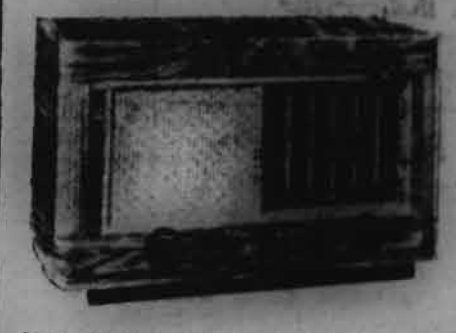

## DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

Mr. T. Lannon, chairman, presided at the first ordinary meeting of the Urban Council held on Friday last. Other members present were—Messrs. M. J. Keane, P. O'Dwyer, T. A. Casey, Senator J. Butler, T. A. Kneen, T. D. McCarthy, T. Lee, N. Kelly, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, Manager Mr. E. Williams, Council's solicitor, and Mr. Foley (Messrs. Buchan, Keane and Foley, architects) were also in attendance.

**House Damaged.**—Mr. T. C. Williams, solr. to the council, wrote stating that as the houses adjoining Mrs. Kieley's house at Castle Street were not demolished by council workmen, the council are not liable for any damage caused to Mrs. Kieley's house.

**Chairman.**—You would think, if it's by a council order the houses were demolished, that the council are responsible.

**Members.**—The members of the old council were unanimous that justice should be done by Mrs. Kieley and the council should be responsible.

**Mr. Lee.**—When the council made this order why was not their engineer there?

**Chairman.**—I presume he was there.

**The Clerk.**—The legal view is that as the houses were knocked by the owners the council are not responsible.

**Mr. McCarthy.**—I referred to cases previously in which repairs were carried out but would not give any names.

**Mr. O'Dwyer.**—I stated that repairs were done in Abbeyside recently in a similar case.

**The Clerk.**—The council pointed out that in the Abbeyside case the demolition was done by council employees.

**Manager.**—Surely the council cannot be held responsible. The action should be against the people who knocked the adjoining houses down.

**Mr. Casey.**—I suggested making further inquiries into the cases mentioned by Mr. McCarthy, if Mr. McCarthy would give the names to the Clerk privately.

**Mr. McCarthy.**—I said he had no authority to give the names.

The matter ended.

are living as lodgers in one room. The Clerk informed the applicant that as his name was not on the original list he could not get a house.

**Mr. Lee.**—It is very unfair. This unfortunate man is compelled to live in a house with three other families. If you are a Christian man you can get nothing. Other people can come in and get houses.

**Mr. O'Dwyer.**—I said to his mind the system of giving the houses from the start was all wrong.

**It was decided to keep the applicant in mind if a house is available.**

**Drogheda Resolution.**—The following resolution was read from the Drogheda U.D.C.—“That the council request the Minister for Local Government to have legislation introduced fixing a figure of 25 as the maximum poor law valuation to be applied to all houses erected in urban areas or adjacent thereto under the Housing of the Working Classes Act and that this Poor Law Valuation apply to all artizan houses erected since the year 1948.”

**Mr. Casey.**—I proposed that the resolution be marked read.

**Mr. Kneen.**—I am in favour of the resolution and would like to have the figure down to 25. He is in thorough agreement with the spirit of the resolution. This is a matter for which there is no appeal, unless you take them to the court.

**Purchase of Houses.**—The following resolution was read:—“That the council approve the purchase from Coras Lompair Eireann for the sum of £10 each, of the following houses at each Abbeyside—No. 785 vacant; 787 occupied by Thos. Beatty; 787 occupied by James Donovan, and 788 vacant, and that the necessary money be raised by the council for making the said houses fit for human habitation. The engineer's estimate for this was: 785, £138; 786, £90; 787, £114; and 788, £151.”

**Senator Butler.**—It's a very good proposition to purchase these houses.

**Mr. O'Dwyer.**—I asked if the repairs included lavatory accommodation?

**Senator Butler.**—I asked that when the repairs are completed, the two vacant houses be first repaired and the shifted in while those two are being repaired.

**Manager's Orders to be Circulated to Members.**—When the Clerk read out the many orders made by the Manager since the previous meeting of the council, the Chairman stated that it would not be better if those orders were circulated to the members in advance of the meeting. This would give the members a chance to study what the orders are.

**Mr. Keane.**—If it proves too costly I would be opposed to it.

**Mr. Casey's resolution** was then passed.

**Lodgers in Council Houses.**—Replying to Mr. Keane, the Clerk stated that there is a definite order that a tenant of a council house cannot take in a lodger.

**Manager.**—That is one of the conditions in the letting agreement.

**In Search of a House.**—A young man named Kieley, who appeared before the meeting, asked if there was any chance of his obtaining a council house at Abbeyside. He is married and his wife, family and himself,

**Scrannan's Lane Houses.**—The council next considered the advisability of acquiring five houses at Scrannan's Lane, which were owned by Miss Mooney, and offered to the council at £2 each. The estimated cost of repairs to make the five houses fit for occupation given by the engineer is £900.

**Senator Butler.**—This would be a good proposition.

**Mr. Casey.**—I propose that the Chairman and myself be let negotiate that deal.

**Mr. McCarthy.**—On whose behalf?

**Mr. Casey.**—On behalf of the council.

**Chairman.**—Do you agree to Mr. Casey's proposition?

**Mr. Keane.**—Certainly, if you think you can do better, but you must remember you can't give any more.

**Mr. Casey.**—In connection with the item on the agenda for approval of over-expenditure of £60 for the purchase of three new ranges for council tenantry under the usual conditions, that the tenants pay half the cost spread over a period.

