### DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

The Michaelmas sitting of the Dungarvan Circuit Court was held before His Lordship Judge Roe on Tuesday last.

**WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION CASES.**  
The adjourned claim of Denis O'Brien, Durrow, under the Workmen's Compensation Act against Anastasia Burke, Strabally, came up for judgment.

Mr. Clarke (Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs.) was for plaintiff, and Mr. Williams, Solr., for defendant. Outlining his claim Mr. Clarke stated Denis O'Brien, aged about 19 years, fell from a hayrick while working for defendant on the 14th October, 1948. He sustained injuries to his kidneys causing him to pass blood when urinated. At the last sitting Dr. Quinn was not present to give evidence, but Dr. McCarthy attended and in evidence he stated that he did not think plaintiff was capable of even light work. Since then settlement had been offered to the plaintiff of £80.

Dr. Quinn in evidence stated he saw the plaintiff, Denis O'Brien, for the first time on the day after the accident. He found he had a bruised kidney and prescribed a couple of weeks' rest. During that time the plaintiff was satisfactorily and he continued attending to him up to June this year. In his opinion the boy is now all right and it is unlikely that the injury will have an after-effect later on in life.

Denis O'Brien, in reply to Mr. Clarke, said he resumed work after the June Court and received the sum of 24/- a week with meals. He said that during the course of his work his back caused him pain periodically and he would have to stop work during that time. At this stage His Lordship intervened and said that it had now been stated that plaintiff was only getting 24/- a week now, whereas before the accident he understood he was getting 48/-.

Plaintiff stated that before the accident he was getting 24/- as he was at present. His Lordship then pointed out that the position was the plaintiff was actually getting more per week compensation than he was now earning.

Summing up His Lordship stated that he would like to have an expert's opinion on the boy's condition and his future health. He suggested he should be examined by a specialist and if it is proved that the boy will suffer no future effects then they can accept the settlement.

He said that he would rather keep working if he possibly could at all. He made no complaints to a doctor till he called on Dr. White. He had often complained of his leg pains to the ganger, John Joynt, in reply to Mr. Clarke, said he had examined the plaintiff in April last and found he was suffering from Parkinson's disease, which was felt rather odd for a man of 59. On questioning him he found that in 1932 he had suffered the loss of an eye and in 1947 had received a leg injury. These would in his opinion have set up a nervous background. He felt that the last accident would therefore have been responsible for the disease coming on so soon. He pointed out that it could not have been brought on from the first accident as the time had been too long and as the disease usually takes about a year or so to diagnose, the time pointed to the 1947 accident. He said he had no doubt of what the plaintiff was suffering from, which he would state resulted from the 1947 accident. He stated that the plaintiff was totally incapacitated and would always be so.

Cross-examined by Mr. Halley, he admitted that Parkinson's disease was not serious, but it was the effects to the brain that would cause all the trouble. He also admitted that he would have the disease without having had the accident but at a much later age. Dr. White pointed out that to get Parkinson's disease at his age was not common and could only be caused by other complaints of which he could find none. He could only attribute it to the accident.

Mr. Halley—Would you say he had a very bad heart?  
Dr. White—I would not.  
Mr. Halley—All right, we'll compromise—would you say he had a bad heart?  
Dr. White—I would not. It is not common to have a bad heart at his age.

Mr. Halley—Would you say that the heart would bring on the disease?  
Dr. White—A bad heart would not bring on the disease.

In reply to His Lordship, Dr. White said that the tremor in the hands was one of the cardinal signs of Parkinson's disease. His Lordship remarked that he had noticed it in the plaintiff as he left the box.

Dr. McCarthy, in evidence, said that he agreed with his colleague, Dr. White, that plaintiff was not fit for work, but would not agree that this was because of the accident. He said the accident had been rather severe in occurrence but not at all severe in effects. The cause of Parkinson's disease was unknown. It could come on after the age of 50 but was more common between 60 and 70 years. He had seen people suffering from it at the age of 40 when no accident occurred, but had never seen a case where an accident had caused it except maybe an accident to the brain. In his opinion the loss of an eye and the poor vision in the other eye, which constituted a great deal of strain, would be as much responsible for the disease as the accident.

