Harney accomplishes during the year. The following figures are the Association's expenses: general visits paid, 2,250; dental health visits, 3,137; dispensary and nurse's home, 2,034; patient visits to mothers, 164; tuberculosis visits, 44; patients seen at T.B. clinic, 210, total, 7,839. It also seems probable that it is not realized how great are the Association's expenses: how very dependent the Association is on public subscriptions. It is necessary to find over £300 per annum and apart from a Government grant of approximately £70, the Association has to run various functions and make an annual collection to meet this heavy expense. It should be possible in a town with about 6,000 population to collect most of the £130 annually and if the public realized how dependant the Association is on public support, we feel sure they would give even more generously. If it were not possible, through lack of funds, to continue this very charitable work, the poor of the town would lose a friend and much expert professional help. We, therefore, appeal to our many subscribers in the town and country to help us to continue to retain the services of an efficient nursing organisation. The public have helped us to keep the Association going for 20 years, in spite of continuously rising costs and we look forward to their support as heretofore no matter what difficulties may lie ahead. It is also hoped that the very energetic committee will continue their support by regular attendance at meetings and other functions.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Mr. D. Leahy, Chairman, presided at the quarterly meeting of the above at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Other members in attendance were—Messrs. Jas. Quirk, N. Walsh, M. McGrath, M. Butler and Liam Morrissey.

Votes of Sympathy.—The following votes of sympathy were passed in silence after which the Council unanimously decided to adjourn the business of the meeting for one hour as a mark of respect to the late Canon Power, the deceased member of the late County Council, who died on the 14th November last.

Cowled Light in Lismore.—Mr. Campion complained that the cowling on the lamps near the tower clock, residence, are unable to see the time, and said it would be only a matter of minutes to get the cowls removed.

Water Supply at Four-Mile Water Area.—The Council on the proposal of Mr. Fahy, seconded by Mr. P. Butler, approved the adoption of the above scheme as submitted by the engineer at an estimated cost of £13,720. The various extensions are estimated therefor were given separately.

Stradbally Water Scheme.—Mr. Kyne questioned the County Surveyor on the likelihood of having a start made by the contractor to the above who is held up waiting for delivery of pipes. Mr. Kyne held that there is six months' work necessary before any pipes can be laid down. There are at present about 30 men unemployed in that area and if the contractor started work it would absorb these unemployed men for the coming months.

It was decided to contact the contractor. Mr. Kyne and Ballinacully Water Supply.—Replying to Mr. L. Morrissey the County Surveyor said the gaugings taken at Bannastock in connection with this proposed scheme are good.

Ardmore Water Supply.—In connection with the proposed extension of the above supply to Crossford, Mr. Doherty, B.E., reported the extension would involve the laying of a 3-inch main 4,450 yards, at an estimated cost of £2,200. There are 19 houses along the route.

It was decided before discussing the matter further to ascertain if all are prepared to take a supply from the extension.

Kilnockanagh Supply.—The engineer's report on the extension of a water supply to Ballycose, which is to supply six houses (21 cottages) recommended an extension of 700 yards from Ballinacross at an estimated cost of £700.

Replying to Senator Butler, the County Surveyor said the supply will be from a public fountain.

Senator Butler—I suppose that distance will be a considerable distance from some of the houses.

Mr. M. Morrissey thought the estimate very high.

On the proposal of Senator Butler, seconded by Mr. Ormonde, the Council approved the extension.

Estimate for Pump.—In connection with the proposal to sink a pump at Kilnockanagh, the Health Inspector reported 15 occupants in 5 County Council cottages. The engineer's estimate for the sinking of a pump was £430.

Old I.R.A. Men.—When a letter was read from the Secretary of the Old I.R.A. Men's Association in Dublin, the Chairman proposed the adoption of a resolution on the subject.

Mr. Roche said a lot of people had good pensions. He himself had a pension, but there are men who did just as much who have no pension.

Mr. Quirk—I agree. I have a small pension. He thought they should pass a resolution asking the Government to reconsider all the Old I.R.A. men's cases again. These pensions should be gone into fully not that anyone want big money but they want their services recognised. He knew of cases of men who were even refused medals.

On the proposal of Mr. Roche, seconded by Mr. Quirk, the following resolution was passed unanimously—"That we, the members of the Waterford County Council, propose that existing pensions of Old I.R.A. be increased proportional to the cost of living, and that the claims of all the Old I.R.A. who have good active service be sympathetically and favourably considered."
