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CO. WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

Minister to Attend Next Meeting

Mr. P. R. Power, Chairman, presided at the meeting of the Committee of Agriculture held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Other members in attendance were: Messrs. M. McGrath, N. Walsh, D. Leahy, J. Fahey, M. Hartly, J. Quirke, J. J. Mander, R. Barron, J. Mansfield, W. Dower, Thomas Power, Liam Morrissey, Messrs. P. Conroy, C.A.O., P. O'Shea and P. J. O'Sullivan, Horticultural Instructors, D. Walsh, Agricultural Instructor, Misses M. M. Mullins, M. Walsh and B. Coleman, Poultry Instructors, Mr. R. Day, District Inspector, Department of Agriculture, were also in attendance.

ESTIMATE OF EXPENDITURE 1951/52

The estimate of expenditure as submitted by the C.A.O. and explained by Mr. Day, which is derived from a variety of sources, is in the £ and a grant from the Department. The total estimate will bring in a total of £8,190 and the Department grant £2,677. Added to this is expected that there will be an unexpended balance of £3,412 at the end of the financial year, 1951.

The various schemes and the expenditure thereunder are as follows:

- Poultry Stations, £568; Cottage and Farms' Prize Scheme, £1,000; Livestock, £410; Cattle, £1,100; Pigs, £700; Sheep, £400; Subsidies to Show, £1,678; Instructors in Agriculture, £3,675; Water Agricultural Classes, £40; Horticulture and Bee-keeping, £2,982; Pesticides, £1,500; and Butter-making, £1,566; Scholarships, Boys and Girls, four each, £288; Seed Potato Development, £1,000; Horticulture, £350; Scheme, £350; Special Fruit Tree Scheme, £100; Improvement of Dairy Cattle Scheme—Prizes, £36; Waterford, £120; £30; Machinery Grants, £120; Manure Distributors Subsidy Scheme, £120; Administrative Expenses, £14,433.

Mr. Day explained that the total expenditure for the year 1952 will amount to £14,433 in the current year the amount was £14,643. He estimated that at the end of 1951 there would be a credit balance of £3,412. This would give them £18,045.

Estimated savings in the schemes as operated this year were given as: Poultry Stations, £33; Cattle, £25; Ploughing Matches, £50; Experiments and Demonstrations in Agriculture, £100; Grants for Sprayers, £100; Grants for Hives, £100; Scholarships: Girls, £28; Dairy Cattle Prize Scheme, £14; Total, £965.

Excess expenditure as against last year was given as—Against Breeding Scheme, £110; Horticulture Instruction, £242; Agriculture, do., £145; Poultry Keeping, do., £248; Boys' Scholarships, £32; Fox Destruction Scheme, £20; Clerical Assistance, £24.

Following discussion on the various items making up the scheme, Mr. Hartly said that in view of the credit balance, he would propose at the County Council a reduction of £d. in the demand.

Mr. Leahy said he thought it would not be wise. This is the only scheme in existence from which farmers can derive any benefit. The scheme was adopted unanimously on the proposition of Mr. Quirke.

INSEMINATION
Mr. Leahy moved a notice of motion handed in at the previous meeting: "That no new premium awards be made by the Committee in respect of yearling bulls, in view of the service now being made available to farmers by the Artificial Insemination Centre."

Speaking to the motion, Mr. Leahy said he had information from the local centre that 1,500 cattle were dealt with since in view of that he would propose the motion, as in his opinion it would be waste of money. He did not wish to interfere with the continuation of the service at present in being. His information is that 75 per cent of the cattle inseminated were in calf after the first service and 50 per cent of the 25 per cent after the second service.

Mr. Quirke thought it would be much better to defer the motion for another year until farmers, who are a very cautious body of men, had a better trial.

Mr. Walsh said he was in agreement with Mr. Quirke. It's a bit early yet and we should wait and see what the offspring will be.

