could be seen from these figures.

The Chairman asked what was the usual valuation figure, to which Mr. Morrissey replied that as far as he could remember it was £40, which he also thought was reasonable.

Mr. O'Shea, Instructor, pointed out that at one time it was limited, but as the applications increased they had to let the scheme open.

Mr. O'Ryan asked what the valuation was for farming and was informed that it was £5. He stated that it would be ridiculous to have a valuation of £10 or unlimited.

Mr. Barron here pointed out that as far as he was concerned, bee-keeping was farming and the cost of production of eggs was soaring higher and higher. He strongly opposed the appointment.

Miss Mullins, Instructor, stated that another Instructor was needed desperately in West Waterford if the work was to be carried out to the satisfaction of all. She said she could only make her calls once a month and she would like to make them more often in order to do her job as she should and she added: "One officer cannot attend to 43 stations efficiently."

Mr. O'Ryan agreed that Miss Mullins had a great deal of work to do, but he pointed out that in a short time Britain will no longer be a net exporter of eggs but will seek them elsewhere and then there will be no great demand for the services of the instructor. He said he would favour temporary appointments but not permanent ones.

In reply to a question, Miss Mullins stated that egg production had increased considerably throughout the country, including West Waterford, in two years and were able to export 5,000,000 eggs. In this country they had three big hatcheries which are really kept busy. In keeping up egg production they have to watch outbreaks of disease and prevent it as much as possible. This could be done only by plenty of supervision.

Mr. O'Ryan proposed they create the post and Mr. Dowse seconded it.

Mr. Heskin proposed an amendment that no appointment be made. Mr. Morrissey seconded it. Mr. Barron then moved a vote of 7 voting each way. The Chairman then gave his casting vote in favour of the appointment.

On Mr. Morrissey's motion, a letter from the Department stated that Show Societies must in the future make application to the Executive Committee one month in advance for the services of their instructors to act as judges at Shows so as to enable the committee give due consideration to the application.

Reconsideration Requested.—Further to the committee's resolution to the Department, the Department was requested to control the wheat and barley seed for the coming season, a letter from the Department was received which stated that there is no official control over the marketing or price of the 1949 crop barley. Growers were given due notice that this would be the position and that a certain cash market was assured for milling barley only whose disposal to an industrial user had been arranged in advance. The Minister is satisfied that it would be beyond the capacity of industrial users of barley to purchase the full output of milling barley from the 1949 crop (estimated at 1,900,000 barrels) and in any event the making of surplus purchases now would reduce the market for barley of the next harvest. Brewers, maltsters and other industrial users will be required to purchase their full requirements of milling barley from the native crop as imports will not be allowed. It is not proposed to control officially the retail price of seed wheat. Farmers are advised to make early arrangements with their usual suppliers to reserve their requirements for the coming season.

After some discussion on the position they requested the Minister to reconsider the matter with a view to easing the situation, which at present exists in the sale of surplus milling barley. Mr. Mansfield pointed out that such a surplus existed in the Ardmore district.

The C.A.O. (Mr. Conroy) read out details of the scheme of loans for the purchase of milling machines.

Commenting on it, Mr. Barron said that the loan period of 7 1/2

asking his Department to explore the possibilities of securing outside markets for Irish honey.

This was unanimously agreed upon. Mr. Barron said that the meeting it was pointed out that in several districts throughout the county the potato crop was turning black. Farmers were finding their potatoes black, which was stated to be due to the dry season. It was strongly recommended to all farmers to re-open their pits as soon as possible and examine the contents and should they find some of their potatoes black they could make use of them as silage. To do this they should boil them, which could be done in the open with little trouble. The simplest way to overcome the potato silage could be safely stored (covered). It would remain absolutely safe in metal containers and instead of being a loss to the farmer the black spud should prove a valuable asset.

Mr. Heskin—Arising out of the discussion on the temporary appointment of Mr. Walsh, Instructor, whose term expires on 31st November, Mr. Heskin said he was opposed to it, not that he had any fault to find with Mr. Walsh, but because of the Department's lack of interest in county matters. Some time ago they agreed to accept the parish in his district, but they were still waiting for it, and in his opinion this showed that the Department was lacking in such matters.

After further discussion Mr. Leary proposed, and Mr. O'Ryan seconded, that Mr. Walsh be re-appointed.

Another Opposition.—When the proposal to create a temporary post of Instructor in Poultry-keeping came before the committee, Mr. Heskin stated that they had enough instructors at the moment, and with the present shortage of eggs, circumstances would speak for themselves. He pointed out that from all he had seen, several people were now disposing of their hens and the cost of production of eggs was soaring higher and higher. He strongly opposed the appointment.

years was far too short for the ordinary farmer and the interest too high. He thought it should be reduced to 3 per cent. He also objected to the item of securities, as he pointed out no one likes having to go to his neighbour for such and he believed his stock should be enough security.

Mr. Morrissey agreed and said that should send a resolution to that effect to the Department. Mr. Heskin said it was not right to have to ask your neighbour to secure you, and he felt that the simplest way to overcome that problem would be to have the matter referred to the Creamery Manager of the area for his recommendations. In his opinion he would be best qualified to deal with the man's stock position, etc. He suggested they should matter to the Department also.