**The engineer's report** stated that the applicants—Patrick Beglan 4 Connolly Row, and Jas. Byrne, Keating Street, had old ranges installed by themselves and in poor condition. The third applicant, J. Morrissey, 19 St. Thomas's Terrace, had a range installed by the council which is now working very badly. He estimated the cost of replacement with three new ranges at £60, for which special provision would have to be made.

**Mr. Casey.**—Refer this back to the next estimates meeting.

**Mr. Kneen.**—I propose that these people be accommodated as others were.

**Mr. McCarthy.**—I hold that all those things should be left over

for the next estimate and that there should be no over-expenditure.

**Senator Butler.**—I always advocated that at every estimates meeting but always found it an impossibility to put into practice.

**Mr. Keane.**—What is the cost to the council?

**Chairman.**—Would you agree to adjourn it to the estimates meeting?

**Mr. McCarthy.**—If the estimates meeting was the next meeting that would be all right, but how are those people to remain all through the winter without a fire?

**Mr. Lee.**—Can't they install electric fires and toast their toes?

**The Chairman.**—I would be in favour of granting this, but asked the council to put their feet down on any further over-expenditure until the estimates meeting.

**The over-expenditure** was approved.

**Additional Lights.**—The council next considered the question of additional public lights on Abbeyside Bridge and at Youghal Road.

**The engineer's report** on the suggestion agreed that a light would be very desirable at Youghal Road. Moving an existing light would not meet the existing light but there is an existing pole which would be necessary.

**Mr. Casey.**—I proposed that this be referred back to the estimates meeting.

**Mr. Kneen.**—I said that the people in those houses are ratepayers as well as others and he proposed that the light be put there.

**Mr. O'Dwyer.**—I suggested putting the light at Youghal Road and leaving the one on Abbeyside bridge in abeyance for the present.

**Mr. O'Dwyer.**—I would not agree to this, and held the light on the bridge was necessary for navigation.

**Mr. Curran.**—Harbour master, asked that if the light be put on the bridge that a green shade be put on it to warn of the light.

**After further discussion** it was suggested by the Chairman that a committee of the council go around the town and see where lights are necessary or otherwise another suggestion was that the engineer be asked to report on the necessity for the light placed further out on the Youghal Road.

**S.S. "Beachfield."**—An item on the agenda asked for approval of raising a further amount required for the alleged damage to the s.s. "Beachfield".

**The Clerk,** referring to the damage to the s.s. "Beachfield", stated that she had already raised a sum of £5,500, but this was not enough. The award for damages was £2,877 17s. plus expenses, totaling £2,721 10s., making a net total of £8,377 13s.

**Senator Butler.**—I recalled the fact that the owners sought damages to the extent of £10,000, and that after all their defence they were held responsible.

**The Chairman.**—I had been stated that the case was based on the chat he had with the captain.

**The Harbour Master** went on to state that as far back as 1918 he requested the council to cover the harbour with insurance to safeguard against such risks. They failed to do this because they could not get a company that would take the risk. He stated that since the accident they had vessels berthed all over the quay and there was no damage because there was really no great danger there. "The only danger that he could see was about one of the banks of mud was that it was rather hard down underneath it."

**After a discussion,** it was agreed that the details of all costs would be available at the office for anybody anxious to see them.

**Deputy Kneen and Senator Butler** stated that they had no opinion but to raise the further loan, but they added that they would like to have seen that list, as requested by Mr. Casey, issued for all to see just what the whole affair did cost. It would show many that it cost those who gave evidence a good deal of their own money.

**Considering the provision** of an indemnity fund in lieu of insurance on the harbour, it was stated that they had tried since 1948 to get insurance to cover risks such as the "Beachfield" case but had failed. They had now the opportunity of covering the risk by means of £250 per

year and paying the first £50 when the timbers were examined some were found to be worm-eaten. This would mean replacement of the damaged timber work and covering over which would run to £1,000 or probably more. He then discussed the condition of the walls on top where the roof rested and which required steel bracing. He discussed the matter with everyone concerned, and it was his opinion that to do the above work would amount to £1,000, throwing away about £1,000. The tender for the new roof with iron girders for strengthening the wall was roughly about £2,000, and the rest was made up of electrical and other works.

**He and his partners** were quite convinced that there was no other alternative except to build a new Town Hall, which he estimated that for £200,000 you would still only have a very ordinary building. A more elaborate one would run to £400,000.

**Senator Butler** said that after hearing the architect all would see that the council had no other option but to put on a new roof.

**Chairman.**—They could make the roof secure for £200.

**Mr. Casey.**—We could have repaired the Town Hall for £200. It's the first time we heard that.

**Mr. Foley, architect.**—Yes, but in another five years or less it would be another £200 and the present roof will last for 100 years.

**Following further protracted discussion,** Mr. Foley told Mr. Kneen that he thought the temporary lavatories and cloak-rooms suggested by him would meet the requirements of the Superintendent and C.M.O.H. Mr. Keane asked the architect if he had considered putting the entrance stairs inside the street wall if feasible. The space occupied by the present stairs and landing could be utilised for lavatories or cloakrooms.

**The Chairman** suggested that the County M.O.H., the Superintendent, the architect, the solicitor and the Manager should meet at the Town Hall on the following morning and discuss the whole position.

**Mr. Casey** seconded and suggested that any member of the council available should also attend.

This was approved.
