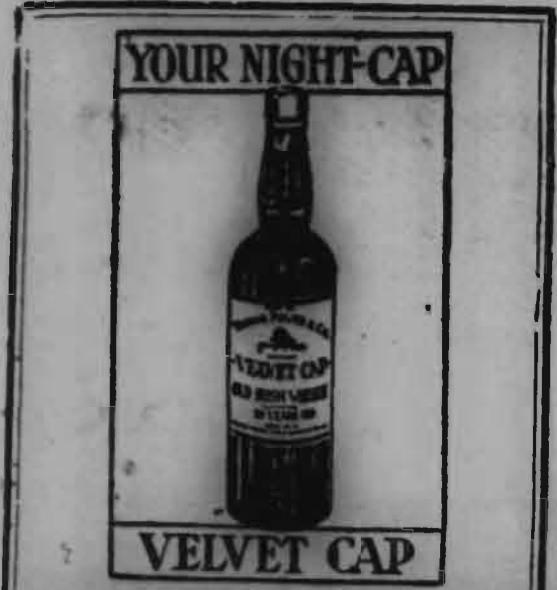

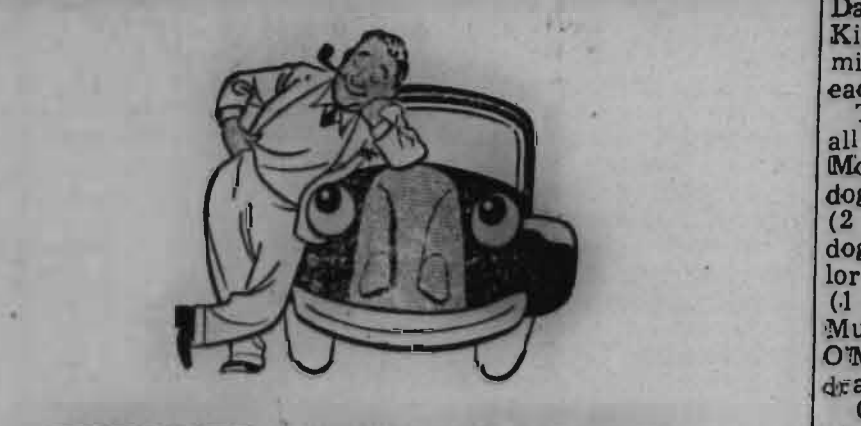

Dungarvan District Court

Held on Wednesday, before Mr. McCabe, D.J.
Civil Bills—A large number of civil bills (undelivered) were before the court and decrees granted in nearly all cases, with others adjourned.
Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, T. C. Williams, J. F. Kenny and L. F. Lanigan, were the solicitors engaged.
Occasional Licences—Mr. P. L. Power was on the application of Mr. T. C. Williams, solicitor, granted an occasional licence for the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan, on August 2nd in connection with the Dungarvan Agricultural Show.

The Dungarvan Show Committee were also granted a dance licence for the Town Hall on the night of August 2nd. Snow Night.
Lights on Vehicles—The usual fines were imposed on a large number of cyclists found cycling without lights after lighting-up time.
Gard. Deasy and Deasy were the complainants.

Licensing Prosecutions—Supt. Flanagan prosecuted James Flanagan, Greston Square, with a breach of the Licensing Laws at 10.30 p.m. on the night of 24th June, 1951. Eighteen persons found on the premises were also prosecuted.
Mr. P. J. Morrissey (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, solicitors) appeared for the defendant and admitted the offence.

Supt. Flanagan said that when the Queen visited the premises two hours after closing time they found 18 persons there. There was a big crowd in the town that day. The defendant, who is only a short time in business, has a good record.

Mr. Morrissey said the Superintendent had stated the case very fairly. There was a very large crowd in the town that day on which two very important matches were played. A fine of £1, not to be recorded, was imposed on the publican. The men found on the premises were each fined 5s.

Licensing Prosecutions which had previously been adjourned for three months were struck off the list.
Selling Ice Cream After Hours—The P.O.A. was applied in the case brought by Superintendent Flanagan against Joseph Kelly, Mitchel Street, who was charged with being open for sale at 11 p.m. closing time being 10 p.m. Defendant was about to close when Guard Giblin arrived.

After hearing Mr. Williams, solicitor, who stated that this act was being enforced in Dungarvan only during the past few months, the Justice applied the P.O.A.

Unlicensed Dogs—Sergeant Daly, Cappagh v. Richard Tobin, Kilmacow (3 dogs). Fined £2 mitigated to 10/- in each case.
The same ruling was given in all the following cases—Thomas McCarty, Ballyduff (4 dogs); Jas. Power, Kilmurray (2 dogs); Martin Costin, do. (1 dog); David Murray, Ballinacorney (1 dog); Joseph Walsh, do. (1 dog). Cases against Wm. Murray, Ballygully, and Nora O'Meara, Kilmurray, were withdrawn by complainant.

Superintendent Flanagan Welcomed—Mr. T. C. Williams, solicitor, on his own and on behalf of his colleagues, extended a hearty welcome to Superintendent Flanagan to which the appearance amongst them, and he assured the Superintendent the full co-operation of the legal profession and wished himself and his family many years of health and happiness in Dungarvan.
The Justice joined in the welcome extended to Superintendent Flanagan to which the Superintendent suitably replied.