It was finally agreed to inform the Department that it is considered by the committee that the period of loan should be at least 10 years; that the interest should be 3 per cent, and that a chattel mortgage on the recommendation of the Creamery Manager of the area be sufficient.


Hotels Should Use Irish Fruit.—Mr. Heskin stated that he thought it would be a good idea if the Department could get a record of the amount of fruit used yearly by hotels, cafes, hospitals, institutions, etc., so as to determine their needs, which should be supplied entirely by Irish produce. He said he would like to see the orchards around the country inspected by the instructor to inspect the trees and estimate what the coming crop would be like which would enable them make every preparation for the consumption of the crop and so prevent a recurrence of the glut experienced this year.

Mr. Harty said all hotels should use Irish fruit completely and should not support foreign imports. He pointed out that this was practical and added: "After all when in Rome we must do what the Romans do. Well, to the tourists the same should apply here."

Mr. O'Shea pointed out that the sugar shortage was the handicap here. He said that as far as the apple crop was concerned the Department was in complete touch with the nerve centre of the nation through its Instructors. They knew at all times the exact position, but in June it would be impossible to give an idea of what the crop would be like as at that time they would be at the mercy of Providence. July would be the earliest date to forecast the crop, and even then it would be a chance. This year's crop was abnormal and for that they should be grateful. With the normal crop the demand would be far greater than the supply, and with this year's crop there was enough to meet the year's needs. We still lack roughly 4,000 acres of desert apples to cope with our requirements. He pointed out that in this country there was no system of marketing apples and this was one thing which they should pay more attention to.

After further discussion a resolution was proposed and seconded calling on the Department to ensure that an early ban is put on the import of apples into the country in future; that a survey of the expected native crop be taken as early as possible, and that all Irish hotels, institutions, etc., be requested to use all home-grown fruit and vegetables.

New Social Services Bill Criticised.—Mr. Heskin said that a long time ago he wanted to press for the incorporation of the Workmen's Compensation Insurance scheme with the National Health Scheme so that somehow the matter drifted and they all forgot about it. Now the new Social Services Bill would soon be coming up for the Second Reading and he would like to have the support of all in asking their T.D.s to support having the W.C.I. embodied in the new scheme. He said that he felt, he said, that the new service was too much of a liability on the individual and had gone beyond what the nation can bear. "According to what we've read in the Press," he stated, "we will before long be catering for a nation of pensioners. He said that he understood there would be no means test but did not know whether any allowance would be taken into consideration. He said there would be wonderful maternity benefits, but the men and women who are keeping the nation going will not benefit by the scheme at all—the farm labourers—a s they are completely ignored. He said that should defend these to the limit, and concluded by adding that the nation could not bear the burden which was agreed to by all.

Plans, elevation and sections of the proposed works, drawn to scale of not more than eight feet to an inch, or in the case of larger projects to a scale sufficient to comprehend applicant's intention. 2. Specifications or written particulars of materials of construction and finish, colours, etc. 3. A site plan drawn to scale of not more than 88 feet to one inch, or such scale sufficient to identify the location of the project in relation to the surrounding properties. Site plan should indicate layout, roads, sewers and water supply, etc.

The attention of all persons concerned is directed to Section 70 of the Town and Regional Planning Act, 1934, which provides, inter alia, that no compensation shall be payable in respect of any structure the erection of which was begun after the "relevant date" (as defined in the Act) unless such erection was begun under and in accordance with special approval granted by the County Council as Planning Authority for the County Health District of Waterford.

Failure to comply with above instructions may involve the removal of the work or having it brought into conformity with the Planning Scheme, when such Scheme comes into operation, without compensation and at the expense of the person responsible.

Before proceeding to prepare detailed drawings and specifications as required above, persons concerned are advised to put preliminary proposals before Council.

BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS ORDER, 1926.

THE County Council of Waterford hereby gives notice, to all concerned, of the following provisions of the above Order:-

- (a) Every person having in his possession or under his charge (i) any cow which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis in any of the following forms: (a) the tubercular or other chronic disease of the udder; (b) any bovine animal which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis emaciation; (c) any bovine animal which is suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis, shall, without avoidable delay, give information of the existence of the animal in question to a member of the Garda Síochána at the nearest Garda Station.

(b) A Veterinary Surgeon or Veterinary practitioner who examines any bovine animal, and is of opinion that the animal is suffering from tuberculosis in any of the forms specified in sub-section (a), shall, without avoidable delay, give information of the existence of the animal in question to a member of the Garda Síochána at the nearest Garda Station.

(c) The County Council of Waterford hereby gives notice, to all concerned, of the following provisions of the above Order:-

Unless notice of the existence or suspected existence of tuberculosis in the animal is given in accordance with the above regulations, no claim for compensation in respect of the slaughter of the animal can be admitted.

No case is compensation payable for the death of an animal suffering from tuberculosis in any of the forms specified in sub-section (a) of section 1 of the Order, in accordance with the provisions of the Bovine Tuberculosis Order, 1926.
