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KILROSSANTY'S THREE IN A ROW EMMETT'S FOR JUNIOR HURLING FINAL

Two closely contested games were decided at the Waterford Gaelic Field on Sunday last when Kilrossanty took their third Senior Football Championship win by defeating Kill in a replay of the drawn game on the score of 1-1 to 1-0 (drawn game scores on 30th September 1-3 all). The attendance was very large, the gate receipts being £218. The replay was a hard, dour struggle, with both defences equal to the demands made on them by the forwards. The condition of the field after the previous day's and night's rain and the churning-up it got in the previous hurling match tended to slow up matters considerably. Pace and kicking from good positions nearly cost Kilrossanty the match, but in the second half they just had what they needed to pull through. Though Kill put up a great fight, the wiles, in a ratio of 3 to 1 in favour of the champions, goes to show how the game was won. The only spell in which Kill showed supremacy was in the last ten minutes of the first half when they had a great goal by Casey. Mick Whelan replied with a point for the champions after 10 minutes of the second half and a dropping ball by W. Kirwan was fumbled by the Kill goalkeeper and full-back, which the umpires adjudged inside the net and the green flag went up for Kilrossanty to give them a point lead, which they held to the end.

Kilrossanty were without their star inter-county men, M. Prendergast, centre-half (through a recent bereavement), and P. Fitzgerald (centre-field). This no doubt threw the champions out of their stride, but Tom Veale, former inter-county and inter-pro, star, made a great comeback to fill the centre-field position. The college lad, Colm Cunningham, had a very good match despite the heavy going, while J. Power, J. White, veteran Johnny Cheasty, McGuire and Kirwan brothers, J. Loneragan and J. Doyle were all to the fore in the champions' effort.

Tom McGrath, Casey brothers, Corcoran brothers, P. Power (goal) made gallant efforts, but were defeated for Kill. Kilrossanty attacked and sent wide before N. Casey tested P. Fitzgerald in the Kilrossanty goal, who cleared to centre-field, and with Cunningham fouled, J. Power sent the free. Further frees to the holders were beaten off with power saving in fine style, with good covering from E. Casey. A succession of frees to the champions yielded no score, the forwards driving very wide. Kill per T. McGrath, had a chance of a score, but Doyle nipped in to quash the attack. The first score, a major for the champions, was scored by Casey. Erratic shooting lost many scores for the holders, who ended the first half scoreless.

The second half play was mostly confined to the Kill half, but Corcoran (2) and Casey (2) nullified all the efforts of the champions, whose shooting was high and wide. Ten minutes leaped before Kilrossanty's first score came, a point by M. White, followed by a goal by W. Kirwan that the Kill goalie and full-back had fumbled. This they held to the final whistle.
