Kilmacthomas Court

The cutting of signal wires during the months of August and September at McGrath's level crossing at Curraghanna, on the railway line between Kilmacthomas and Dungarvan, had a sequel at Kilmacthomas District Court, before Justice J. J. MacCabe.

Mary Barry, an unmarried woman, then residing with her uncle, the gatekeeper, and stated to be at present an inmate of the County Home, was charged with cutting the wires, the property of C.I.E., the amount of damage not exceeding £50.

The summons was amended, including the actual amount of damage, which was stated to be £25 2s. contumacy to section 51 and 52 of the Malignous Damage Act.

Supt. Lyons, Tramore, prosecuted, stated that on several occasions during the months of August and September this year home signals were found to be cut. The Garda investigated the occurrences.

This girl at this time lived with her uncle in the gate lodge, and on the morning of September 3 they saw her cutting the wires. She admitted doing so, as well as on the other occasions. She made a statement in which she stated that she cut wires so that she might be taken away from the place as she was pregnant.

Mr. Morrissey, solr., Dungarvan, admitting the offence on behalf of the defendant, said that her uncle would undertake to pay back the amount of damage at the rate of £1 a month. She was now in the County Home, Dungarvan, where she would be better looked after.

Supt. Lyons—Subsequent to making the statement to the Garda she cut the wires again on the following day.

Expressing the fear that if the defendant continued to reside at the level crossing she might involve herself in some danger the Justice said that he would bind her over herself and £1 to come up for conviction and sentence if called upon within 12 months and the would make it a condition of the bond that she would cease to reside for three years at this place. He would then apply the P.O.A.

It being stated that she would be in the County Home for only a short period, the Justice rescinded this decision by adjourning the case for one month.
