Dungarvan Urban Council

Mr. N. Kelly, Vice-Chairman, presided at the meeting of the above on Friday last. Other members present were: Messrs. Thos. McCarthy, P. O'Dwyer and Thos. Lee.

Rate Warrant Sealed.—On the proposal of Mr. O'Dwyer, seconded by Mr. McCarthy, the rate of 30/- in the £ was formally struck and sealed with the Council's seal.

Loading Bank.—The Engineer's estimate for the provision of a loading bank opposite the Shandon Dairy was £120.

Mr. O'Dwyer referred to the necessity for the bank and proposed that the matter be referred to the Manager with a request for his approval of the work as soon as possible.

Building of Boundary Wall.—In connection with the building of a boundary wall between Garvan's Terrace and the Gallowhill Housing Scheme, the Clerk said the matter was referred to the Architects of the Housing Scheme.

Handball Alley.—The Council recommended the proposal of Mr. McCarthy seconded by Mr. O'Dwyer to have a floor laid down at the back of the newly-erected ball alley, where juvenile members of the community can play.

Licensed Hawkers Need Not Pay.—Arising from a question raised at a previous meeting as to whether hawkers trading in the town could be charged a toll and which was referred to the Council's solicitor, Mr. T. C. Williams for his observations, the following was read from Mr. Williams:

"We presume that what the members of the Council are chiefly concerned with is the question of the hawkers using the Square on fair days and market days. There is no doubt but that a licensed hawkers is entitled to sell and expose for sale goods in the markets of the town and section 28 of our Municipal Act expressly exempts them from legal proceedings which can be taken against other parties for selling or exposing for sale goods in the town markets, except in their own dwellings, houses, stores or shops.

"In our opinion the Council have no power to compel licensed hawkers to pay tolls for goods which they sell. This, however, does not apply to persons who are not licensed hawkers and who sell or expose for sale goods in the public streets. In our opinion they are committing an offence and can be prosecuted under Section 28 of the Local Act.

"Section 29 of the same Act lays down that any person selling or offering for sale any article in the market of the town should have the same weighed or measured at the public weighing-house. This section would however, appear to apply only to articles being sold or offered for sale in the markets of the town."

The Town Clerk said that this Act apply only to Dungarvan. The Chairman said that hawkers should be charged, stating that the farmer who brings in his potatoes for sale on the Square has to pay as well as paying rates, but the hawkers can come in from all over the country, put up their stalls and make a fortune and they need not pay a penny in toll charge or rates.

Mr. O'Dwyer held that there is an old Act in the Council Office in which it is stated that toll can be charged. He saw where in Macroom the charge was raised from 5/- to 4/-.

Statement re Shortage of Water Referred.—A statement by Mr. Lee at a previous meeting of the Council re shortage of water at the Gallowhill Housing site, the following letter was read from Mr. J. Ormonde, B.E., Boro' Surveyor:

"With reference to grossly misleading statements made at last meeting of the Urban Council and widely publicised, re the water supply to Gallowhill Housing Scheme, I attach herewith a copy of letter signed by the Clerk of Works and Foreman in connection with the matter. During the cleaning of Kiltangan man's, water consumers were notified through the Press that there would be periodic interruptions in the water supply and were advised to store reserve supplies. Every effort was made to minimise the interruptions as much as possible and as far as the housing scheme was concerned, these were very few and very brief, giving no cause for complaint. It is hard to understand why responsible members of the Council make such harmful statements and I trust that these contradictions will receive the same publicity that the original remarks received."

Waterford Co. Council

Levying of Separate Charges at Tramore Ballyduff Water Supply

Ballyduff Water Supply.—Mr. D. Leahy, Chairman, presided at the quarterly meeting of the Co. Council in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Others in attendance were: Messrs. J. C. Ormonde, T.D., N.T.; T. A. Kyrle, T.D.; Senator Butler, J. Quirk, J. Fahy, J. J. Campbell, Mr. McGrath, N. Walsh, M. Hart, D. Heskin, Jas. Mansfield, P. Butler, M. Morrissey, L. Morrissey, T. BALLYDUFF WATER SUPPLY.—A deputation from the Ballyduff Parish Council consisting of Rev. Fr. Keating, C.C., Mrs. O'Neill, Mr. O'Neill, Mr. P. O'Neill, N.T. and Denis McCarthy appeared before the meeting in connection with the Ballyduff Water Supply.

