Towards this end the Committee will allocate at least two-fifths of the available premiums to that breed, but of the total number of Premium Bulls of all ages to stand in the County for 1951, the proportions of Dairy Shorthorns must not be less than the corresponding proportion in the year 1950.

The Committee will, if necessary, take other special steps, as they may deem effective to secure that at least this proportion of premiums is fully available to Cow-Testing Associations and Co-Operative Societies can compete for the Premiums.

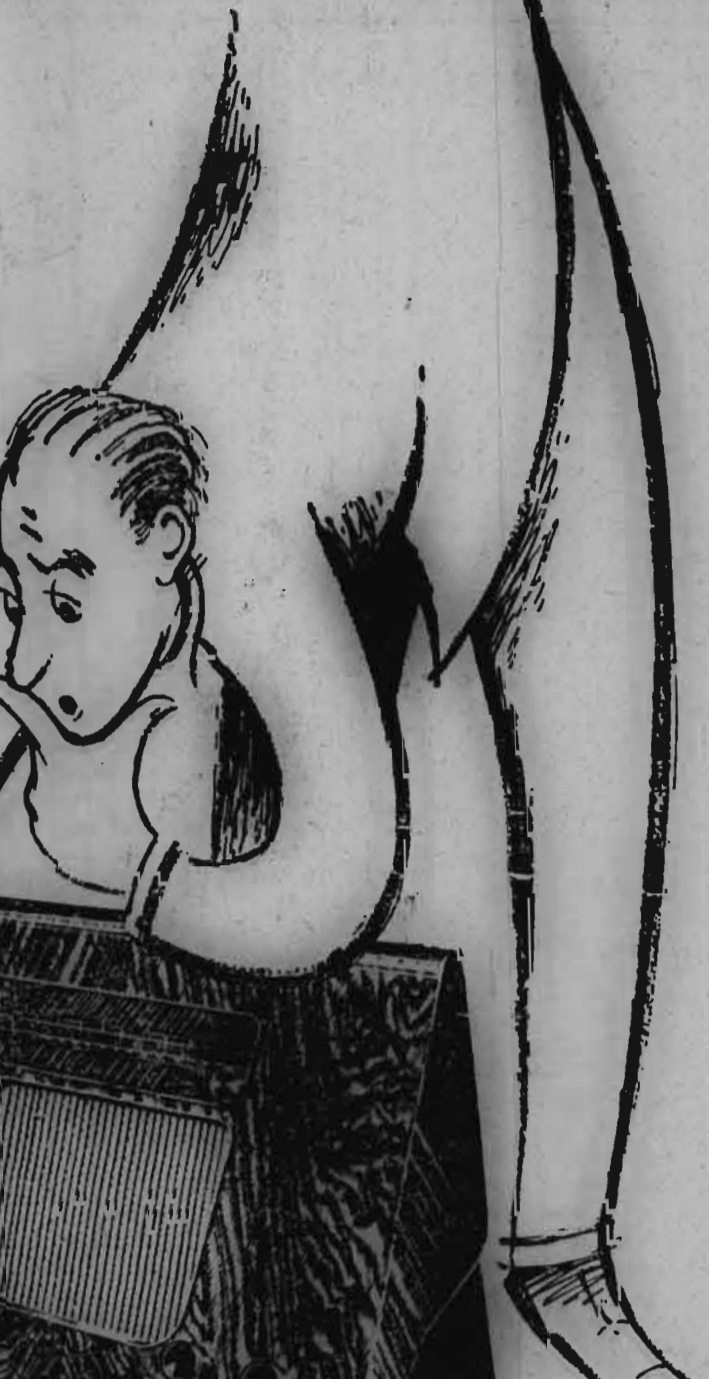