Chairman—There is no insemination centre in East Waterford. Mr. Hartly—An sure Mitchellstown, if asked by Kilmeaden Creamery, would establish a centre there. He would ask Mr. Leahy to withdraw his motion for the present. His (Mr. Hartly's) information

which, however, is not verified at present—is that 90 per cent of the inseminations are from Hereford bulls. If that is correct it cut right across the dairy industry.

Chairman—You could reduce the number of premiums where this service is working. Following more discussion, on the suggestion of Mr. Quirke, it was agreed to adjourn the Committee to adopt the Premium Scheme and to allot premiums as they think fit later on, having regard to the insemination service available in any particular area.

PLOUGHING

Discussing the discontinuation of the subsidy for ploughing matches, the C.A.O. said that competitions were held for some time. Mr. Quirke—Ploughing matches are gone out. It's only the tractor now. No young fellow will want to catch the handle of a plough now. They want to sit on a tractor.

Mr. Day—If the Committee wish to hold tractor contests, you can re-introduce the scheme.

PRICE OF APPLES

A resolution proposed by Mr. Hartly and seconded by Mr. Quirke, was passed and is to be forwarded to the Minister for Agriculture asking that the minimum price for "windfall" apples be £3 per ton.

Mr. Quirke said the matter by complaining that Magnor's Factory, Clonmel, had reduced the price which last year was £3 to £2 7s this year. He said he thought this was a bad start in a year when everything is going up to have this firm trying to bring down the price. He referred to the Apple Marketing Scheme, which, he said, was going to be a great success. Referring to the Apple Packing Factory, he said at least two chambers will be ready in October for this year's crop, and he would like the public to know that the price would be very satisfactory.

FRUIT AND FOREST TREES

Tenders for the supply of fruit and forest trees, which were referred to the instructors, were before the meeting. Mr. Quirke said a definite instruction should be given to the instructors to see that the contractors fulfil the obligations and that the species of trees ordered will be forwarded.

Mr. O'Shea, Horticultural Instructor, said that persons ordering trees should operate and if the trees were not the same as ordered should notify the instructors before planting.

FARMYARD MANURE DISTRIBUTORS

When the Committee discussed the allocation of £120 towards the purchase of artificial manure distributors, Mr. L. Morrissey said he would like to see the greater portion of this given as subsidy for the purchase of farmyard manure distributors. He understood these machines are a great success and would be a great boon to farmers now, with the scarcity of labour. Also due to the cost of artificial manures now, all farmers are concentrating on making enough farmyard manure for their requirements.

Mr. Barron, agreeing with Mr. Morrissey, said that no ordinary farmer can afford to buy artificial manure now. He knows that there are stores packed with artificial manure bought at £10 a ton and it would not be sold under £18 a ton.

A member suggested that the Department be asked for a subsidy to purchase. Mr. Barron—It should not be subsidised. The price should be controlled by the Minister. He also heard of well-to-do farmers who had houses packed with manure.

Proposing a resolution, which was passed unanimously, "That the Minister be asked to investigate the price of artificial manure, Mr. Barron said the Minister wants increased production, but you can't have increased production without manure and with the prohibitive price of this, this year, he can't have increased production of artificial manure. Mr. Quirke said he understood it's the sulphur ingredient in the manure which is required for war is the cause of the increase.

It was decided to draft a scheme of subsidies for the purchasing of farmyard manure distributors.

SINGLE DIPPING OF SHEEP

The Committee approved the suggestion of Mr. Leahy, that the County Council in the supply Single Dipping Type Dip for sheep dipping.

WINTER AGRICULTURAL CLASSES

The Committee approved the holding of above class at Touranema, Fenor and Clones. An application for a class for the Kilgobnet Young Farmers Club was adjourned for the present.

Dungarvan District Court.

Held on Wednesday before Mr. O'Riain, D.J.

