### Milk Suppliers PROTESTS AT DUNGARVAN MEETING.

Farmers, representing every district in the county, met on Saturday at Dungarvan Town Hall on the invitation of the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers' Association for the purpose of forming a branch of the Association in Co. Waterford.

Mr. J. McConville, chairman, outlined the many objects of the Association and stated that the time had now come when the farmers of the county should join together to fight for a fair price for their produce. He said that 1s. 2d. a gallon for milk was a fantastic price and could never pay them. It was completely inadequate, he added, and would be laughable but for the fact that it is so tragic as far as they were concerned. "Our Minister for Agriculture refused to hear a deputation of milk suppliers," he said, "but maybe we should remind him that it is our servants and we are not his, and we will not tolerate his dictatorial attitude towards us."

Mr. Roger Kelly, a foundation member of the Milk Suppliers' Association, and one of the Vice-Presidents of the Association, stated that conditions in the towns and cities might be all right, but the farming section had been neglected. They had to sell in the open market and have often to do so at a loss. Fine Gael and Fianna Fail had not treated them as sympathetically as they had promised them. He actually wanted them to accept a reduced price of 1s. per gallon for their milk.

**INCREASING COSTS.**  
Continuing, Mr. Kelly stated that Mr. Dillon had told them that 1s. 2d. was a fair price, but he would like to know if the Minister had taken into account the very high and still increasing cost of production. "I tell you men, we are being exploited for the benefit of the urban population and it is our fault; we should have organised to demand our rights years ago." Concluding, Mr. Kelly stated that they could disrupt the national economy, and they would do so in their fight for their rights with the backing of the nation's farmers.

Mr. Liam Barry, Secretary of the Association, said the public had been told that the dairy industry was being used by the Government, but the farmers had no voice at the time to tell them that. On the contrary, the farmers were being exploited in producing it at the present price. When they wanted to see the Minister in Limerick he would not receive them, and they decided not to go knocking at his door by going on the deputation this week to meet him in Dublin.

Mr. Denis Heskin, Chairman of the Waterford Co. Council, said that the price of 1/2 a gallon should have been increased to meet the increasing costs of production as per the Government's guarantee to do this. He maintained that they should take nothing less than 1/6 per gallon, which he thought would be an economical price to-day. Mr. Heskin stated that he had it from a colleague of his in Limerick that they may have been forced to move on foot to fix a price for milk which would mean a small increase, but one that would not be anything in relation to the rise of wages which were to be increased by 10/- a week in response to a demand of from £3 to £4.

**IMPORTED BUTTER.**  
Mr. McConville and Mr. Barry spoke on the sale of imported butter wrapped in Irish wrapping and stated that it had, in fact, done a good turn for the country rather than the subsidised imported butter. On the proposition of Mr. McConville, it was unanimously passed that they strongly protest against the sale of inferior imported butter in the name of Irish Creamery butter, and demanding an official inquiry into

### Interesting High Court Case

**COLLISION AT SEA.**  
A very interesting High Court action was decided in Dublin last week and arose from a collision at sea between the motor fishing boat, "Mary Immaculate," owned by Palk Kenny and the motor fishing boat, "Santa Cruz," owned by John Dwan, Bonmahon, County Waterford. The claim was for damages caused to the "Mary Immaculate" by the negligence and want of seamanship on the part of the defendant, or his servants in the navigation of his "Santa Cruz," off Arklow Bay on 11th May, 1949, whereby the "Mary Immaculate" was damaged.

The Judge, in the course of a long judgment, said he would like to give a fair verdict. Dwan has satisfied him that the two Lynch boys had no authority from him either, expressed or implied. He made an order for costs for defendant and limited them to the costs of the action tried. A discussion of the plaintiff to pay the balance as they had paid for the defendant's costs, counsel's fees and incidental outlay. Messrs. ### Waterford County Council ESTIMATE OF 23/9 IN THE £ ADJOURNED

#### HOUSING GRANT SCHEME ALSO ADJOURNED

The estimates meeting of the above was held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Mr. Denis Heskin, chairman, presided. Also present—Messrs. N. Walsh, P. Butler, McGraith, J. Campion, Eric Power, J. Fahy, D. Leahy, vicarsina, and J. Quinke, P. Roche, M. Harty, J. Ormonde, T.D.; N. Kelly, Senator Butler, W. Kennedy, T. A. Kyne, T.D.; Michl. Morrissey, J. The County Manager, County Engineer, and Assistant Engineers; Mr. J. C. Dowling, Secretary, and Mrs. L. Walsh, Assistant Secretary, were also present.

