## INCREASE IN ROAD WORKS ESTIMATE

QUARTERLY MEETING.

Mr. Denis Heakin, chairman, presided at the quarterly meeting of the above on Monday last. Other members present were Messrs. J. Campion, D. Leahy, vice-chairman; J. Fahey, F. Roche, N. Walsh, J. Quirk, M. McGrath, T. A. Kyne, T.D.; Senator Butler, S. Norris, E. Power, M. Morrissey, Wm. Kennedy, M. Hartly, J. Ormonde, T.D.; J. Kirwan, N. Kelly, Liam Morrissey, R. Barron, P. Butler and Thomas Power.

Mr. S. J. Moynihan, County Manager, Mr. D. Sheedy, County Engineer, and Assistants, Mr. S. J. Dowling, Secretary, and Mrs. L. Walsh, Assistant Secretary, were also present.

**Lismore/Cappoquin Water Supply.**—The Chairman and Messrs. Walsh and Campion wanted to know if there was a report on the above supply as requested at the previous meeting.

**Secretary.**—Yes. It came by registered letter this morning from Messrs. McNamara, architects.

The Secretary then read the report which was long, covering many pages of manuscript, and dealing in a detailed manner not only with Cappoquin/Lismore, but the various extensions suggested thereto from Affane to Ballydoon. The scheme will be serviced from four reservoirs with a total storage capacity of 200,000 gallons. The original estimate for the scheme was £64,500, the additional extensions now bringing the estimate to £128,000.

**Mr. Walsh.**—This is a detailed report, but it doesn't tell us what we asked on the last day. When will the work, the pick and shovel work, start on the scheme? The Chairman asked if the members could have a copy of the report, which he held was too detailed for proper consideration by hearing it read.

**Mr. Leahy** asked Mr. Walsh. **Chairman.**—The position of the water supply in Lismore is serious.

**Mr. Kyne** said he is informed that a tank on top of the highest house in the Main Street is always full. He referred to leaks in the main and to one in which he said there was a division of 4 inches in the pipe.

**Mr. Campion** agreed as to the leaks, which he held are now being tackled in a proper manner by the tests being carried out by Mr. Foye, B.E. He referred to the open drainage system, which he held was not sufficient to meet the demands of the heavy carry traffic, the pipes passing over such drains being bent or cracked.

The County Engineer told Mr. Campion that the original Lismore/Cappoquin Scheme was passed, but then the extensions were brought in holding up that scheme.

**Mr. Campion.**—What I can't understand is, there was never any trouble with the Lismore water supply until the County Council took it over.

**Mr. Walsh.**—As far as I can see, it will take two to three years before this scheme is started so he would suggest looking to a local scheme they were attacked by a daily newspaper for "not living within their means."

**Roads Taken Over by Council.**—The Council moved two notices of motion asking the council to take over and maintain 1,150 perches of road from Harney's Cross to Glendalough and 200 perches of road through Russelstown Wood to County Road at Kilmoran.

ity for the council to take over both roads before they are allowed to deteriorate into a condition where it will cost thousands to repair them, Mr. Fahey said the Russelstown/Kilmoran road is already done under a Special Employment Grant.

**Mr. Sheedy**, County Engineer, said that on Harney's Cross/Glendalough road the council will have to do something as it will be required under the Turf Scheme.

**Mr. Fahey** asked that both roads be taken over. In this he was supported by Senator Butler, Mr. Quirk and Mr. P. Butler, and the council agreed to do so.

With regard to 750 perches of road from Dunhill road near priest's house to Annelstown road near Ballyadam Cross, moved by Mr. Barron, Mr. Barron was asked to get the ratepayers thereon to apply for a Special Employment Grant to get this road repaired.

**Roads in Old Parish Area.**—The Council again discussed a report from the Co. Surveyor enclosing an estimate for £4,000 for repairs to certain roads in the Old Parish area.

**Mr. Hartly** who had gone to Dublin at his own expense, in an attempt to get a grant for this work and said he did not intend that this estimate should come before the meeting at all. He expressed his thanks to the Co. Engineer for the preparation of the estimate and to Mr. Kyne, T.D., for the help he had given him in his efforts to get a grant. Since that failed he would like to do now is to ask that an extra few miles over and above that is included in the Road Works Scheme for that area be done.

**Local Authorities Works Act.**—The scheme submitted and approved under the above heading at a total estimated cost of £2,999 was approved by the Council.

**Graded Rents for Non-Municipal Houses.**—When this question, adjourned from the previous meeting came up.

The Chairman said this is a very comprehensive scheme and must be gone into very carefully. He thought it would be better if adjourned for a special meeting.

**Mr. Campion** agreed and said it is matter that will lead to a lot of discussion.

**Mr. Roche** said this matter of rents is a managerial function. He referred to the reconstructed houses and said an order has already been made by the Manager grading the rents. He said the order is based on the tenants' incomes.

**Mr. Roche.**—I know. Some of the reconstructed houses at Portlaw are let at 1/6 and 2/- and some at 1/1-. There is no doubt that anybody who come into a reconstructed house at 1/1- when they can get a house at 1/1/8. There is something wrong. This matter is well as consideration of grants for the erection and repairs of houses, the council should have a special meeting, as was also a notice of motion by the Chairman—that a housing committee be appointed by the Council to consider and report to the County Council on all matters relating to the Housing Acts of the County and to advise the Co. Manager on all matters relating thereto.

**Application for Increases.**—When the application from the Irish Local Government Union for increase in basic salary rates of local officials came up, the matter was, on the suggestion of the Chairman, adjourned to next meeting when a list of salaries and emoluments of all officers is to be before the meeting.

