CO. BOARD OF ASSISTANCE

DISPENSARY M.O.S.
A letter read from the Department regarding the Committee's resolution re fixing the retiring age for Dispensary Medical Officers at 65 years, stated that the matter is getting careful consideration.

MATERNITY UNIT AT WATERFORD.

A letter from the Department dealing with the architects report, asked for a report from the quantity surveyor. The Manager had made an order that the necessary report be forwarded.

DUNGARVAN DISPENSARY.

Reporting on two suggested sites for the proposed new dispensary at Dungarvan, the Secretary informed the members that one of the sites was not now available and that the other was unsuitable.

It was agreed to advertise for a site which would be suitable for the erection of a dispensary and a doctor's residence.

Dealing with the proposed dispensary for Old Parish, the Co. Engineer reported that the present site would be too small for their requirements.

After some discussion the Co. Manager suggested that they should seek an extension of the present site on which the old

buildings stand as it was most central. This was unanimously agreed to.

DISPENSARY MIDWIVES.

Dealing with the question of transport of dispensary midwives in remote country areas, raised by Mr. Heskin at a previous meeting.

The Secretary stated that some time ago the Department would not sanction the making of an expense allowance to a midwife in the Ballyduff area.

Mr. Heskin said that in his opinion the attitude of the Department was most unfair. There was little need to illustrate the crying need for transport facilities for midwives in the country areas and he would strongly urge the Government to take definite steps in this direction.