Mr. Quirk who introduced the members of the deputation, said the scheme for a water supply to Ballyduff was mooted over two years ago and they were two years talking about it. He maintained it would be another five years before this scheme reaches Ballyduff and asked the people to be compelled to keep on drinking water. He suggested an alternative temporary supply in the meantime.

Dr. O'Neill asked regarding the possibility of a grant from the Council and said if the Council would give them a grant of £100, the Parish Council would guarantee to have a supply of water before September. Only yesterday he had to attend a child suffering from stomachic trouble arising from drinking this water. He fears an outbreak of gastric enteritis.

Dr. O'Neill said that if a grant was given they had two alternative ways to get a supply subject to approval of the engineers.

The Assistant County Engineer said that the scheme for the Ballyduff area was at an advanced stage. Work would commence shortly but it would take about two years to complete.

Mr. Quirk suggested that the engineer should take steps immediately to provide the people with a temporary water supply which would give them pure water.

Mr. Kyrle in view of the seriousness of the position in Ballyduff, we should regard it as an emergency case and get the County M.O.H. to make a report. If it is found necessary I would be in favour of giving £1,000 by way of grant. A £1,000 for a life in Ballyduff would be cheap.

Mr. Heskin said they should go ahead with a temporary scheme while we are waiting for the main scheme to be implemented.

The County Manager, said that he had visited the Department in connection with the Main Scheme which would meet the needs of Lismore, Cappoquin and Ballyduff. Agreement had been reached on all technical points in relation to the Scheme and he did not think there would be any undue delay. He did not think, however, that it was the intention of the Department to shelve with the Ballyduff scheme right away and when they got the facts as placed before the meeting by the deputation, the provision of a supply for that area would be attended to.

To Mr. Walsh, the Manager said tenders will be invited immediately the Department's approval is received.

Mr. Walsh—"The position in Lismore-Cappoquin is desperate. Mr. Heskin said that the blame for the hold-up in the scheme does not rest in the County Council.

Senator Butler—Sanction for a general scheme is being awaited. I have been here for a long time when you are awaiting for sanction from a Department, no matter what Government is in power, you will be waiting for a long time. This scheme for Ballyduff may go on for two or three years. Should not special attention be paid to the main scheme? Is there at least? There is a likelihood of an epidemic there and we should forestall it.

Chairman—"It will be treated as an urgent matter. We will get reports from the County Medical Officer and County Engineer.

Helicopter Suggested to Spray Wheat Crop

Consternation was caused to wheat growers all over the county during last week-end when the crop was found to be extensively attacked by the Wheat Midge.

At a special meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture on Monday a telegram was despatched to the Department of Agriculture asking for a team of experts to combat the pest and a suggestion was made that the crop be sprayed from the air by helicopter.

We understand that these midges appear in June and the females commence to lay eggs in the wheat blossoms on the internal face of the glumes. They lay from one to 30 eggs which hatch in 10 days. The larvae from the eggs then begin to feed among the anthers and pollen of the flower, sucking the juices from the developing ovary and consequently you get empty glumes.

From the eggs emerge the deep-yellow larvae which can be seen by opening the glumes of an ear of wheat.

During the week, Dr. H. Spain, Department of Agriculture, has carried out a survey in the county.

Accompanied by Mr. P. Conroy, C.A.O., he visited all the infested areas throughout West Waterford and found that infestation varied from 10 per cent to as high as 90 per cent of the crops. Loss of grain in the latter cases, a preliminary survey shows, may be as heavy as 50 per cent. Such serious cases have been found to be rare in West Waterford and the average infestation in the county is a loss of around ten per cent.

He said that it would be very difficult for anyone to account for the extraordinary flare up this year but it could be due to the variable weather conditions of recent times. "I will say though," he added, "that there never has been anything like this before in Ireland."

Dr. Spain will return to Waterford later to complete his survey.

POTATO DISEASE.—Outbreaks of potato etelworm have been reported in East and West Waterford but fortunately none of them is serious. The main anxiety at the moment is to prevent the spread of the disease.

Mr. P. Conroy, C.A.O., has stated that there is no great danger attached to these isolated outbreaks and there was no need for any anxiety among the farmers. Outbreaks were common every year in various parts of the county.
