DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

Mr. Thomas McCarthy, Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the above on Friday.

Also present: Messrs. M. Clancy, N. Kelly, and J. Goode.

Application for House.—The Council decided to make a recommendation to the Manager to give the first available Council house to a man named Kearney, who appeared before the meeting. The applicant said that he had partly built a house in Slate Lane some years ago. Then he had to go to England, and during his absence his wife had to go to hospital. The Council took over this house and demolished it.

The Clerk stated that this man's application was not on the original list.

Mr. Clancy said this case and others show the urgent necessity for building. This man is in a sad plight, but the only thing we can do is to recommend him for a house.

Chairman—Yes, the Council will do their best and keep your case in mind if anything turns up.

John Cowman, King St., Abbeyside, also appeared before the meeting and stated he was living in a condemned house.

To the Chairman, he said his application was late, as he was not married and did not apply at first.

To Mr. Goode—The house I am in is condemned but not yet demolished.

Chairman—I am afraid we can do nothing in this case.

Manager's Orders: £200 Grant from the Department notifying a grant of £200 to the Council on the Council agreeing to put up the sum of £115.

The Manager's order accepted the grant, and asked for the Council's views on what work the grant is to be expended.

The Council approved the Manager's order.

Harbour Buys.—The tender of Mr. P. Kenneally for cleaning and painting the harbour buoys for the sum of £30 was accepted by the Manager.

Letting of Town Hall.—The Manager approved the letting of the Town Hall to the dance committee of the D. Mens Leather Co. Benevolent Society on 28th December.

Letting of Houses.—The Manager notified the Council that houses numbered 9 to 11, T. J. Murphy Place, Abbeyside, were let to John O'Donnell, Stranstraw, and Francis Daly, Newline.

Reference was again made by the Chairman and Mr. O'Sullivan to the delay in providing Michael Power, King Street, with a house. Mr. O'Sullivan declaring that his case was really the worst of the lot.

The case is to be brought to the Manager's notice again.

Loan to Be Sought.—The Council decided to seek a loan for the purchase of four houses at Newline, Abbeyside, and six houses at Shandon Street, the property of C.I.E. and 24 per house, respectively, arising from the Manager's order to purchase same with a view to reconstruction.

Mr. O'Sullivan proposed that the Council approve the raising of the loan on the security of the construction of houses at Stranstraw South, King Street, Newline and Shandon Street, Abbeyside, and at St. Bridget Street and Shandon, Dungarvan.

Mr. Clancy—Raise the loan and get this work done as quickly as we can. You can see the demand for houses even at this meeting.

Mr. Goode—It is very necessary and the rents will be fairly economical.

Speed Limit and Parking.—When the Clerk had read correspondence dealing with the proposed to be adopted for the enforcing of a speed limit through the town, which will include the holding of a public enquiry by the Minister, Mr. Goode asked who will be responsible for the cost of the enquiry.

Mr. Kelly—The ratemayers, I presume.

Mr. Clancy suggested adjourning this matter for the new Council to deal with.

Chairman—I think we should deal with it now. One life saved would be worth whatever the enquiry would cost.

Mr. Goode said the white lines at present are a bit of a nuisance, as some motorists cut across them.

Chairman—Yes, I saw cars cut across from Dunlea's corner, and I saw a man get his arm broken as a result of a car cutting across at Tommy Flynn's corner, which caused a cyclist and pedestrian to collide.

Mr. O'Sullivan said he saw a motor cyclist who must have been going at least 60 miles per hour going through Mitchell St.

Mr. Clancy—A local man?
