HURLING LEAGUE LISMORE NOTES
IN TWO DIVISIONS

The National Hurling League will be run in two divisions this season instead of four. By 20 votes to 7 this arrangement was decided at the Central Council meeting in Dublin on Saturday. The National Football League will consist of five groups as usual.

Group A of the Hurling League will consist of Kilkenny, Waterford, Cork, Laois, Wick, Wexford, Antrim and Dublin and Group B will be composed of Galway, Westmeath, Tipperary, Limerick, Wexmeath, Offaly and Clare.

Very Rev. E. Canon Punch, P.P., Limerick, and Mr. F. McGrath, Tipperary, both objected to the new groupings, and said that both counties would prefer to continue as last season.

Mr. McGrath added that Tipperary might withdraw from the competition of the alteration.

The winners of both groups will meet in the final.

Thirty-one counties—Kilkenny are the exception—have entered for the Football League.

The groupings are as follows: Division I (Dr. Lagas Cup)—Donegal, Derry, Fermanagh, Tyrone, Monaghan, Antrim, Armagh, and Down.

Division II—Limerick, Wexford, Waterford, Laois, Carlow, Tipperary.

Division III—Kerry, Mayo, Clare, Galway, Cork.

Division IV—Wicklow, Meath, Kildare, Westmeath, Dublin, Louth.

Division V—Longford, Roscommon, Leitrim, Sligo, Cavan, Offaly.

Groupings are the same as last season with the exception that Limerick come into Division II and Cork and Laois which were previously in Divisions I and III respectively, have been switched.

A special Hurling League will be run for the weaker counties. Section I will include Roscommon, Down and Tyrone, and Section II, Wicklow, Carlow, Kildare, Louth.

Winners in both sections will meet in the final for a set of medals to be presented by the Central Council.

The draw for Section II has been arranged by the Leinster Council.

WELCOME FOR AN TAOISEACH

A very large crowd welcomed An Taoiseach, Mr. Eamon de Valera, when he arrived in Dungarvan on Wednesday last on his way to Ring College where he opened a new extension to the building.

The Taoiseach was met at the outskirts of the town by a party of Old I.R.A. men in charge of Mr. Michael Mansfield, who formed a guard of honour and was escorted to the Town Hall where he was presented with an address of welcome by the Urban Council. A guard of honour of Gardaí, under Chief Supt. M. A. O'Reilly, and Supt. O'Flanagan, was drawn up at the entrance to the Town Hall. A large number of workers from the Dickens Leather Factory acted as stewards in conjunction with the Gardaí.

At the Town Hall the address of welcome which was presented by the Chairman, Mr. T. Lannon, welcomed Mr. de Valera as one of those who had laid the foundations of Ireland's freedom in Easter Week, 1916, for his statesmanship at the head of a united people during the emergency.

Irish language. There had been a great need for a college of this kind when it was started in 1906 and that need still existed to-day. The road towards the restoration of the language was a difficult one and the object needed every help that college like Ring could give. There was no better way to foster Irish than to bring young people together to speak their native tongue in places such as this Ring College was rendering a service to the language and to the country.

Mr. de Valera went on to say that he was surprised at times when people did not understand how important the language was to the nation. He himself believed that Ireland would not be a nation to-day were it not for the fact that the language had survived through centuries of oppression. The language had kept the people together and the principal object today was to restore it as the spoken language of the country.
