Ballyduff, Moorehill, and Knockanore Notes.

Why—No Resident Doctor or Nurse?—A question which is causing much agitation in the Ballyduff parish is why a permanent doctor or district nurse is not appointed in the district. Nearly twelve months ago Dr. Leahill used to take up a new appointment at Portlaur, and with several months since the temporary appointed medical man resides in Lismore (no doubt he has no place to reside in the village). Although it has a doctor's residence, but seeing that he is only temporary, he cannot reside there. The district midwife or nurse resigned a few months ago, and the duties are being performed by a nurse from Talow, who has been temporarily appointed and who resides in Talow. There is no need to say that the parish of Ballyduff is a big and widely scattered one, and one can imagine the inconvenience it is for the inhabitants to have to travel to Lismore and Talow for a doctor or nurse respectively—often in the middle of the night. There must be something wrong with the whole system when every day we read of our Irish girls crossing the Channel to take up nursing in England, while the same applies to medical men. We feel sure that doctors and nurses are given a living and decent salary, and none they would not leave our shores. We ask our T.D.s and County Councillors to investigate the matter and endeavour to have permanent appointments in both capacities as soon as possible. Surely the people of the parish are entitled to the same amenities as the rest of the county.
