## Apple Factory Fatality INQUEST ON THE LATE MI. COLEMAN

### Death from Cardiac and Respiratory Failure.

Death from cardiac and respiratory failure was the verdict at the inquest held at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, on Friday, November 30th, on the body of Michael Coleman, aged 23 years, who was stated in our previous issue had died as the result of injuries sustained when he fell through the roof of the new Apple Grading and Packing Factory at Shandon.

Mr. T. C. Williams, Solr., Acting Coroner, presided. The State was represented by Sgt. Flannagan, Sergeants Browne, Liddane and Guard Farrell. Mr. P. J. Morrissey, Solr. (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) represented the Apple Factory.

The following jury, of which Mr. N. Kelly was appointed foreman, Messrs. T. Lannon, C. Cummins, R. Keane, J. Dea and Michael Kelly.

Ed. Coleman, Davis Street, father of the deceased, gave evidence of identification. He saw his son at 10.30 a.m. on Thursday at the Co-Op. Fruit Growers' Factory at Shandon. He was at work on the roof of the factory when it was under construction.

He appeared at the time in his usual good health. Deceased always enjoyed good health. He had been employed constantly at the factory since 18th April last from 8 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. Witness next saw his son at 11.10 a.m. He was then lying on the floor and was told his son had fallen through there. He appeared to be badly injured and was removed to hospital.

To Mr. Morrissey, Solr.—The deceased lived with his wife and the other occupants of the house are witness's wife and three sons, one aged 22, another 20 and another seven years. Deceased and the other two boys are not working presently.

Thomas Sandford, Thomas Terrace, Dungarvan, said he is employed in the capacity of general foreman by the Co-operative Fruit Growers' Society Ltd. He was responsible for the erections of all scaffolding for protection and construction purposes. The work at which the deceased was employed on the roof is hazardous work and because of that witness had erected platforms between the roof and the floor to intercept workers who might fall. Prior to the accident the deceased had been helping a glazier. Witness is in charge of all workers there and gave instructions to all workmen on the roof, including the deceased, not to stand on the asbestos sheets forming the roof except where the sheet is bolted to purlin underneath.

The roof consists of horizontal purlins on three of which is laid a 10-foot sheet of asbestos. It is dangerous to stand on the sheet where not supported by the purlins, but it would be safe to stand on an area of about one foot from the supports. Despite witness's instructions, he saw people walking on the roof and always reprimanded them. At the time of the accident all the roof was closed in. The deceased would have greater freedom of movement if he did not keep to the safe area of the roof. This boy was particularly careful as regards safety measures and was a particularly good worker. In his fall, the deceased struck a platform one plank resting on other planks, from which he rebounded. This threw him away from the safety platform.

To the Coroner, witness said that when the roof was covered in it was not possible for anyone on the roof to know where the safety platform was.

To Mr. Morrissey, Solr., witness said he was not sure whether the safety platform, 6 feet from the roof, consisted of 6 or 7 planks. The platform was in fact just under the only section of its roof where work was in progress.

Mr. Morrissey—When outside on the roof isn't there in fact supports are?

Witness—Yes. There are 3 support purlins under each 10-foot length of sheet. Any time witness saw a man walking on the asbestos, he severely reprimanded the man. Every workman knew of the order about walking on the roof.

Surgeon B. McCarthy, District Hospital, Dungarvan, said the deceased was admitted to the hospital at 11.20 a.m. on Thursday. He was deeply unconscious and bleeding from the left ear and showing signs of respiratory and cardiac failure due to his severe head injuries. Those injuries were consistent with having fallen from a height. There were no other injuries obvious with the exception of a small laceration on the left

hand. He died at 1.16 p.m. To Superintendent Flannagan, witness said the deceased was on the platform with any other part of his body except his head marks would be left. Deceased may have had internal injuries. In his opinion, the cause of death was cardiac and respiratory failure due to laceration of the brain as a result of fracture of the base of the skull.

Dr. Cusack said he saw the body at the factory at 11.10 a.m. He was lying on the floor on his right side and was deeply unconscious and bleeding from the left ear and nose. He was obviously in a very critical condition and witness arranged for his transfer to hospital, where he ceased to breathe later. He is in entire agreement with Dr. McCarthy as to the cause of death.

Mr. Sandford, Keating Street, said he is engaged as a carpenter in the construction of the factory. He was working himself on the roof with the deceased and himself were the only people on the roof at the time. When the last sheet was put in position it shut off the view from the inside. Deceased went to shift some capping from the sheet next to witness and as he moved toward witness he walked across a sheet which he stepped on and he fell through. The breaking sheet made a loud noise. The deceased had only come on the roof about 1½ hours before. He was a careful worker and was not inclined to take risks.

