Poultry Development Scheme, 1950/51 THE County Committee of Agriculture will, within the expenditure limits of money available for the purpose, make grants on the following scale to suitable persons resident in County Waterford in respect of the following: (a) A grant of £6 towards the erection of a Chicken House of not less than 60 square feet floor area, and a grant of £10 towards a Chicken House of 100 square feet floor area or more. (b) A grant of £2 towards the cost of a Night Ark of approved pattern having floor area of at least 18 square feet. (c) A grant of £3 towards the cost of a rooster. (d) A grant of 10/- towards the cost of a Brooder Heater. Applicants will not be awarded grants for more than one of each item of accommodation and equipment, and any applicant who receives a grant last year in the year 1948/49 will not be selected for a similar grant in the present year. (e) A grant of 10/- per lamp towards the cost of one or two "infra red" Electric Lamps (the necessary suspension unit and surround being available), the following grants may be given as an alternative to (c) and (d) above:— (e) A grant of 30/- towards the cost of a complete Brooding Unit comprising a minimum of 200 chicks and costing at least 65/- per unit. (f) A grant of 10/- per lamp towards the cost of one or two "infra red" Electric Lamps (the necessary suspension unit and surround being available). In regard to the grants at (f) not more than two grants of 10/- each may be awarded to any one applicant. Moreover, it is understood that grants in respect of this type of unit or its component parts are intended as an alternative to the grants available for hovers or brooder heaters, and persons who have already obtained grants under the Scheme in respect of the latter items will not be again selected for the grants now made available towards the cost of "infra red" equipment. Nominations To Mares, 1951 THE County Committee have decided to offer Nominations to Farmers' Mares to be served by Thoroughbred, Irish Draught or Half-bred Stallions on the Register of the Department of Agriculture, under the conditions set forth in the Department's Scheme for encouraging improvement in the Breeds of Horses, 1951. The following are the Centres and the days and hours at which Mares will be judged in each district:— Dungarvan—At Shandon, on Tuesday, 6th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Clonmel No. 2—At Ballymacorney, on Wednesday, 7th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Carrick-on-Suir—At Clonea-Power, on Thursday, 8th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Waterford No. 1—At Ballybricken, on Friday, 9th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Kilmachomas—At Kilmachomas, on Thursday, 8th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Lismore—At Lismore Show Field, on Wednesday, 7th February, at 1 o'clock p.m. Carrick-on-Suir—At Clonea-Power, on Thursday, 8th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. Waterford No. 1—At Ballybricken, on Friday, 9th February, at 11 o'clock a.m. The value of Nominations to Thoroughbred and Irish Draught Stallions shall be £3, and to Half-bred Stallions, £2. Preference will be given to the best young mares under six years of age. An Entry Form shall not be accepted in respect of any mare which, having received a Nomination in 1949 and 1950, proved in both seasons to be barren, nor shall such a mare be eligible for exhibition for nomination purposes in any future year unless the owner produces satisfactory evidence that the mare has become fruitful. Each Mare must be the property of a Farmer the Tenement Valuation of whose Holding or Holdings, wherever situated and for which he is rated, does not exceed £200. As far as possible, two-thirds of the nominations shall be reserved for Farmers of £50 valuation or under. The term "Farmer" is to be understood to mean the person who derives his means of living mainly from farming. Special attention is directed to the following Regulations:— 1.—Nominations as are rated for holdings within the county are eligible to exhibit Mares. (N.B.—This regulation does not apply to holders of 2.—Each qualified rated farmer is entitled to compete for a Nomination for one Mare only, but the Committee may award a second Nomination to Owners of Mares on the Reserved List. 3.—SPECIAL NOTICE.—Any person found (a) exhibiting a Mare not his bona fide property; (b) attempting to obtain more than one Nomination through any misrepresentation as to Ownership of his Mares; or (c) sending for service a Mare other than the one in respect of which the Nomination was awarded, is guilty of a Criminal Offence, and will be prosecuted. County Libraries Committee

The December meeting of the County Waterford Libraries Committee was held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Monday, 18th December. Present—Professor O'Hara, B.A., acting chairman; Rev. J. Corbett, P.P.; Mrs. Fisher, Mrs. N. Kelly, Mr. C.C. R. Walsh and J. McCarthy.

Books on Irish History.—Mr. McCarthy gave it as his opinion that the number of books of a suitable nature on Irish history available at centres was insufficient. He admitted that there was a representative selection of reference books available but what the public wanted was books of "novel" style dealing with certain specific periods. His proposition, as follows, was endorsed by Mr. Kelly, M.C.C., who stated that the reading of books on recent Irish history had also been encouraged.

That at least six suitable periods of Irish history be circulated to all public centres and that a list of books available on Irish history should be prepared for the next meeting.—Fr. Corbett, P.P., Dungarvan, Norman, 1603-1650, Penit. Laws, Catholic Emancipation, Parnell and Land League, Modern Ireland. Mr. McCarthy also said that a copy of the Diocese of Ross and West Cork, by Fr. O'Hanlon, should be available also in every centre.