**Portlaw Graded Roads.**—Mr. Roche, at the commencement of the meeting, referred to the question before the last meeting on the graded roads for Portlaw, which, on his suggestion, were graded by the council from 1/8 to 11/-. He said that on Saturday last the rent collector called and told tenants that the rents were going up and that Frank Roche was responsible. He resents the rent collector making any reference to a matter like this as it had been decided by the Council. He wanted that put on the minutes and he wanted the public to note that any other statement is not true.

**Inchindriah Road.**—The following notice of motion by Mr. Liam Morrissey was considered, viz.—That 100 per cent of road works in the townlands of Inchindriah, near Hallahan's public house to county road near Cummins house be declared a public road.

Senator Butler, supporting, said the road is in a shocking state. A Chairman—Is that the road a deputation came before the council about 14 years ago? Senator Butler—Yes.

Mr. Harty, seconding, bore out the statement of Senator Butler as to the condition of the road.

Mr. Leahy's there a scheme under which a grant could be got to repair it? The County Surveyor's estimate for repairs amounted to £900.

Mr. Quinke—This should be dealt with under a grant. He took it over it will be £900 on the rates and why not try for a grant?

Mr. Kyne, replying to the Chairman, said he thought this road would come under the Employment Relief Grant.

The Chairman asked Mr. Morrissey if it would be possible to get the people living on this road to apply for a grant and Senator Butler said he would use their influence in getting the grant.

Mr. Morrissey agreed to put this proposal before the parties concerned.

Mr. Mansfield, referring to these minor relief schemes on roads for which a grant is made, said that the ratepayers concerned are reluctant to pay the balance as they would they are already paying heavy rates and are entitled to get roads repaired. He thought the council should have some scheme and be prepared to put up, say, £15 to get a grant of £100. He held it would be money well spent.

Chairman—That matter is being dealt with by the County Councils General Council.

Mr. Mansfield—it would take some of the demands of the ratepayers.

Chairman—This matter was brought before the County Councils General Council by the Waterford County Council and the County Councils General Council have asked the Department to agree to this scheme.

**Provisional Road Works Scheme.**—The gross total for the above was stated by the Secretary to be £147,356, made up as follows—Main roads, £86,382; county roads, £29,734; and Dungarvan urban roads, £1,200. He stated that this figure did not include any proposals by councillors which were all cut out.

The Chairman suggested that before dealing with the roads they take the Manager's estimate of expenses, which was agreed to.

The County Manager's estimate is as follows—

The estimate provides for a total expenditure of £777,268, excluding separate charges. ### F.C.A. NOTES DUNGARVAN BATTALION

**Field Day.**—On Sunday last there was a very good turn-out of members of the Battalion for the exercises which were held. Members escorted from Dungarvan, Ardmore, Lismore, KilmacThomas, Leamybrien and Ballinacorney. All the recruits present were exercised on the miniature range and the results were very satisfactory. A number of the lads from Ballinacorney show signs of becoming good marksmen, with further training. Pte. Grant of Dungarvan did excellent shooting and will be listed amongst the probabilities for the Battalion Shooting team.

Under the supervision of the Regular Army Instructors, all present were put through their paces and all aspects of drill were practised. The recruits received special instruction in arms and foot drill prior to taking part in the movements with the older members. It was most encouraging to note the way in which the 'old hands' took these young lads under their wing and pointed out to them their faults and assisted them generally. It is an excellent spirit and the Battalion C.O. wishes to compliment all concerned. Again on next Sunday a similar field day will be held to give the final brush-up for the Battalion Monday parade. Every available member should make it a point to be present. Only those who attend this field day will be considered for the parade in Cork. All members require a brushing up on the ceremonial drill and defilets in the general drill to the standard required.

Lt. Maurice Kiely, Batt. Quartermaster, was in charge of the exercises. Arrangements are being made to have a survey made of all cottages repairs required and to make some estimate of a loan so as to spread the cost of such over a period of 10 years. A comprehensive general scheme of cottage repairs to be carried out over the next few years is contemplated. Last year provision for revenue was £20,000, but as a result of being made, as previously, for repairs. Experience has now shown that the sum of £10,000 will have been absorbed by repairs carried out in 1950/51, so that it is necessary, at the present stage, to increase the cottage repairs to £25,000, which will be applied in recouping to revenue account the expenditure incurred in 1950/51, as well as providing the cost of the survey now shortly to be undertaken, and to carry out repairs found necessary as a result of such survey. It is intended that as a general rule, priority of repairs will be given to cases in which the repairs are pending for cottage repairs. In due course the council will be asked to approve of the making of a loan of £15,000, which, with the sum of £10,000 already approved, will make the total of £25,000 now provided for in future years, further loan provision must also be made. The amount required for cottage repairs being shown as an increase of £27,000 over last year, the receipt of further loans for this year.

