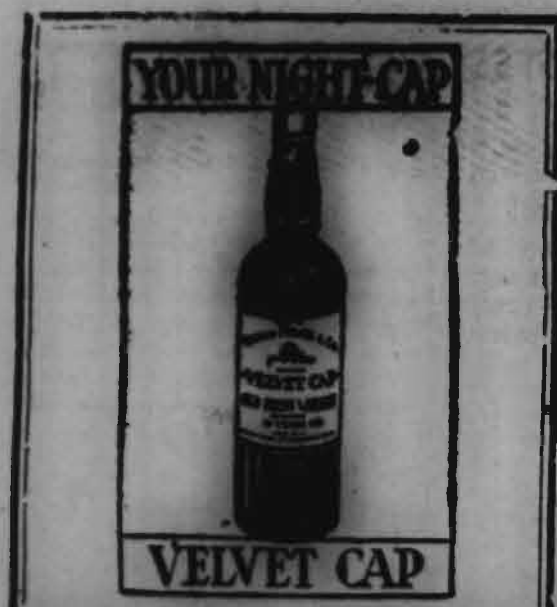

HEAVY FINES FOR MOTORING OFFENCES.

Dance Licences.—In connection with the question of the number of persons to be admitted to dance halls, the matter was again adjourned when a letter on behalf of the Chief Fire Officer, who is ill, was before the court from the County Council Secretary.

Dangerous Driving of Motor Car.—Supt. Flanagan charged a young man named Bertie O'Leary, Toor, Aglish, with driving a motor car in a dangerous manner on the public highway to Section 91 of the Road Traffic Act. (1) Driving without a licence. (2) Failure to keep the vehicle for a reasonable period near the scene of the accident. (3) Driving without road tax on August 19th. (4) Driving without road tax on 18th September.

Thos. Meehan, Toor (a passenger in the car) was summoned for aiding and abetting in the commission of the offence. There was also a summons against Bert O'Leary, owner of the car.

Mr. Williams, solicitor, for the defendant, pleaded guilty to the offence and the defendant's lawyer will swear that they never knew they were there.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor, (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) held a watching brief for an interested party.

The Superintendent, outlining the case, said that on August 19th about 11.30 a.m. four boys left the cinema and cycled out the O'Connell road, where they met another boy and two girls to whom they were speaking. Sometime after 12 o'clock they noticed a motor car coming along from the group the car swerved and struck two of the boys and then swerved out to the centre of the road again. Andrew Hogan (19), one of the boys struck, was seriously injured and was unconscious for a long period. The accused drove off and when going back to Aglish circumvented the town.

Mr. Williams said the Superintendent had stated the case very reasonably. The reason the car swerved was that the client was dazzled by the light of another car.

Bertie O'Leary, in reply to Mr. Williams, said he was 20 years of age and the son of a farmer, who is an invalid. He has three brothers and three young sisters depending on him for support. On this particular occasion he was driving and his brother and sister accompanied by Thomas Meehan and they decided to go to a dance at Clonea. As he was about to pass by the six or eight people

he saw on the road a car came along and the lights from this dazzled him. He stopped the car about 100 yards further on and asked Meehan if he felt a bump and Meehan said he did not. He then drove away and after going along further he got a puncture and when he went to change the wheel he found the spare was also soft. They then decided not to go to the dance. He is prepared to swear he did not hit anyone. The car was not taxed as it was in a garage for the first month of the quarter for re-bearing and repairs to the gear box. Previous to this his brother Thomas came to Dungarvan to tax the car, but would not get the tax as he was five minutes late. Witness is employed collecting milk and delivering it to Clonmonee Creamery.

Superintendent.—There is a further summons for using the car untaxed on 18th September.

To the Superintendent, witness said when he stopped the car both he and Meehan got out and looked for a few moments and heard no shouting. It was about a mile further on they stopped to change the wheel. The car was turning to Aglish in its short as going through Dungarvan.

To the Justice witness said he is three years driving every day. He would not swear now that he struck two people. He would avoid the car coming towards him and was dazzled to a certain extent. When he saw the bump in the mudguard he thought he must have struck something, but did not know what. The sergeant asked him about the accident at 11 o'clock the following morning.

Thos. Meehan, replying to the Superintendent, said he had evidence of the previous witness was correct. He was sitting on the left hand side of the car and felt no bump. O'Leary stopped the car and the two of them got out but saw nothing.

To the Superintendent, witness said he did not give a shout in the car or hear shouting when he got out on the road. The road was completely empty as far as he could see.

Superintendent.—There was a shout heard from the car.

Thos. O'Leary deposed to taking the car to Dungarvan to have it taxed, but being five minutes late at the taxation office he would not get it.