IRELAND'S EXPORT TO ISRAEL DECREASES
Ireland's exports to Israel, which were maintained at the rate of £17,460 per month during 1950, dropped to £3,579 per month in the period of January-May this year, according to an official statement reaching the Irish Newsagency correspondent in Jerusalem.
Inquiry at the Israel Ministry of Finance showed that total exports from the Republic of Ireland to Israel in the first five months of 1951 amounted to £18,000. The bulk of this amount was represented by 430 tons of seed potatoes valued at £9,850. Other items were 16 tons of food parcels at £4,778, £178,000.

COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

Mr. P. R. Power presided at the monthly meeting of the above committee in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Other members in attendance were—Messrs. D. Leahy, J. Paley, J. Quirke, M. Hartley, Norman Walsh, R. Barron, S. Norris, J. J. Meade, Thos. Power, James Mansfield, Wm. Dower, Liam Morrissey.
Officials present were—Messrs. P. O'Shea and P. O'Sullivan, horticultural instructors; Messrs. M. O'Sullivan, D. Walsh and P. Brennan, agricultural instructors; Miss M. M. Mullins, poultry instructor.

Election of Chairman—On the proposal of Mr. Hartley, seconded by Mr. Leahy, Mr. P. R. Power, outgoing chairman, was unanimously re-elected.
The Chairman returned thanks for his unanimous re-election.

Vice-Chairman—On the proposal of Mr. Leahy, seconded by Mr. Quirke, the outgoing vice-chairman, Mr. M. McGrath, who was not present, was unanimously re-elected.
Approval of Schemes—The Department wrote approving of the Fruit Tree Planting Schemes as submitted by the committee.

Replying to Mr. Hartley, the C.A.O. said Fruit Tree Scheme submitted had increased from 10 to 15, the acreage for which grants will now be made to any individual planting fruit trees. The grant amounts to £12 for the first and £10 for each subsequent acre to a maximum of 15 acres.
Approval of Show Schedules—The Department wrote forwarding approval of the Schedule of Prizes submitted by the Dungarvan and Waterford Show Committee.

Fig Breeding Scheme—The committee adopted the above scheme submitted by the Department at the previous meeting and adjourned for further consideration on the suggestion of Mr. Barron that the Department be asked to have applicants for the increase and allow them to increase the service fee.
The scheme for the purchase of land had been adopted by all the committees he had written to.

Mr. Leahy, the C.A.O. said the scheme would mean an increase of £2 per acre to the committee or about £80 extra. The committee must in addition pay £20 and the applicant £5.
The adoption was proposed by Mr. Hartley and seconded by Mr. Barron.

Farmyard Manure Distributors—A letter was read from Mr. Arnold, Tralee area, commending the refusal of a grant to him towards the purchase of an artificial manure distributor.
The Secretary said that he had informed the Department that the committee had selected Mr. Arnold provisionally. Later after the scheme had been advertised and a full list was before them Mr. Arnold was not selected.

The committee took no action on the letter. Arising out of this, Mr. L. Morrissey asked if the committee had any scheme of grants towards the purchase of farmyard manure distributors. He would be more in favour of giving grants for those than distributors for artificial manure which is much easier to spread than farmyard manure. The farmyard manure distributor is a great success and a lot of farmers are very interested in them due to the scarcity of labour.
The Chairman suggested that Mr. Morrissey should bring up this matter again at the September meeting.

Mr. Barron said there are people who get grants from this committee towards the purchase of artificial manure distributors, and those machines never left their own farms. Probably they were not asked to hire them out.
Appointment of Temporary Instructors in Poultry-keeping—The C.A.O. stated that following the Minister's approval of the above appointment he had advertisements issued and received replies so that the list of applicants were forwarded by him to the Department, and in the reply received from the Department it was stated that all the applicants were eligible for appointment with the exception of Miss Birdie Coleman, who in her letter of application had given her address as Ballinacorney, Ballyduff, Co. Waterford.
Mr. Walsh thought that when the committee again had the appointment to make the members should be supplied before hand with a copy of the qualifications of each applicant so that the members could study them. He asked the C.A.O. to read the list of applicants, which was as follows—Miss R. Coleman, Ballinacorney, Ballyduff; Miss R. Meher, Thurles; Miss A. Donnelly, Birr, Offaly; Miss B. Conolly, Kildare; Miss N. Ryan, Wexford.

Mr. Quirke, proposing the appointment of Miss Coleman, said he is satisfied she is not a native of Co. Waterford, as she was born in the Co. Cork. She is, continued Mr. Quirke, the nearest person we can ever again get to Co. Waterford and which we can appoint within the law. Her father has land in both Co. Cork and Co. Waterford, and Miss Coleman can prove both with maps or otherwise that she was born and reared at Glenagurteen, Co. Cork.
The C.A.O. said Miss Coleman had fallen into the error of giving her postal address as Co. Waterford. He can substantiate what Mr. Quirke has said from her birth certificate that she was born and reared at Glenagurteen, Co. Cork.
Mr. W. Dower, seconding said that he was in the same position as Miss Coleman as regards his address. His address is Clashmore, Youghal, while he is living in Waterford.
Mr. Barron, proposing that Miss Donnelly, Birr, be appointed vice-chairman, expressed the view that the farthest away from the county the applicant was the better as she would have no friends or influence. We had her brother here working for this committee some years ago who was an able man.
Mr. Fahy seconded the appointment of Miss Donnelly.
A vote was then taken and resulted as follows—Messrs. P. R. Power, M. O'Shea, Messrs. Quirke, Norris, Morrissey, Dower, Walsh, Hartley, Leahy, Mansfield, 8.

Also stating that Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, Instructor in Horticulture, has been assigned the work of inspection under the above in Cork, and asking for committee's agreement for Mr. O'Sullivan to absent himself for this purpose.
