were at a complete standstill. Not only that, added, but there were many homes throughout the country dependent on coal for light and poultry breeders, too, were unable to use their incubators.

All members were in agreement when Mr. Harkin stated that the Government should take immediate steps to ensure that a supply of oil was made available for the farmers of the country. It was decided to send a resolution to that effect to the Minister for Industry and Commerce and to the Minister for Agriculture.

CHARGE FOR USE OF SCHOOL.

The committee discussed a claim for £3 in respect of 38 hours use of the Ballynemeela School. 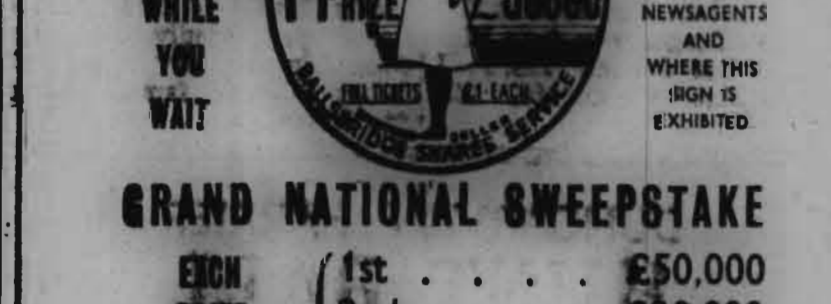
