They call it the National University, continued Mr. O'Ryan, but I call it a national disgrace.

The Secretary read a resolution from Conrad N. Gaedhlig on the same subject.

Mr. O'Ryan—I propose we adopt that.

Senator Butler, seconding, said he did not understand why they can't do as they do in Cork and Galway.

Chairman—It is only reasonable that they should fall in with the other Universities.

The resolution was adopted.

Republic of Ireland—A resolution protesting against the words "Republic of Ireland" being printed on the new stamps was read from Caidre Na Gaedhlig.

Chairman—Apparently the idea is that we should not call it a Republic when it doesn't include all Ireland.

Mr. Quirk—Send it to the Dail. We can't do anything with it.

Fowl Pest Infected Area Order, 1950.

THE Minister for Agriculture has made an Order, entitled as above, declaring the following area to be a Fowl Pest Infected Area for the purposes of the Fowl Pest Order, 1950.

The Administrative Counties of Carlow, Kilkenny and Westmeath; that part of the Administrative County of Wicklow comprising the rural districts of Shilleigh; that part of the administrative county of Tipperary comprising the rural districts of South Riding comprising the rural districts of Sivearagh, Cashel, Clonmel No. 1, and Carrick-on-Suir No. 1; the administrative county of Waterford excluding the rural districts of Lismore and Youghal No. 2.

The effect of the Order is to prohibit the movement of poultry carcasses and eggs for hatching into, out of, and within the area; the bringing of poultry carcasses or eggs for hatching to any market, fair, sale, exhibition or gathering in the area; and the hunting or shooting of wild birds in the area.

Caulfield, chairman, presided. Also present were Messrs. M. O'Ryan, W. Kenneally, P. Roche, P. Brown, P. McGrath, Senator Butler, P. O'Connor, R. Barron and T. A. Kyne, T.D. The County Manager, Mr. S. Moylan; County Secretary, Mr. O'Hare; Assistant Secretary, Mrs. P. A. Croke, and Mr. M. Phelan, Superintendent H.A.O., were also present.

The Estimate of Expenditure. - The following was read from the County Manager: - A Chairman to submit for your consideration my estimate of expenses for the financial year ending 31/3/51, showing gross estimated expenditure of £166,038; gross estimated receipts, £14,962; net requirement, £151,077. This shows an increase of £2,238 on the net requirement for the current year, but this increase is offset by the inclusion of an estimated credit balance amounting to £5,852, to which must be added the debit balance of £2,628 in the current year's estimate - total £2,992 - the net result being that the demand on the contributing bodies is reduced by £1,454 as follows: - Sum demanded for the year 1949/50, £145,079; sum to be demanded for the year 1950/51, £145,225. Difference, £1,454. In considering the gross expenditure attention is drawn to the following items, which show an increase over the estimated expenditure for the current year: - Assistance in District Institutions - Provision is made under this head for the payment to the County Council of a sum of approximately £5,000, being the board's share of the loss incurred by the County Council in the sale of turf during the emergency. Three additional nurses have recently been appointed on the staff of the county hospital and further increases in staff are anticipated on the completion of the new maternity wing. A sum of £1,000 has been included for this purpose.

Certain capital projects - notably the construction of the new maternity wing at the county hospital - have been undertaken by the board and the development of these schemes is being pushed forward as rapidly as possible. No firm estimate has yet been received for the work mentioned but as this is a matter of urgency, it is hoped to have the building completed before July 31st, 1950. In anticipation of the requirements of charges on this and other schemes a sum of £1,000 has been included in the estimate. Allowance is made under this head also for other small increases in such items as retiring allowances, food, drink and tobacco, bedding and clothing, etc.

Home Assistance. - The board will recall that in considering the 1949/50 estimate reference was made to the partial continuance of the Food Voucher Scheme until then in operation and provision was made for this by the inclusion in the estimate of a sum of £5,500. Due to a considerable decrease in the number of applicants for home assistance it has been found that more than ample provision was made for this purpose. During the year the amounts paid to home assistance recipients were increased as were also contributions paid in respect of boarded-out children. The net effect of these increases is that the sum now estimated for the cost of home assistance and the cost of boarded-out children shows an increase of approximately £242 over that for the current year.
