DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Held on Wednesday before Mr. Justice O'Riain.

LARCENY OF MAIZE

The adjourned case against a young man named Thomas Morrissey, Loughmore, and John Crotty (19 years), 51, do., who were charged with the larceny of five sacks of meal from Messrs. A. Moloney and Sons, Stores, on the night of 24th Feb. at 11.30 p.m., was resumed.

Mr. P. J. Morrissey (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Soles.) appeared for both accused and said his client Morrissey pleaded guilty to the charge. Crotty pleaded not guilty.

Outlining the cases, Supt. O'Mahony said that at 11.30 p.m. on February 24th Guard Riordan saw a pony and cart near the premises of Messrs. A. Moloney and Sons. When he went to investigate, the cart moved off up Main Street and turned off Friary Street where it pulled up in front of a motor car. The cart contained five sacks of meal valued at £10 4/7. While Guard Riordan was questioning Crotty in Friary Street, a man came to the end of the street and went off towards the Square. The Guard then took Crotty with the horse and cart to the Barracks, where he made a statement that he had been sent by his father with the horse and cart until the other man whom he did not know had shifted his furniture to Abbeyside. Morrissey came of his own accord to the Barracks and admitted putting out the meal into the cart.

Guard Riordan corroborated the statement of the Superintendent.

Replying to Mr. Morrissey, Supt. O'Mahony said that Morrissey was in England for a number of years and Crotty may not have known him. The young lad said he was going removing furniture. When witness asked him where he got the meal, he said in Abbeyside, but witness pointed out that there are no mills in Abbeyside.

Mr. Morrissey, Supt., asked for a direction in the case of young Crotty but the Justice said he would hear the evidence.

Thomas Morrissey stated he was 27 years old; had been in England for a long period and returned to Dungarvan in December last. He had brought money when he came home and drank heavily. He arranged with Crotty (senior) whom he met in a pub to get his horse and cart to shift furniture.

Crotty agreed and the young boy came with him to drive the horse as he, witness, had no experience of horses. He told both the Crotties that he was going shifting furniture.

The young fellow protested when he went to Moloney's but was probably afraid of witness who had drink taken.

To the Superintendent—Witness said himself, his wife and two children are living in his father's house. He went into Moloney's Store by climbing up a chute and crossed over the bakehouse yard, opened the door and then went for the horse and cart.

Superintendent—Isn't the whole true story that you want to take the rap for the whole thing?

Witness—No.

To the Justice witness said when he came down with the horse and cart he went in by the side door which he had previously opened.

John Crotty (senior) deposed to Morrissey asking for the horse and cart to shift furniture to Abbeyside. Witness knew Morrissey was not able to follow the horse, so he sent the witness to have the horse.

Witness has been keeping pigs for the past sixteen years.

John Crotty, junior, replying to Mr. Morrissey, said he was told to go with this man to shift furniture. Witness drove the horse down Mitchel Street and then Morrissey took the reins off him and drove to Moloney's.

To the Superintendent—When he saw the meal coming down the chute he knew it was not right but Morrissey told him to stay where he was. It just came into his mind to tell the Guard that he got the stuff at Abbeyside.

The Justice said he is satisfied on the evidence of Crotty that he must convict.

Replying to the Justice the Superintendent said there was nothing previously against Morrissey. There was a previous conviction against Crotty.

Superintendent—I would not blame the young fellow too much but would blame his father.

Justice—Unfortunately there is no charge against him.

Supt. O'Mahony—I am afraid Morrissey was got at when he had a few drinks taken.

To the Justice Morrissey said he will keep out of trouble in future; he is going to England.

In the case against Morrissey the Justice imposed a sentence of three months, the warrant not to issue if he is of good behaviour for six months.

In the case of the boy Crotty, this is not his first time, or other

members of the family being before the court. He is afraid the paternal court in this case is not what it should be, and to send away another member of this family before. This boy also was in court before and his home influence must not be good.

Supt. O'Mahony suggested putting the boy on probation.

The Justice, applying the P.O.A. warned young Crotty that if brought before the Court again and convicted he will be sent away.

DANCE LICENCE.

Mr. Morrissey (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Soles.) was granted a licence to dance at the Kilbrien Hall on Sunday, April 15th on behalf of Wm. Dalton, Hon. Secretary, Kilbrien Young Farmers Club.

Mr. Williams, Solr., was granted occasional licences on behalf of Mr. Nicholas Casey, Square, for six dances at the C.S.M. Ballroom, Clonea, one dance in April, two in May, two in June and one in July.

A case under the new Act against a young boy named Nicholas Power, Wolfe Tone Rd., was adjourned by the next court; he was warned by the Justice that if he missed one day in the meantime without a reasonable excuse, he will be sent away.

