### BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

**AWARDING OF GRATUITY.**  
The Board's recommendation that a gratuity be granted to the widow of Mr. James McGrath, Assistant Officer, was again discussed.

The Secretary stated that he had received a letter from the Department of Local Government in which it was stated that "Mr. McGrath was an established officer the award of a gratuity under Section 28 of the Local Government (Superannuation) Act, 1948, is not subject to sanction. If he was not an established officer there is no statutory authority for the award of a gratuity."

Mr. McGrath said the Secretary, "did not come under the Superannuation Act." Mr. McGrath said the Board be in a position to grant a gratuity.

Secretary—Not without sanction. The Secretary informed Mr. Heskin that Mr. McGrath had 41 years' service.

Mr. Heskin—How was it that he was not an established officer? Secretary—He was over 60 years when the Superannuation Act came into operation.

Mr. Heskin—After giving such long service it is very unfair to his widow that some consideration should not be given to her at this stage.

Mr. Heskin—If he had been an established officer would his widow get a gratuity?

Secretary—Yes, in every instance. Mr. Heskin—You are not entitled to make any allowance without sanction. You already have a recommendation but it was not sanctioned.

Mr. Heskin—We should not leave the matter so at that. We should make a further recommendation.

The Chairman next congratulated the divisional winners, St. Augustine's, who won out in Senior Football and minor football, and in minor hurling to be beaten narrowly by Na Risiq in the County Final. Ardmore secured the starry pennant in the Junior football, winning the Western Final after a drawn game with Valley Rovers. The Chairman next congratulated Con. 1949 Junior Champions, in winning the senior hurling crown, and said Turin's victory was a most fitting tribute to the proverb, "Where there's a will, there's a way."

In conclusion, the Chairman said he wished to thank all the board's officials who had held him during his short term of office in the chair, the Secretary, Treasurer, and all the club secretaries, Rev. Brother Murray, who has been transferred to Trale; recently, Rev. Bro. Murray was one of the County Minor selectors and his loss to this county will be keenly felt. The Chairman next, on behalf of the assembled Gaels, offered sincere sympathy to all those who had suffered bereavements during the year, and in a special manner to the relatives of the late Moss Conery, Piltown, whom he said was one of the county's greatest Gaels.

**Munster Council Chairman Complimented.**—The Secretary, referring to the presence of the Munster Council Chairman, Mr. M. V. O'Donoghue, E.B., at the meeting, referred to him as one of the leading lights of the G.A.A. in the country. He said he was delighted that the Munster Council Chairman thought it fitting to come to our meeting, and on behalf of the Gaels assembled he wished to extend to him a very hearty welcome.

### D.J.'s. TRIBUTE TO GARDAI

#### Fine and Ban on Driver

The evidence of Sergt. Casey, Garda Foran and Garda Hannon, all of the local station, had set a standard in cases like this that could not be surpassed by anybody in this country, said Justice F. J. MacCabe, at Waterford District Court when giving his decision in a case in which Laurence Vesale, a farmer, of Ballyshannock, Co. Waterford, was charged with driving a motor car while drunk at 2 a.m. on December 10th last at the Quay. Although the defendant had made a good impression in the witness box, the evidence of the three Civic Guards, he declared, was objective, fair, impartial, honest and obviously truthful.

Garda Foran stated that while on duty at the Quay he observed a car making circles at the Clock Tower, stalling and then approaching in the direction of the fair bridge. Suddenly the car came to a halt outside the Bank of Ireland. The driver got out, staggered in front of the engine, which was running all the time, and then got into the car and was about to drive away when he was ordered by witness to stop. He refused to leave the car but witness took the key from him and drove him to the barracks where he staggered on his way to the dayroom. He talked in a thick and indistinct voice, suggesting that it was witness who was drunk and not he.

Dr. V. J. White said that he was defendant through the usual tests which he failed to carry out to his satisfaction, and when a bright light was flashed in his eyes the pupils did not contract and plainly indicated imbibement of alcohol.

Cross-examined by Mr. M. Fitzley, solicitor, defending, Dr. White stated that in his opinion defendant had an excessive amount of alcohol.

Sergt. Casey and Garda Hannon gave corroborative evidence. Defendant stated that he had only two hours' sleep from Friday morning to midnight on Sunday and was tired and weary. He admitted taking some alcoholic drink, but denied he was drunk.

Stating that these were always sad cases, the Justice imposed a fine of £2 18s., allowing £2 2s. expenses and suspending the defendant's driving licence for 12 months.
