### Waterford County Council

## Graded Rents Scheme Approved

**SPECIAL MEETING.**  
Mr. D. Heskin, chairman, presided at a special meeting of the County Council held in the Court House, Dungarvan, on Friday last. Other members present were—Messrs. D. Leahy, vice-chairman; Jas. Quirk, Mr. McGrath, F. Roche, N. Walsh, J. Campion, J. Fahy, Eric Power, Wm. Kenneally, J. O'Rourke, T.D.; N. Kelly, J. Kirwan, J. Butler, J. Mansfield, R. Barron, Thos. Power, Liam Morrissey and Senator Butler. Mr. S. J. Moynihan, County Manager, Mr. Sheehy, County Surveyor, and the Assistant County Surveyors, were also present.

The scheme of graded rents submitted by the Manager covered tenants with incomes of £3 or under having no children or dependents or up to eight at a minimum rent of 5/- plus rates, with the maximum rent fixed at 11/9 for tenants with a weekly family allowance of £3 10s. and over.

The Chairman said he would like to know what is the economic rent of the houses erected. What would be the economic rent as far as the council is concerned and how far the council can go in subsidising those houses. These points should be carefully considered in dealing with this matter.

The Secretary said that the economic rent of the new houses in the Portlaoise scheme, taking into consideration the 12/6 plus rates. Without the grants it would be about 27/2 a week plus rates.

Mr. Quirk—There is for and against it, but he would imagine that a flat rate of some type would be the better plan. Mr. Quirk—Where you have a working man earning £3 a week and another earning £3, why should you ask the £3 man to pay as much as the £3 man? Chairman—In my opinion the scale before us is a very fair one to all—the tenants and to the ratepayers. He proposed the adoption of the amendment that the minimum rent be raised from 5/- to 6/-.

Senator Butler said he is totally opposed to that. Take a man with a wife and eight children with under £3 a week, how can he be expected to pay 8/6 out of that? He can't do it. Mr. P. Butler—Will you tell me, Senator, where is a man working for £3 or under now? Chairman—There is an obligation on us to build houses for those who need them and the council are doing their best to carry out this obligation.

Senator Butler said he would propose an amendment that the scale as submitted by the Manager be adopted. He held that the rates on the new houses will be an asset, thus reducing the subsidy. Chairman—Against that, all the houses to be demolished will be a loss to the council also. To Senator Butler—The Secretary said the valuation due on the new houses will go up.

Replying to Mr. Walsh, the Secretary stated that the Chairman's proposal would mean about 9/6 in the £ on the rates and Senator Butler's about 1/1 in the £. Senator Butler—It would mean no such thing. You will have the income from the rates of the new houses. The Chairman said that the rates could not be taken as income. You will have maintenance expenses, repairs, etc. The council know what they stand with regard to rural cottages. They may be taken into account the number of non-municipal houses built at present and the number required still. It has always been a belief that these houses were too dear for the people who needed them and that the rural type was the ideal type for non-municipal workers. Those could be built at £200, and surely the laying on of water and sewerage could not cost the difference between the two types.

tion on behalf of the local council  
officials, from the Irish Local  
Government Officials' Union was  
reached.

The Chairman pointed out that  
this matter was adjourned from  
the previous meeting so that the  
members could get a copy of the  
names of all the officials concern-  
ed, their present salaries with  
all emoluments, grants and  
travelling expenses. He said  
that the form supplied they  
only had the rate of travelling  
allowed, and he suggested ad-  
journing the matter further to  
enable the Secretary to give the  
information asked for.

Mr. Leahy—Without in any  
way commenting on the merits  
or demerits of the scheme, he  
said he would like to see how  
the Minister for Agriculture will  
treat the demands of the mem-  
bers of the County Committee of  
Agriculture, who at their last  
meeting asked for increases in  
the prices of milk, barley, oats  
and eggs. If the Minister  
is wise and give those increases  
they would be in a position to  
consider more favourably this  
application.