Guard Farrell, S.A.O., said the father took him to school one day and while he was at school, the boy went off again.

He (Guard Farrell) took him to school a few times on his bicycle.

LICENSING PROSECUTION.

Supt. O'Mahony prosecuted Thos. Howell, O'Connell St., with a breach of the licensing laws at 12.10 p.m. on St. Patrick's Day.

Mr. Morrissey, Solr., defended.

Supt. O'Mahony said Guard Begley found three men on the premises at 12.10. One of the men would have been a traveller up to midnight.

Mr. Morrissey said both the publican and his wife were in bed with flu and gave definite instructions which were not carried out.

The Justice imposed a fine of £2 on the publican and 5/- on the men found on the premises.

Mr. Morrissey applied for reduction of the fine on the publican owing to the clear record.

The Justice said that £2 for a breach on St. Patrick's Day is very lenient.

TAKING OF MOTOR CAR.

The adjourned case against Thos. Kelly, Thos. Power and John Doran, charged by Supt. O'Mahony with taking and detaching a motor car from outside the C.S.M. Ballroom without the owner's consent, was again adjourned for three months.

Mr. Kenny, Solr., who appeared for all three defendants said they were pleading guilty to the charge.

Mr. Morrissey, Solr., appeared for the car owner.

Supt. O'Mahony said on the night of 7th January, there was a dance at Clonea and the three defendants who were in Dungarvan at the Cinema and then went to Clonea, hoping to get into the dance when the collectors had left the door. They waited for some time in a car which was not locked and then went to this car owned by Mr. Durant and broke the lock. They had no key but the youngest of the three was able to start the car by using a wire; he was assisted by the other two. They then drove across the main road at Ballroom and got on to the Waterford road and went in the direction of Cappoquin and somewhere in the vicinity of Cappoquin, Power though he would like to drive; he only drove about 100 or 150 yards as he could not manage it and Doran again took the wheel. They had intended to go in the direction of Youghal but seeing the petrol was running low, they imagined that by driving fast they would save petrol. The car hit the fence and went 72 yards after getting out of control. The car was badly damaged but all the occupants escaped without a scratch. The repairs to the car cost £86 5s. 0d. and the owner had to give £100 and hand in this case to get another. Young Doran had no driving licence.

Mr. Kenny said on the face of it no more serious charge could be preferred as the public must be considered. Those three young men are highly mechanically minded. They went for a joy ride, with no intention of doing harm to anybody. It was more or less a schoolboy prank. They admitted everything they did and will never do anything

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor, for Mr. Durant, owner of the car, said £87 was actually paid for the repairs but the total outlay by his client was £122 and his client feels that he should be allowed something over and above the repair charge for consequential loss. He suggested a figure of £100.

Mr. Kenny agreed to this.

The Justice said he will adjourn all three cases for three months and see what efforts are being made to pay this off. If reasonable he will then adjourn against all the defendants and when he finally comes to adjudicate on the cases he will take into account the conduct of all three and particularly of the other two boys.

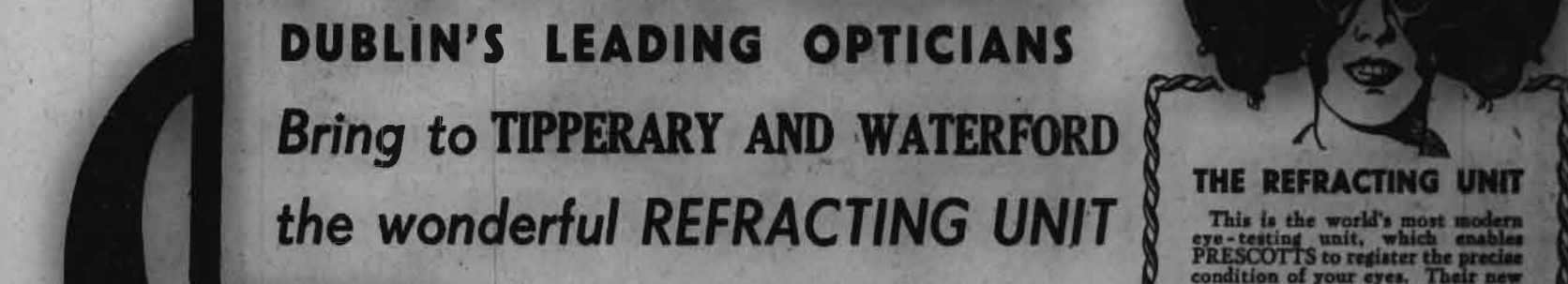
