## DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

### WORKMAN'S COMPENSATION

**Brown v. Co. Council**  
This was an application made by Mr. Williams, Solicitor, for a review of the compensation payable to Thos. Brown, Rockfield, Cappagh, in respect of an injury suffered in 1929.

Mr. D'Arcy, B.L. (instructed by Mr. Haly, Solicitor) appeared for the Co. Council.

The application was to fix, by consent, the amount applicant is now entitled to under a supplementary allowance.

His Lordship made an order for the payment of £2 10s. 10d. as from 1949.

In a similar application on behalf of Pierce Wade, in respect of an accident in 1947.

His Lordship made an order for the payment of £2 3s. 7d. per week.

**ENTERTAINMENT LICENCE.**  
Mr. Haly, Solicitor, applied for and was granted an entertainment licence on behalf of the Lismore Courthouse.

**ORDER FOR POSSESSION.**  
Dr. Conahan, State Solicitor, was granted an order for possession of six dwelling houses at Scrammins Lane, Dungarvan, on behalf of Monica Walsh against Helena Gillian.

Defendant was not represented or did not appear.

Dr. Conahan stated that the six houses were let to the defendant at a yearly rent of £6 3s. There are four years' arrears owing.

An order was given by His Lordship for ejectment against the defendant, Helena Gillian, and her six children, who are entitled to retain possession and hold from the plaintiff as their former held from the defendant.

**O'BRIEN v. BURKE.**  
Mr. Clarke, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Solicitors) for plaintiff. Mr. Williams, Solicitor, for defendant.

This was an application made on behalf of Denis O'Brien, Adra-moore, against Anastasia Burke, Durrow, Strabally.

The case which was for the purpose of having approved a settlement of £60 was postponed from a previous court to have an examination of the boy made by a specialist.

After hearing the evidence of Dr. Quinn, Kilmathomas, and the report of a Dublin specialist, His Lordship granted an order for the reduced compensation to 10s. per week and as regards the offer of £60 made as a settlement, he adjourned a consideration of that. He allowed the applicant costs of the various hearings.

**EJECTMENT BY CONSENT.**  
Mr. D'Arcy, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Solicitors) for plaintiff. Mr. Kenny, Solicitor, for defendant.

Plaintiff, Mrs. Mulcaire, who is residing in the U.S.A., sought an ejectment order against Mr. Kenny, tenant of the premises at Knockateamore, Dungarvan.

Mr. Kenny said his client intends leaving the house and intends going to the States. Under the circumstances, he (Mr. Kenny) will consent to the ejectment if His Lordship will grant a stay of three months.

The ejectment was granted with a stay of three months.

## DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

Mr. T. McCarthy, chairman, presided at the meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council held on Friday, February 10th. Also present were: Messrs. A. Kyne, T.D., D. O'Sullivan, N. Ravey, Mr. Goode and L. A. Veale, vice-chairman.

**Lights**—Arising from the recommendation of the council at the previous meeting that might be erected at Newine, Abbeyside, and at Youngal Road, the order made by the Manager approved of same.

On the proposal of Mr. Kyne it was also agreed to have an extra light erected at Strand-side North, Abbeyside. A report from the engineer stated that a pole already exists there and the light would be desirable.

The engineer was asked to report on the necessity for a light at the top of Slurnd Street. Mr. Goode drew attention to the necessity for this.

**By-laws**—On the proposal of Mr. Kyne, the council unanimously adopted a by-law respecting lodging-houses and houses divided into separate tenements.

**Engineer's Report on Housing Scheme**—Mr. O'Malley's report on the progress of the Abbeyside Housing Scheme for the month stated—Number of houses now completed, 34; completed during the month, 12; value of work executed during the month, £3,944 16s. 6d.; 64 houses are now built to roof level and 8 to first floor level; 48 houses have been tiled and all partitions, flooring joists, floors and window-sills have been fixed in position; 2 houses have not yet been started awaiting demolition of sium area.

The report was noted and approved.

**A Renegade Irishman**—When a resolution was read from Skibbereen Urban Council requesting the Urban Council to publish in the December issue of the "American Magazine," "Holly Day," in which the Irish were described as priests, dirty, ignorant, murderous, lying, slum-dwelling and immoral, the Chairman proposed its adoption.

Mr. Goode, seconded, said he had read this article and he would like to invite him to any town in Ireland where he could find the returns of his name. I am not going to say the waster is an Irishman. I will say he is a renegade.

**Cross on National Flag**—When a resolution was read from the Fermoy Urban Council for adoption by the council, requesting the Dungarvan Urban Council to erect a cross in honor of the Holy Year to have a cross inserted on the National Flag.

Mr. Goode asked if they suggested a cross in honor of the Holy Year. Mr. Kyne said he would like to see the houses occupied, but I imagine any alteration must be made by a plebiscite of the people, according to the Constitution.

The resolution was adopted.

**Financing Local Expenditure**—The council also adopted a resolution requesting the Association of Municipal Authorities asking the Government to set up a tribunal to inquire into the incidence of the rate of a local authority.

**Resolution Not Adopted**—When a resolution from Westbury County Council was read, which called on the Government to amend Article 44 of the Constitution thereby giving the One True Council (founded by one Divine Redeemer) on a plane above the man-made religions of the world.