To Mr. Morrissey, Solr.—Witness was at the bottom of the sheet standing on the glass portion of the roof. Deceased was at the top standing on the apex and had two purlins to support him there. Witness moved up to the centre of the sheet and deceased walked off the purlins and witness saw him fall through them immediately. The hole he went through was only three feet wide and less than four feet from purlin to purlin.

James Ryan, Yougnal Road, said he was sitting on a scaffolding up against the roof, passing bolts through the purlins and asbestos to the man outside. He was about 26 feet from the ground and four feet from the apex of the factory. He fell on his back on the plank witness was sitting on and bounced off the roof. He then struck another platform of three planks about five feet further down from which he rolled and fell to the ground. When fall the deceased had his hands out as if to save himself.

To Mr. Morrissey, Solr.—The deceased fell on both platforms. The safety platform would be directly under where deceased fell if he hadn't hit the plank witness was sitting on.

Sean O'Brien, Abbeyside, said he was shifting glass plates on the floor when he heard the crash on the roof. Looking up he saw a man's leg coming through and then the entire body. He struck a plank about three feet from the roof from which he bounced and struck the other platform further down and the left arm struck a girder. He fell on the floor about two yards from where witness was.

Ed. Kirby, Shandon, said he was employed as foreman and had charge of scaffolding and safety platforms. All the same platforms as used during the job were there on Thursday. The safety platform was 6 feet from the roof and consisted of six planks placed side by side. He saw the deceased fall after hearing the crash.

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence was recorded. The foreman of the jury, on their behalf, expressed sympathy to the deceased's parents. This was joined in by the Superintendent, on behalf of the Gardaí and by the Coroner.

Mr. Morrissey, Solr., on behalf of the Fruit Growers' Society and on his own behalf, joined in the expression of sympathy. The remains of the late Mi. Coleman were removed to the Parish Church, Dungarvan, on Friday night when the attendance was of very large proportions. Requiem Masses for the happy repose of his soul were offered on Friday and Saturday mornings at both churches and in the afternoon the funeral took place to the family burial ground at Ballinroan, the attendance being again of very large proportions. The coffin was borne through the town on the shoulders of his former workmates. Rev. Fr. Power, C.C., officiated at the funeral. The chief mourners were:—Ed. Coleman (father); Mrs. Bridget Coleman (mother); Mrs. McGovern (sister); Mrs. Anne May (sister); Edward Deelan and Jimmy (brothers); Mrs. M. Hayes (grandmother);

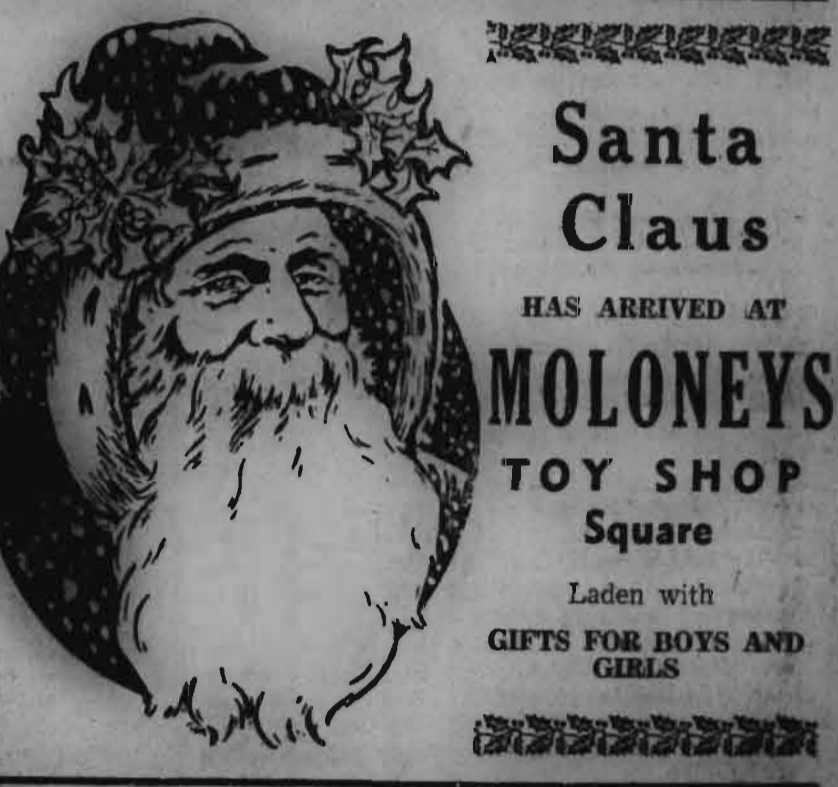