Mr. Williams expressed to the Justice to deal leniently with the case in view of the age of defendant and the fact that he was supporting an invalid father three young sisters and a young brother. He said the car which came against defendant on this night was a Hispano Suiza and the Justice is aware that even with the big headlights of those cut out the small lights would dazzle an approaching driver. He would therefore ask the Justice to extend such leniency as he possibly could.

Superintendent.—All my witnesses are agreed that the car did not stop, but that it slowed down.

LOCAL HAPPENINGS

ACKNOWLEDGMENT. NOLAN—The widow and relatives of the late Willam J. Nolan, Medical Hall, Main St., Dungarvan, wish to return grateful thanks to all those kind friends who sympathised with them in their recent sorrow, all who sent Mass cards, telegrams and letters of sympathy and attended the obsequies, and trust that all will accept this as an expression of their deep gratitude.

Summer Time Will End on October 21st—Summer time which began on April 15, will end officially at 2 a.m. on October 21, when the clock will go back one hour.

Expansion of Rural Electrification—The Electricity Supply Board, which has completed the installation of 145 districts of approximately 25 square miles each, is at present working in 21 further areas. Each year about 50 new local schemes are completed. It is understood that the board hopes to complete the task of rural electrification within the next two years.

Flour and Bread—The Minister for Agriculture wishes to announce to all those engaged in the flour and bread trade that the administration of the flour subsidy has been transferred from his Department to the Department of Industry and Commerce. Enquiries and correspondence relating to flour and bread should in future be addressed to the Secretary, Department of Industry and Commerce, Griffith Barracks, Dublin.

Dutch Coal Vessel Arrived at Dungarvan—The m.v. "Bernard The Fifth," a Dutch boat taking a cargo of 200 tons of coal to Dungarvan, ran aground on a mud bank a few hundred yards outside the entrance to the local quay on Saturday last and is still firmly held. The vessel while entering the harbour got caught in a reef of tide as she was making for the entrance to the quay at a spot just off the lock-out. Efforts to get her off over the week-end failed, and as the tides are low, it is unlikely that the vessel would get off before the end of the week.

Local Greyhound Success—The racing at Waterford Greyhound Track at Kilmacshock on Saturday night last was of the highest order, and the big crowd present had plenty to enthuse about in watching the performance of the best trackers in Munster and Leinster all out to annex the Waterford Inter-County Shield, the winner receiving £150; 2nd, £70; 3rd, £10 and unplaced finalists, £5 each.

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Registration of Electors—All householders who have not yet filled in and posted their registration forms without delay. The form is numbered E.A.1. If you have not yet received the form it will be delivered in the near future and you are asked to send it back at once when you do get it. It is hoped that the public will cooperate in the effort being made to facilitate the task of registration. Lists of Electors are prepared by the Rate Collectors and Inspectors, and are checked against the registration forms received from householders.

Death of Mr. W. J. Nolan

It is with sincere regret we chronicle the death of Mr. W. J. Nolan, M.P.S.I., Main Street, Dungarvan, which took place at his private residence, Church Street, Dungarvan, on Sunday, September 30th. The late Mr. Nolan, who in his young days was a well-known athlete, won the Munster Junior Championship for 440 yards, the Munster Junior Cross-Country Championship for two years and the Junior 220 Yards Championship. A gentleman held in the highest respect in Dungarvan since his advent here in 1903, he had in addition to his Dungarvan business flourishing branches at Kilmacshock and Portlaw, where in those centres he was in Dungarvan he was the utmost respect and confidence. His life was one of continued and energetic industrial and sporting activity, in which the fruits of his labour were always in evidence. He possessed a keen and bright sense of humour and a personality ever ready to help the less fortunate of his neighbours. The late Mr. Nolan was well known throughout Waterford and adjoining counties, where down the years his services as judge and starter were sought by various athletic bodies. He was also keenly interested in swimming, and was one of the founders of the Dungarvan Swimming Club, to whom he presented a perpetual challenge cup. His many friends throughout the county who heartily sympathised with his widow and relatives in their sorrow.

The remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan, on Monday evening week and the attendance which was large, was representative of all classes of the community throughout the county. On arrival at the church the coffin was carried by the Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., who was assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Cummins, P.P., O.S.A., Dungarvan; Fr. Lyons, and Rev. D. Power, C.C. On Tuesday morning solemn Requiem Office and High Mass for the happy repose of his soul was offered, after which the funeral took place to Inceogha's Co. Cork. Rev. Fr. D. Power, C.C., Dungarvan, was celebrant of the Mass, at which Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., presided, while 12 other clergymen chanted the Office and responses.
