Importation of Flowers, Plants, Shrubs, etc.—The following statement has been issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of the Department of Agriculture.—On account of the danger of the introduction of the Colorado beetle to this country the Minister for Agriculture desires to draw particular attention to the provisions of the Colorado Beetle Order, 1945, which prohibits the importation of plants and shrubs the destruction of any plants imported in contravention of the Order. Persons proposing to import plants are, therefore, warned of the necessity for obtaining in advance a license from the Department of Agriculture and for ensuring that the conditions attaching to such licenses are strictly complied with. Plants imported without being licensed will be destroyed or returned to the sender. For purposes of the Order plants include trees and shrubs, raw vegetables (including potatoes, potato haulms and leaves), rhizomes, corms, roots, layers, cuttings and other parts of trees, shrubs and plants.

Posting of Shamrock.—The Department of Posts and Telegraphs announces that there is no restriction on the posting of shamrock packets to Great Britain. It is, however, advisable that all packets containing shamrock should be posted not later than Saturday, 11th March, to ensure delivery by St. Patrick's Day.

Dungarvan C.B.S. 6-1 Young-hal C.B.S. 4-1.—Laughal C.B.S. (holders) went down before Dungarvan C.B.S. in the first round of the Bro. Rice Hurling League Cup (confined to Cork and West Waterford C.B.S.) at Dungarvan. In arrears by 4 goals at the interval, the visiting boys made a desperate bid for victory in the second half, but the home side stood up well to the test and deserved their win. 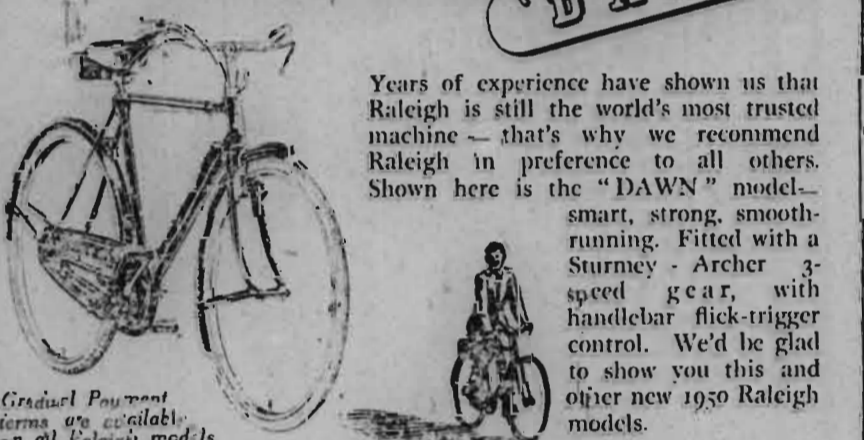