**Leasehold Rents Redemption.**—The Department approved the Council's suggestion to purchase the leasehold rents of cottage plots erected in the old schemes of cottages.

The Department suggested that the Council raise the suggested loan of £4,000 repayable over a 5 years period. Several members thought a 5 years period too short and it was decided to ask the Department to approve of a 10-year term.

**Cinematograph Act.**—The Council arising from the engineers report agreed to the issue of a Cinematograph Licence in respect of Monea House, Ardmore.

**Retired Teachers' Pensions.**—Mr. Ormonde, M.P., T.D., moved the following:—That we, the Waterford County Council, hereby support the just demand of all retired teachers in their claim that the retiring gratuities awarded to teachers who retired subsequent to 1st January, 1951, be also provided for those who retired before that date, inasmuch as they rendered like service over these same years.

On moving the motion, Mr. Ormonde said he would like to see the justice of their claim. It is generally agreed that the improved pension scheme, which was introduced in 1949, or before that was denied a benefit.

**Mr. Kennedy** seconded the motion, which was passed unanimously.

**Delay in Payment of Sickness Benefit.**—The Chairman referred to a recent case in Lismore where a man had been out of work sick for the past four weeks. He was the father of six children and during that period all he received was £2 12s. 6d. In the meantime the man, his wife and their children were left with a penny a day to endure severe hardships. He felt that the council should get in touch with the Department of Social Welfare and suggest some arrangement whereby a person who must wait over a period for whatever money he is entitled to from the National Insurance be paid a certain amount by the local officer of the Board of Assistance, who could be recharged later by the Department.

**Mr. Morrissey** said the cheque when it comes will only be made payable to the insured.

The Chairman said no one should left waiting for a period of four or five weeks for insurance of this kind and if this was the case generally there was something radically wrong.

**Mr. Roche.**—That's only one case of many.

**Senator Butler.**—In this case to which you refer was not the woman destitute?

**Senator Butler.**—Then the local assistance officer should have come to her assistance.

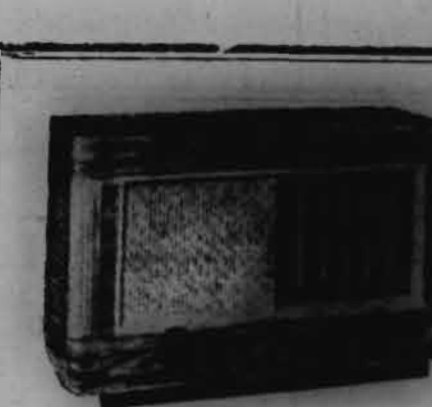

injury to the ribs was most serious.

**Mr. John Reddy**, Garage Proprietor, gave evidence of turning the car to garage. They turned it back on to wheels and pulled it to garage. The cost of repairs would be £89 5s. The value of the car prior to the accident was £90 after the accident, as scrap, £15 to £20.

**THE DEFENCE.**—Miss Robinson, replying to Mr. D'Arcy, B.L., stated she was travelling from Waterford to Tramore, accompanied by Miss Della Veale and Mr. Roe. She knows the road well and was driving about 25 m.p.h. but slowed down when approaching Convent Cross, as there are generally children about there.

There was some dogs on the road this day. She can't remember if she sounded the horn. She was quite close to the cross when she saw the other car was not going to stop and braked immediately. At the time of the impact her car must be practically stopped. She was under the impression that the running board of Mr. Attridge's car was resting on the bumpers of her car. When she took her foot off the brake her car went back a few yards. Mr. Attridge's brother came over to her car in an angry mood and said: "You must be going at a hell of a speed." Witness sent for the Guards immediately after the accident.

To Mr. Clarke—Witness denied she was travelling fast. She agreed she refused to say anything as she was under the impression that it was the proper thing to do.

Mr. Mee, Roe said he was travelling in the back of Miss Robinson's car. As regards speed he was under the impression that the car was going to stop to let him off at the cross, as she had done on other occasions. He described the speed as 20-25 m.p.h. They were about 20 feet from the cross when the other car came out. He is quite sure Miss Robinson's car was resting on the impact and that Attridge running board was overriding Miss Robinson's front bumper. He agreed that "maybe we were" when Mr. Attridge's brother spoke to him.

Miss Della Veale said she was sitting in the front of Miss Robinson's car. The impact was slight as she had four or five small parcels on her lap and they were still there after the impact. She saw Attridge's car when they were about 10/12 yards from the cross and Miss Robinson braked immediately. She was under the impression

that the other car tore their bumper and bonnet.

Mr. John Deegan estimated the repairs to the A40 at £45 10s. 11d.

Mr. Charles Pier, an assessor, said the market value of the Ford before the accident was £60. The salvage value was £10. His Lordship, after summing up said he was satisfied on the evidence of Miss O'Rourke, that Attridge was not at all negligent and he was satisfied that Miss Robinson drove too fast into the corner. He gave a decree in favour of Miss Robinson, costs and expenses and dismissed the counter-claim with costs.

**NEXT OF KIN TO BE SOUGHT.**—His Lordship made an order directing the Co. Registrar to make inquiries regarding the next of kin of Annie McGrath, Tinnabiny, Clashmore, who died intestate leaving 22 acres of land (a wood) and a sum of £222 in deposit receipts.

The case was brought forward for the purpose of getting the order made, in the form of a civil bill on behalf of John Egan, The Mall, Youghal, claiming £16 15s. funeral expenses, against the administrator, Mee, Keogh.

Mr. M. Keogh, son of the administrator, gave evidence that the sum was due to Mr. Egan. His Lordship then made the order quoted above.