General Licenses.—Mr. Williams, Sr., was granted, on behalf of Mr. N. Casey, Dungarvan, an occasional license for Ocean View Hotel for Dance run by the Slagh Cua Gun Club.

Licensing Prosecution.—Superintendent O'Flanagan charged Robert Keane, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, with a breach of the licensing laws at 9.5 p.m. on August 26th, six men found on the premises were also prosecuted. Mr. Williams, J., for the defendant admitted the offence.

Insp. Croke said when Garda entered the premises they found glasses, the lady in charge said there was nobody on the premises, but on going out to the yard the Garda found six men there. They told them that they were guests just back from a funeral and had one drink.

Mr. Williams said the Superintendent had stated the case very fairly on this particular Sunday evening the defendant was at the cinema. When the Garda called the lady in charge, she said that there was nobody on the premises. This is the first case against Mr. Keane, who bought the premises about two years ago. He asked the Justice to consider adjourning the case for a period. The Justice granted an adjournment of six months.

Wireless License Prosecution.—The Department of Posts and Telegraphs prosecuted Mr. Finlan, T.J. Murphy Place, Abbeyville, an unlicensed wireless set. Mr. Finlan, Solicitor for the defendant who had now taken out the license.

Lights on Vehicles.—The following were prosecuted under the Light on Vehicles Act, 1929: A fine of 2/8 was imposed in each case—Mr. McCarthy, Adromone, Thomas, McCarthy, do.; John Finn, Talowee, do.; Michael O'Brien, Loughmore, John Slattery, Ballycragh.

Charles McGowan, Enright, Begley and Gblin, Dungarvan, were complainants.

Driving License.—Gd. Crowley, Cappagh, prosecuted Mr. Evans, Tarry, Dungarvan, with: (1) failing to produce a driving license; (2) failing to produce certificate of insurance. Fined 5/- and 10/- respectively.

A Series of Larcenies.—The Attorney General prosecuted a young boy named Ernest Hendrick, 31, Cathal Brugh Place who appeared on remand with 1/2. The larceny of a gold watch value £45 and a mouth organ value 1/-, the property of James Moore, Cappagh; (2), Breaking and entering on remand with 10/-; (3) Breaking and entering the house of Philip Heaney Knockmann, and stealing therefrom, value 10/-; and a pack of playing cards, value 1/6; (4) Breaking and entering at Ambrose Kennedy's, Ballytra, and stealing a lady's bicycle, value £7.

Sgt. Browne deposed to arresting the defendant who in answer to the charge said, "I admit the offence." He was asked for a remand for 14 days to enable him to make further inquiries.

Mr. Morrissey (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs.) who appeared for the accused suggested that he be subject to a medical examination during the remand period and handed the Justice a Doctors Certificate. He thought the Inspector would not disagree with that request.

The Inspector said he thought it advisable.

Accused who is at present being treated in the Co. Hospital, was then remanded on continuing bail to the next Dungarvan District Court.

Damage to Telegraph Insulators.—Two young boys from T. J. Murphy Place, Abbeyville, were charged by the Attorney General with being concerned in damage to 25 telegraph insulators valued at £3 2/6.

Mr. Langan, Solrs., who appeared for the two boys said one admits damage to six and the other to 5 insulators. He could assure the Justice that such conduct is not typical of any of the two boys who are members of most respectable families.

A 1/- fine was imposed on each boy, one of whom is to pay 15/- compensation and the other 12/6. Decree for Possession by Consent—The Justice gave a decree for possession of a house at Lackanure, Dungarvan, to the Soldiers and Sailors Trust Fund against Patrick McGrath, the original tenant.

Mr. Kenny who represented the Trust said that the house was now unoccupied.

The case was adjourned from the June Court on the application of Messrs. Farrell & Morrissey, Solrs. on the question of purchasing Patrick McGrath's interest. Messrs. Farrell & Morrissey now agreed to the decree being given.
