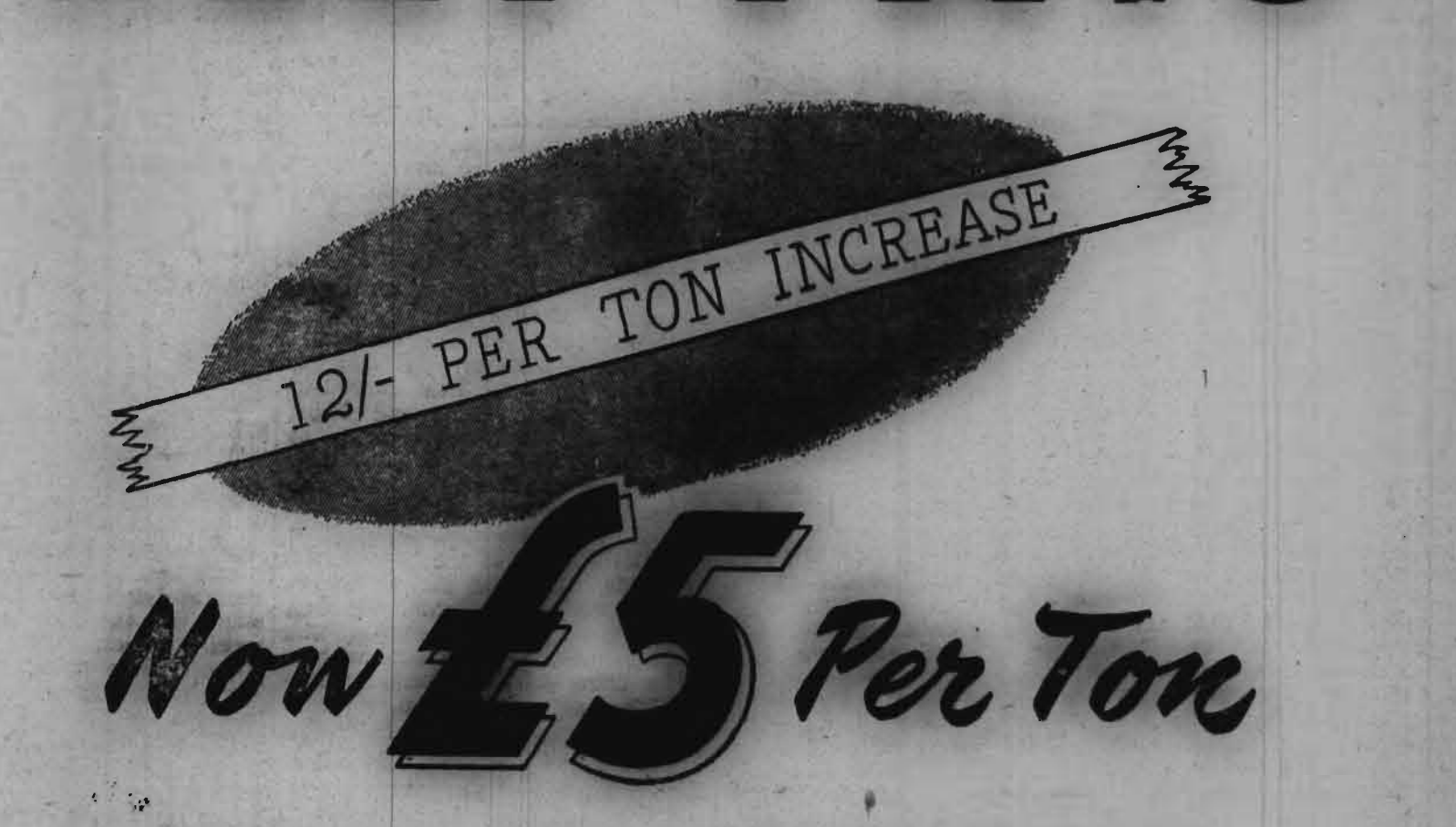

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

LABOUR PARTY MEETING. Mr. Thomas McCarthy, U.D.C., president at the monthly meeting of the Labour Party, Dungarvan Branch, held on Sunday last, February 4th. The Secretary, Mr. D. McGrath, referred to the practice of loading cattle from the high footpath outside the Parish Church on to lorries. He said: "In my opinion this is a case of extreme cruelty to the unfortunate animals and the scenes witnessed there at times should not be tolerated in any community." Mr. P. Lyons agreed with Mr. McGrath and said that not so long ago one of the cattle being loaded on to a lorry had gone completely mad. Serious injury to somebody could have been the result. Mr. J. McCarthy also spoke against this practice and referred to the plea made recently by His Holiness The Pope for merciful consideration in the treatment of animals. Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., said that he would raise this matter at the next meeting of the U.D.C. and press for some temporary structure to be provided until such time as a proper loading bay was erected in the town. QUAY STREET SEWERAGE. Mr. P. Whelan complained that the stench arising from the sewerage pipes laid in this street. They would enquire at next meeting of the Council. The Secretary was also informed last Mass.

IMPORTANT

IRISH SUGAR BEET GROWERS' ASSOCIATION. The new price of £5 per ton for sugar beet of 15 1/2% sugar, fixed for the 1951 crop, after negotiations between the above Association and the Irish Sugar Company represents an increase of 12-4 per ton over last year's price. It is the opinion of the Association that this is a fair and economic price under present conditions. It strongly recommends its members to grow sufficient beet to earn the special bonus of 4/- per ton offered by the Company, if the total production reaches 700,000 tons. That this tonnage can be produced without any reduction in the stock carrying-capacity of farms is evident to the Association, from the experience of Carlow and South Kildare growers who have substituted sugar beet for almost the entire mangel and turnip acreage previously grown. Moreover, this change in the farming system need not entail any substantial increase in labour. The Association wishes to impress on members that costings have shown that there is no profit in low yielding crops and that the higher yield the higher the profit per ton. Growers are, therefore, advised to ensure that the crop is adequately manured and that lime is applied where necessary. The Factories can handle 100,000 tons of sugar beet more than was grown last year. This means that there is available a guaranteed market for 1,000,000 worth of sugar beet this season.
