Urban General Purposes.—(1) Last year you spent £200/0/10 on the park. This compares unfavourably with other towns similar to Dungarvan. We suggest you reduce it for the coming year by £50.

Urban General Purposes.—(2) Your total receipts from the Swimming Pool were £43 10s. Last year you spent an exceptionally fine summer. Your expenditure would appear to be £112—a loss of £68 8s.

Urban General Purposes.—(3) Your expenditure on the public recreation charges, facilities, etc., or in the alternative you should adjust your charges to a small profit. It is completely unfair to the ratepayers that full services should be maintained at the pool after the season.

Urban General Purposes.—(4) Your total expenditure on the Town Hall was £509 15s. There is information to show how much of this amount came from property other than the Hall.

Urban General Purposes.—(5) From information made available to my committee it would appear that net profits of up to £172 have been made on one night's dancing in the Hall.

Urban General Purposes.—(6) The ordinary man in the street will be surprised to hear that the Dunbarrow U.D.C. owe £98,518 6s. 10d. His surprise will be turned into a nasty shock when he hears that on the full impact of the Town Hall roof loan, S.S. Beechfield, Abbeyside Housing Loan and the Gallows-hill Loan that your overdraft will be in the region of a quarter of a million pounds.

ESTIMATES MEETING AGAIN ADJOURNED.
