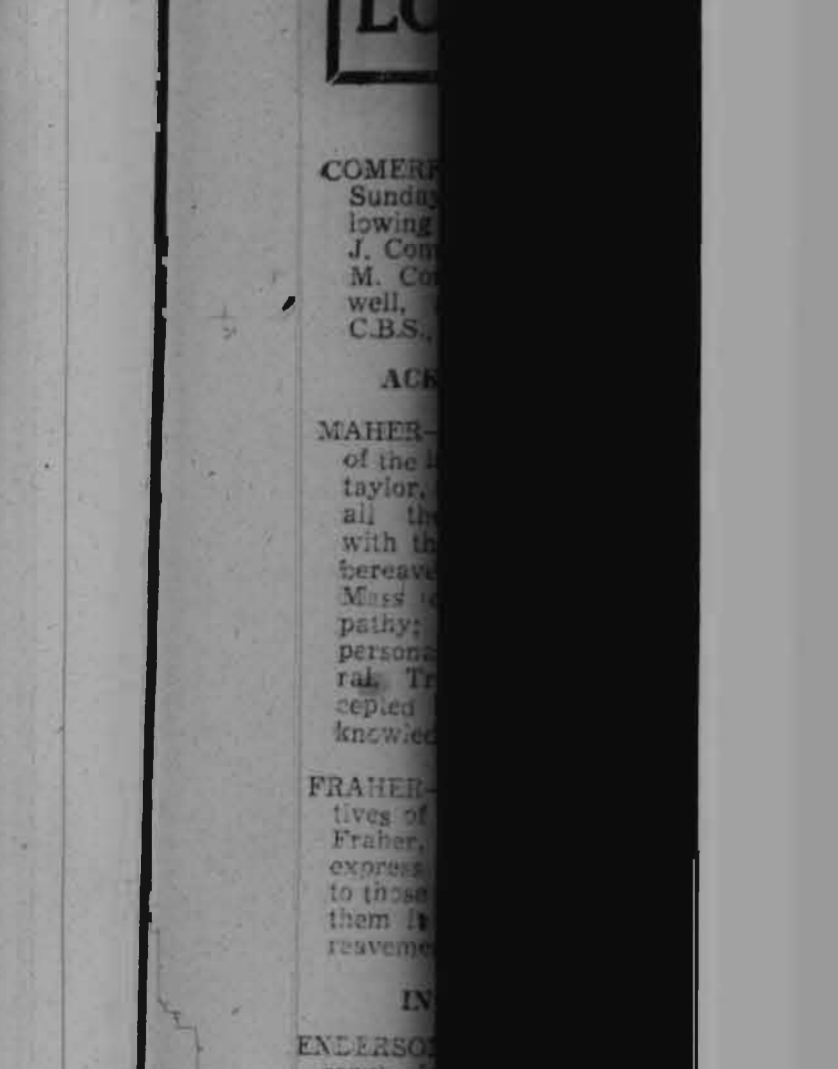

KILROSSANTY RETAIN SENIOR FOOTBALL TITLE

OLD PARISH'S GALLANT EFFORT

KILROSSANTY retained their senior football title on Sunday last at Dungarvan when they beat Old Parish in the county final by 1-5 to 0-2, thus giving the historic parish and home of numerous brilliant footballers over the years, its fifth championship win, the others being 1888, 1919, 1939 and 1949.

Sunday's team, though favourites for the final after their convincing wins over Stradally and Dungarvan, had to fight every inch against last year's junior champions but less experienced and younger Old Parish sides. The giant Kilrossanty backs—the Maguire brothers (Dick and Monnie) and John Lonergan in the full line, supported by John (Cheasty) Lonergan, Mick Pendergast and Jack Kirwan in the half-line proved an unsurmountable obstacle for the Old Parish side. The latter were only able to register two points while playing with a strong wind in the first half. Pats Fitzgerald in goal, hero of the 1939 and '49 wins, was up to his best form and cleared with ease when called upon. Star man of the game was Paddy Fitzgerald at midfield, the well-known inter-county player. He was cheered to the echo for his magnificent overhead fielding, grand solo runs and long kicking and Sunday's performance stamps him as one of the county's premier footballers. He was ably supported by Jimmy Power. The forwards gave a good performance in the first half and the tally of 1-2-0-2 in favour of the green and gold proves they made the most of their opportunities and shot wide from very good positions.

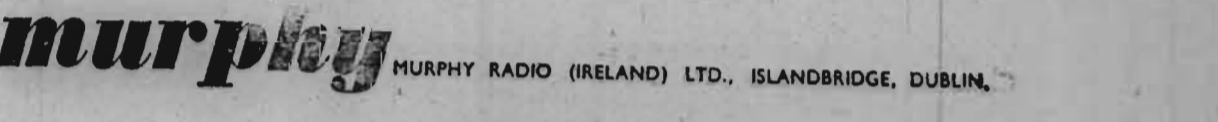
