FIANNA FAIL MEETING AT DUNGARVAN Government Policy Criticised.

They had the present Coalition Government, a group of contradictory minorities, who started with different programmes and came together on the basis of bargaining. Their programme for the actual election was one of slanders, but since they came into power they had not proved one single charge against Fianna Fail. They came to the electors with a programme of wild promises, to reduce taxation to establish full employment, to end emigration, and to reduce the cost of living by 30 per cent. The Labour Tribunal had admitted that the cost of living rose 10 per cent in 1947 and had not gone down. There was no doubt that Labour represented the double-price system—controlled and the other a kind of legalised black market price for the same vital necessities. According to the Taoiseach the pound to-day is only worth a value of 10/6.

This was stated by Mr. P. J. Little, T.D., at last Sunday's public meeting held at Dunganvar, Mr. James Curran presided, and other speakers were Dr. James T.D., Mr. Sean O'Riada, T.D., and Senator Sean Goulding. The attendance included Mr. P. Tobin, Ald. W. Kennedy, Mr. T. P. Rabbett, Mr. John Higgins, P.C., T.C., Mr. Eric Power, Mr. J. Kiwan, M.C.C., etc.

UNFAIR TO FARMERS. In the agricultural sphere the farmers are told that they must compete against the world. This is not fair to the farmers because they are not obliged to purchase a protected market, and they should be protected themselves.

UNNECESSARY RATIONING. Fianna Fail, he added, rationed bread, sugar, tea and butter during the war because they had not enough of these commodities to go round. Their intention was to rationing when these foods were in plentiful supply. He believed that this is the only way in the world which had maintained a system of rationing that is absolutely unnecessary.

GOVERNMENT. At the present time, he said, they had Messrs. Kyne, Larkin, and Swift pointing a gun at the head of the Government, saying that if they would not reduce the cost of living and raise the wages of workers they would throw down the gauntlet.

DEFENCE POLICY. Mr. Little, Fianna Fail had said that a note of warning had been sent to the people who would be properly protected should trouble come our way.

Fail did not think this was wise, but the Coalition had chosen to do it and they were bound to accept the challenge. They were putting forward candidates in the interests of the country as a whole, because they believed that they are the best people to implement the schemes which Fianna Fail initiated. When the elections come in September the people should realise that these are the right candidates to carry on the work so well done by Fianna Fail.

"IN A SCANDALOUS POSITION." Referring to the tourist trade, which, he said, amounted to between £20 million and £30 million a year, Mr. Little stated that there was a very large attendance in the present tourist administration. The tourist trade would employ a very much and it would mean good employment and prosperity if they were developed on proper lines.

FINE GAEL OPPOSITION. Dr. James Ryan, T.D., said that Fianna Fail's social and economic policy had come from Sinn Fein. In the old days Sinn Fein meant self-reliance but it came to mean self-sufficiency. Their object was to employ as many people as possible on the land and in industry at a remunerative figure. If that policy had been pursued as vigorously as during the Fianna Fail regime it would absorb the people of this country and there would be no need for further emigration.

Aga Tells Her Dramatic Story

Last week ended the three thousand mile flight from Liberia of 18-year-old German girl, Aga Muller, to be greeted by crowds of warm-hearted Irish at Dublin airport. The fact that this galant girl, who had gone through so much hardship and sorrow, had chosen Ireland from the countries of the world to find some period of peace caught the imagination of a generous people.

Casting aside vague offers of payment for her dramatic story made by world agencies and British newspapers—for the solid offer of a flight and refuge and the biggest sum of money an Irish paper has ever paid for a feature, Aga flew straight to Ireland of a frightened child runs to home.

"I will speak to none but the Irish," she told newspapermen at every airport at which she was questioned, and in Dublin when she faced the cheering crowd who had gathered to welcome her the lonely girl's tears released all the pent-up sorrow for her father's harrowing death at the helm of the little boat, "Berlin," off the African coast.

Aga clutched as her most treasured possession on the log of the boat "Berlin," in which she had set out in simple graph style all the incidents of storm and calm; hunger and thirst; danger and rescue; that occurred on her daring voyage with that strange man, Paul Muller.

She tells her story in "The Irish Press" (beginning on Saturday, August 5), giving in full her early life in a German town by ruthless war; as a refugee child swept from her home in bombed Berlin, and the lonely, daring voyage with her father, her lone struggle with marauding Africans; her sailing alone in the storm-tossed dinghy bearing her father's body to the Liberian grave.
