







TALLOW NOTES

Monthly Fair Proves Huge Success.—The first monthly fair after an absence of upwards of 14 years was held in Tallow on Friday last and proved to be a wonderful success, the attendance of buyers and stock exceeding all expectations, while the number of sales transacted must have constituted a record for a town in Co. Waterford. Organised only a few months ago, the Fairs Committee worked like trojans to have everything in ship-shape for the opening on Friday when everything from the buyers' and sellers' point of view was excellent and reflects the greatest credit on all concerned. A record number of cattle were taken to the four streets being packed with stock as fine as one could find in Munster, and more than one buyer expressed the view that the stock for sale was better than that of the Bride would rival any in Ireland outside the Dublin district. Prices were very brisk, 3-year-olds making from £40 to £47 each, while a few prime animals fetched over £50 mark; 2-year-olds sold at from £25 to £34 each according to quality; yearlings made from £25 to £35 each, best cows made from £19 upwards, while suck calves sold at from £3 to £5 10s. Sheep were in good demand and with the exception of choice lots on view, breeding ewes selling at from £8 10s. to £3 each, hoggets making from £2 to £3 10s. The supply was plentiful. Nevertheless, a large number changed hands, good stores making from £3 to £4 10s each, while some sold at from £2 15s. to £4, according to quality. Arrangements for transport by road and rail were all that could be desired. The opening fair is an indication of the future, then the Tallow monthly fair, which will be held on the last Friday of each month, promises to be one of Munster's leading ones. The Fairs Committee desire to extend sincere thanks to all for their hearty co-operation in making and organizing the fair, and they would also like to thank the "Dungarvan Observer" for the very kind and complimentary notice of the project. From the public a special word of praise and thanks is due to the hard-working Fairs Committee, and to those whom shouldered their responsibilities with zest, and Friday's successful fair is in no small degree due to the efforts of the competent committee, and on behalf of all we say, "Thank you."