Mr. Goode—Our Constitution deals with religious freedom and we can't go outside that. He proposed that this resolution be not adopted.

Mr. Kelly seconded this, all members being in agreement.

**Sewerage at O'Connell Street**—A letter read from Mr. Patrick Morrissey, O'Connell Street, called attention to the above matter.

The Clerk read the engineer's report and estimate made in 1946 on the abatement of this nuisance, the estimate at the time being £20. The estimate now proposed that this estimate would be increased by 33 1/3rd per cent.

Chairman—This work was approved in 1945, but materials could not be procured.

On the proposal of Mr. Goode, Mr. Kelly, the work was approved.

**Site for Gymnasium**—When this question was mentioned arising out of a letter from the Council, the Clerk asked the council should they stand in the way of those boys who are good lads, and should get every encouragement. They are going to build a hall and all we do is to recommend that they get the lease.

Mr. Goode—Certainly. Such a hall is badly needed in the town. We have at present a Dungarvan man going all the way to Clonmel to be a member of a Boxing Club. Why could we not have a Dungarvan Boxing Club?

## COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

A special meeting of the above was held in the Court House, Dungarvan, on Monday last, Mr. O'Ryan in the chair. Also present—Messrs. D. Leahy, D. Heskin, Mr. McGrath, W. Norris, T. Morrissey, J. Mansfield, J. Quirk, T. Power and P. Barron.

**Lime Subsidy Scheme**—The Secretary said that at the last meeting a letter was read from the Department requesting that the amount allocated for the scheme for 1950 was £2,000, and the amount referred to back to the Department requesting that the same subsidy as last year, viz. £2,000 be given.

The Secretary now read a letter from the Department regretting that the Minister could not see his way to accede to the request of the committee. The letter also pointed out that there are now 10 lime grinding plants throughout the country.

Mr. Heskin—Here in Waterford we are very far removed from those plants and this area is not in a position to avail of the price. Many those plants farmers can have lime at 10/- per ton and when freight is paid here it is 30/- per ton. He held that burned lime is more suitable for mountain land and for that reason the Minister is unjust in turning down the committee's request.

Mr. Quirk—You have a big number of applicants even at the reduced subsidy? Secretary—Yes.

Mr. Norris held it was not correct to state that the price was 10/- a ton. The price at Kilmorony is roughly £1 per ton, the price delivery at his farm, only 17 miles, is 30/-.

Replying to Mr. Norris, the Secretary stated that for the same result two tons of ground limestone is equal to one ton of burned.

Enquiring with the question of tests carried out, Mr. Norris held it was useless to do tests carried out, say, at Johnstown Castle, Creameries, Ordinary farmers cannot hope to compete with Miltobeltown Creamery. Tests should be carried out in different areas of the county. You have in Co. Waterford three different types of soil.

The Secretary said tests were being carried out in two areas in the county at present. Burning lime in hills will not be able to supply the needs of the county. He anticipated that there would be a ground limestone plant in operation in the county during the near future.

Mr. Leahy—Seeing that the Minister is cutting the subsidy, I propose we apply to the Minister for the establishment of a ground limestone plant.

Mr. Morrissey—If we point out to the Minister that two-thirds of the land in Waterford require burned lime and ask for last year's subsidy on the two-thirds, Secretary—I am afraid that would only come back again and hold up the scheme.

Mr. Leahy proposed, and Mr. Morrissey seconded, a proposition that the committee should draw the scheme at the reduced subsidy and a recommendation to go to the Minister that last year's subsidy be applied to burned lime.

This was passed.

The council know anything about the Mr. Veale—Refer it to the Borough Surveyor.

Mr. Kyne—Yes. We are in the happy position that it's a Managerial function, but we get the blame.

This was referred to the manager for a report.

**HARBOUR MEETING.**  
After reading the minutes of the previous meeting and the report of the Harbour Master for the month of January, a report was read from the Harbour Master regarding the feasibility of increasing dues on certain imports and on the tonnage.

The Harbour Master stated that the net tonnage should in his opinion be substantially increased.

Mr. Kyne asked whose province it was to make the increase. Is it the Manager of the council? He did not want to do anything illegal. The last increase, he presumed, was made by the Manager, as from 1942 to 1944 there was no meeting of the Harbour Board, and it was during that period the last increases were made. I have been informed that these increases were illegal and all be can into being without the sanction of the Minister for Industry and Commerce, so I would like to know if we here and now fix the charges?

Clerk—It is not proposed to talk it tonight.

Mr. Kyne suggested that before the council consider increasing the dues that the views of the merchants be invited.

This was approved and it was decided to invite the merchants to the next meeting.

WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL

The quarterly meeting of the above was held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Mr. Denis Heskin, chairman, presided. Also present: Messrs. M. O'Regan, T. Morrissey, T. A. Kyne, T.D.; D. Wick, Mr. Lawlor acted as spokesman, appeared before the meeting in connection with the houses (18) to be built there, asking that a cheaper type of house, one carrying a rent of about 19/- a week, be built as the present site is three-quarters of a mile from the dock. Mr. Sheehy proposed that the County Accountant gave figures of the increases or decreases under the various heads and estimated that the increase in road workers' wages would be roughly £2,300. The County Surveyor told Senator Butler that it is proposed to carry out the widening of the Urban Council, which is the demand of the County Council. The demand now is for £1,200.