He admitted his general physical condition was bad and he was not fit for work, but he believed this could be attributed to microdismia, which he thought he was suffering from.

### SUCCESSFUL SITTING OF LABOUR COURT

At the Town Hall on Wednesday last the Labour Court had its first sitting in Dungarvan, to investigate the dispute between the Dungarvan Glue and Gelatine and the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers Union, in accordance with Section 71 of the Industrial Relations Act, 1948.

Mr. J. P. Mortished, Chairman, presided, assisted by Messrs. P. McLoughlin and C. O'Shannon. Spokesman for the A.T. & G.W.U. was Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D. and Mr. Gilbert Lynch. Spokesman for the Dungarvan Glue and Gelatine was Mr. C. B. Cuffe, Solicitor, Law Agent, Federated Union of Employers.

The hearing which commenced at 11 a.m. was run off with a degree of efficiency and almost unique in so far as a decision was reached within ten minutes and agreed to by both parties within a very short time also. The outcome of the proceedings were very well received by all and an assurance from employers that the factory would resume work within a few days was welcomed by all.

An agreement is now being drafted which will be signed by both parties and the original question of wages will be dealt with within one month. In his opening address, the Chairman of the Court, Mr. Mortished said that the sitting was held under the provisions of the Industrial Relations Act, 1948. Under that Section they had power (1) to recommend terms of a settlement, (2) to make an award determining conditions, etc.; (3) to bind in agreement both parties concerned.

Mr. Kyne, T.D., before reading the statement said that he would like to express his appreciation at the prompt hearing of the case. He would like to point out that the course of action taken by the workers was not sustained or financed by the Union. They believed in fighting through the proper channels and consequently explored what had happened. They now expressed regret that what had occurred was believed that the dispute was to some extent provoked but now they hoped to reach a satisfactory settlement.

A long statement from the Union's Organiser, Mr. G. Lynch, was read. In this statement it was stated that the Union members had been obtaining revision of wages since the termination of the Emergency Powers Order on a 12-monthly basis and last year received an increase of 5/- which brought the rate to that paid by the Dickens Leather Co. The firm were not prepared to concede a higher rate than that paid at the D.L.C. but the Company did agree that if there was any increase in the cost of living they would give 9d. for each point, with a fall of 9d. for each point below 100. Since that agreement the Labour Court recommended an increase of 5/- to the D.L.C. workers making the basic rate for labourers 85/- and 86/- for peeler workers. The members of the union in the Glue and Gelatine claimed they should look for an increase but it was pointed out by Mr. Kyne for the Union that they must wait until the end of the 12 months (i.e., 28th April, 1949). A claim was submitted for revision but the firm refused to meet the Union and application was made for plenary powers. On receipt of the application the Union communicated with the firm asking that a conference be held. After considerable delay this was held and the view of the company was most adverse to an increase held it should go through the Labour Court and a Conciliation Officer sat on September 2nd. At this the Company held that because they agreed to a cost of living bonus at the previous settlement, it was not their intention there would be a revision at the end of 12 months and they were not prepared to give any increase. The Union gave notice to terminate the agreement. Conditions in the factory had been going from bad to worse and at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, 12th October, the men walked out.

The statement then pointed out a series of attempts by the Union representatives to effect a settlement which culminated in a Conciliation Conference being held on October 25th, presided over by Mr. Smith, an officer of the Labour Court. The following proposals resulted which were later rejected by the men by 24 votes to 11, (1) a fine of 30/- or 24 days pay, whichever is less, must be paid, (2) it must be paid in six weekly instalments, (3) Our previous proposals for discipline of men must be confirmed. The statement then dealt with the rate of wages per hour of the various employees.

In reply to the Chairman, Mr. Lynch stated that the cause of the delay in negotiations was that when the Union met the directors at the final meeting, everything seemed likely to work out alright. The meeting was adjourned and at a second meeting negotiations fell through. The case was then referred to the Labour Court but because of Dr. Casey's illness all talks had to be postponed. Mr. Cuffe, Solr., said that he