**General Purposes.**—Total gross expenditure amounted to £102,987 compared with £145,325 in 1951/52, a reduction of £5,328.

After crediting receipts and grants made available in previous years for expenditure not yet incurred (Helvick dredge and Youthful Bridce) the amount to be levied after deducting the Urban Council share is £65,407, being an increase of £8,496 over the year 1950/51. This is accounted for by the utilisation of a year of a credit balance of £15,000, which is not available this year and the other provisions of £27,000 over last year, the receipt of further loans for this year.

**Expenditure.**—Secondary Scholarships, £100; Pension, £400; Preparation of Rate Books, £150; Commercial Hotel (loan now repaid), £1,200; Fire Brigade Uniform, £28; Fire and Ambulance, £400; Tramway, £1,000; £2,650; Legal Expenses, £300; Coroners, etc., £150; Conveyancing, £300; Prisons, £20; Miscellaneous, £128. Total, £5,906.

**Receipts.**—The following reductions in receipts are anticipated—Vocational Education Act, £194; Diseases of Animals, £222; Franchise and Jurors, £200 (total, £616), while increases of £36 and £18 are provided under the headings of Fisheries Act and Civil Defence respectively.

The foregoing variations are summarised as follows—Increases in expenditure items, £6,947; reduction in expenditure items, £5,906; net increase Continued on page 3.

### Health Grant and the increase of £2,000 in the amount to be levied is mainly attributable to the existence of a previous debit balance which must now be provided for.

**Sanitary Services.**—Gross expenditure is £11,838, less receipts £286, which with an estimated debit balance of £3,059, leaves £14,141 to be raised, equivalent to a rate of 12/7d. in the £, an increase of £5,485 over last year when the rate was £6,696. Apart from the debit balance referred to the following are the principal items of increase occurring under the following headings—  
Water supplies, £1,005; sewerage, £138; public lighting, £311; sundry expenses, £154; loan charges, £494 (for various water and sewerage schemes in contemplation). Provisional sum of £500 is included for a public convenience at Tallow.

**Roads.**—There is a reduction of the amount to be levied amounting to £1,887, equivalent to a rate of 1/7d. in the £. Increased rents (less rates) amount to about £2,100, and there is an increase of £718 in the estimated credit balance. Salaries show an increase of about £700. Costs of rent collection are up by about £300 (due to new cottages tenanted) and General Loan Charges are increased by about £600. There is also provided this year a sum of £240 for loan provision has been made by way of a loan for road works and £150 for the issue of building and reconstruction grants. Sundry savings on general expenditure operate to enable the reduction mentioned being made in the general estimate.

**Public Assistance.**—The demand from the Board of Assistance is up by £4,078, but an increase in the amount of £2,000 is provided by way of health grant receipts for the reduction in the amount to be levied in the reduction in the amount of £2,000.

**Mental Hospital.**—The demand is up by £3,315. Receipts by way of grant and amount chargeable to the Urban Council, £2,000, the net increase in the amount of £1,315. Since the health grant estimate was prepared by the Mental Hospital last November supplementary expenditure which was included in the Mental Hospital estimates in respect of stockpiling and other items has been provided for to the amount of the foregoing increase of £4,315.

Whilst the Health Services Grant will be adjusted in due course and this expenditure reduced, it is not anticipated that the net result will be to create in the coming year.

**Health Services.**—Gross expenditure shows a decrease of £49,433. There is a decrease of £50,000 in the amount provided for construction of Ardkeen Sanatorium, with a corresponding reduction in the contra receipts from Hospitals' Trust Grant, so that eliminating these items, there is an increase of £1,317 in the gross ordinary expenditure. Of this, £3,817 is provided for by increased salaries, being made for two public health nurses, one clerical officer, part-time ophthalmologist, part-time orthopaedic surgeon, bench wagon driver and radiologist. Provision is also made for normal increments. The increase in professional staff involves an increase of £1,800 in travelling expenses. A sum of £3,000 is provided also for increased cost of maintenance of patients in extern institutions. An increase of £870 is provided for contributions to District Nursing Associations, as it is anticipated that all such associations will be approved for grants this year. A sum of £1,000 is provided for X-ray expenditure and a sum of £447 is provided for operation of beach wagon (excluding wages). As against this considerable savings will be effected by using our own transport instead of hiring the Board of Assistance ambulance and hackney cars. A sum of £500 is provided as a contribution towards the expenses of the Mobile X-ray Unit operated by the Department of Health, Dublin, immigration and school medical service also show increases.
