### HOW IT LIGHTENED AND BRIGHTENED IRISH LIFE

By REV. J. B. DOLLARD, LL.D. ("Sivlenamón").

The formation of the Gaelic Athletic Association, under the patronage and great-heartedness of Archbishop Croke, brought a new spirit and a new hope into Erin. Though quite young at the time, I well remember the great change that came over the country and the vivid and lasting impression it made on me.

Until then, everything was lonely and stagnant in the land, and the young men in their idle hours loitered in dull fashion by the street and fence corners. In a few months how different things became. The country was soon humming with interest and activity—the ambitions of the young men were aroused.

Every parish had its newly formed hurling and football club, prepared to do or die for the honour of the little village. Soon the war of the champions was on. We followed armies of Gaelic many miles along the country roads to the fields of combat, where as many as eight or ten goalkeepers, clad in their coloured jerseys, struggled for supremacy before our dazzled eyes. We cheered our heroes to victory, and what pride we felt in looking at their stalwart and athletic forms. To play on the first team was indeed the greatest honour a youth could hope for, and many of us looked forward to that day with swelling hearts.

Gradually, we who hitherto knew nothing beyond the narrow confines of our native valley began to realize to what a great and noble country we belonged, with the championships progressed, the interest grew from parish to parish, and from province to province.

The names of the local and provincial champions fell soundly from our lips like names of Homer—heroes of the Iliad. The names of the champions of the various counties were as familiar to us as the names of the saints of the calendar.

The G.A.A. widened the horizon of the young men and made them feel proud of their country, giving them a new interest in it. It was understood that common sense and moderation were to be the watchwords of the young men. In the struggle of life, the young men must think of many other things besides the championships. He must be industrious for his own living and the practice of his religion. But in his moments of leisure and recreation there is certainly no better or nobler way for him to stretch his body and mind than the many games furnished by the Gaelic Athletic Association, and especially the grand national game of hurling. What can compare with it for training of the lower limbs, body, arms and eyes into a beautiful correspond-

ence of strength and symmetry and grace, requiring firm, successful player-force, and swift, nerve and clean, indomitable dash and pluck—qualities that he will find useful in the struggle for existence at all times.

Here's to the Gaels of Ireland. Their country's hope and pride. In city or in hamlet. In Desmond wild or Ormonde. In Tir-Owen or Ossorie. God save the Gaels of Ireland, wherever their dwellings be. No knights more true to honour 'E'er trod in sword or hal Than the matchless Gaels of Ireland.

So prompt at Banba's call. Such gentle hearts and stainless Might quest the Holy Grail; God guard the Gaels of Ireland. Their torch of faith 'ere fail. See over the springing green swart The swift opponents dash, And hear that echoing music, The quivering hurleys' clash. Insistent and resistless. They press the stubborn goal.