Mr. Tierney, who attended the meeting on behalf of the County Librarian, who was ill, pointed out that several catalogues, which included an Irish history section, had been compiled already and circulated to centres and that a circular in the terms mentioned by Fr. Corbett was circulated annually.

Mr. Kelly concluded the business of the meeting by wishing the Librarian a very happy Christmas. The committee trusted that Mr. Murphy would soon be recovered from his illness. Orders made by the County Manager since the last previous meeting were available for inspection.

Other terms on the agenda were deferred to the February meeting.

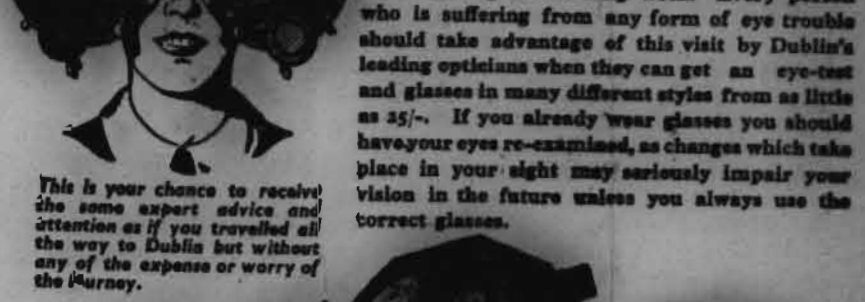

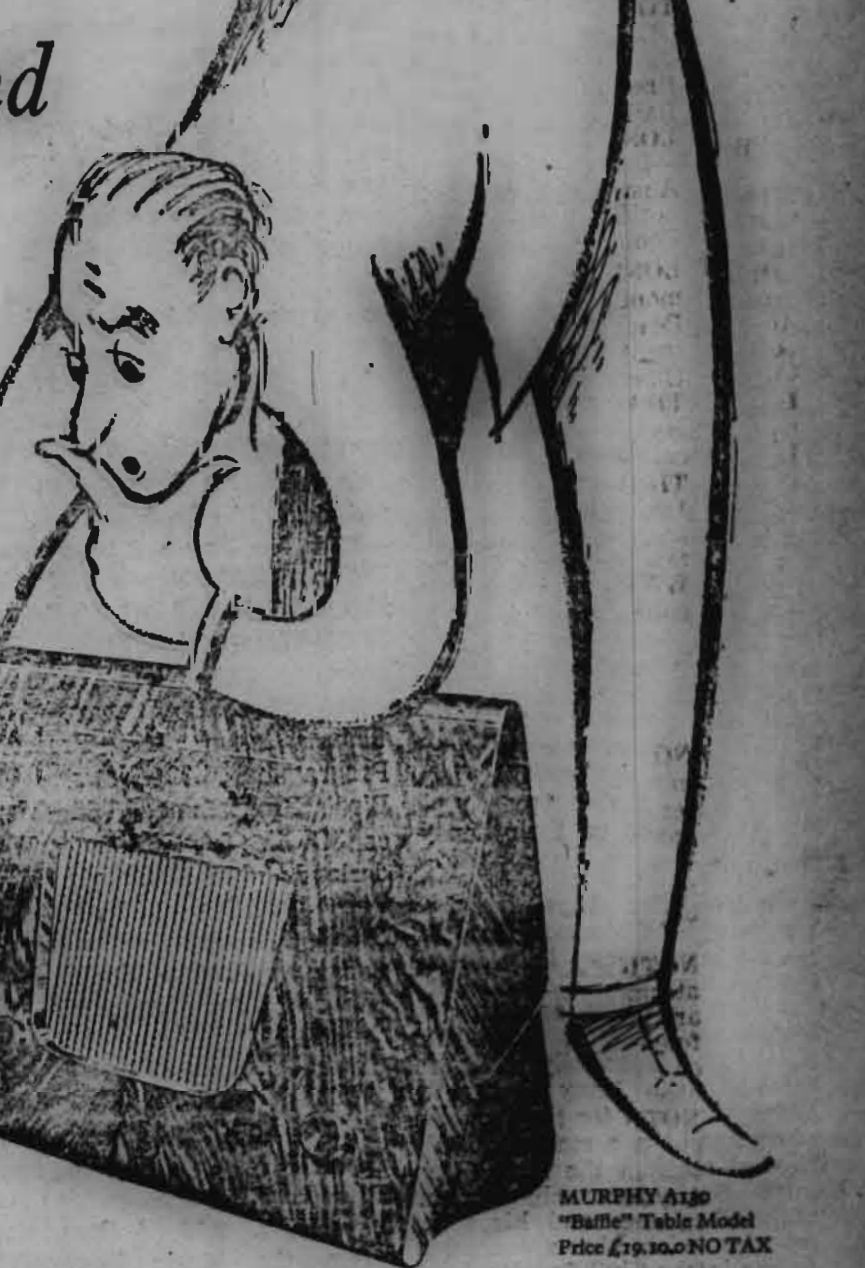
