INCREASES ASKED FOR MILK, WHEAT, BARLEY, OATS AND EGGS.

Mr. M. McGrath, V.C., presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Other members present were: Messrs. D. Leahy, J. Fahey, R. Barron, D. Heskin, J. Meaney, Mr. Harry, J. Quirke, J. Mansfield and Liam Morrissey...

Notice of Motion.—Dealing with a notice of motion by Mr. T. Morrissey, who was absent owing to illness, asking the Minister for Agriculture to increase the price fixed for barley of 1951 crop...

Mr. Barron referred to the enormous increase in the price of all agricultural products. He stated that the price of wheat had increased from 40/- to 70/- per barrel...

There was some discussion on the reasons for this during the meeting. Mr. McGrath maintained that lack of support was due to poor encouragement for breeding...

Mr. Leahy said weather and falling off, as people were not able to travel. Mr. Morrissey thought that the value of the premiums should be increased. He thought especially in the half-bred class an increase should be given...

Mr. Heskin drew attention to a statement made in the Dail by the Minister concerning his proposed agreement with Britain for the supply of pigs at from 200/- to 210/- per cwt. He stated that he would like to move a resolution calling on the Department to make sure that before any agreement is signed that provision for any increase in the cost of production is made in the agreement...

Imported Seed Wheat.—Replying to Mr. Heskin, the C.A.O. stated that the price of imported seed wheat would be 25/5s. Growing of Barley.—Arising from a Departmental circular, the C.A.O. informed the meeting that each Agricultural Instructor will have three sites on which to carry out experiments in the growing of Ymer barley...

Price of Eggs.—Mr. Heskin stated that the poultry-keepers of the county were very dissatisfied with the price of eggs at 2/- a dozen. He would like to know why the people in the North can get 4/- a dozen and poultry-keepers here have to sell 100 per cent. less...

Miss Mullins said that if an average of 3/6 could be struck for the year she thought it would prove economic. She thought that even with the present price of feeding stuffs 2/6 a dozen in the summer would be economic...

Mr. Heskin said he would not agree. He asked how it was that if 3/- was considered to be the economic price two years ago how could it be economic to-day with the increase in feeding stuffs...

Mr. Heskin seconded the proposal which was passed. Price of Milk.—The Chairman called attention into the present price of milk and the high cost of production.
