Waterford Board of Public Assistance Inquiry Into Nursing Appointment Demanded

Councillor T. Gallagher, vice-chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above in the Court House, Dungarvan, on Monday last. Also present were—Messrs. T. A. Kyne, T.D.; M. Morrissey, solicitor; R. Barron, N. Kelly and M. Cullen.

Wardens' Duties.—Reading out of letters read from three persons nominated to act as Wardens for the issue of tickets under the Public Assistance Act stating they were not prepared to act.

Mr. Morrissey said he would like to have the duty of a Warden defined. At the present time Wardens are left to find out for themselves who is entitled to receive free medical assistance. He would also like to have a clear ruling on the area for which a particular Warden may issue a ticket.

Chairman.—The majority of Wardens will know the circumstances of the persons who apply for tickets.

Mr. Kyne—I take it that a member of the board can issue for any part of the county and that a Warden can only issue for his own area.

The matter was adjourned to the next meeting and the resolutions received were accepted.

Special Meeting.—Mr. Kyne raised the question of a request made by him two months ago for an inquiry into certain complaints arising from the appointment to a nursing vacancy in St. Patrick's Hospital, Waterford.

Mr. Kyne said that following the last meeting of the board he had been shown some correspondence by the County Manager in connection with the complaint and he was now anxious to know if it was the intention to place that correspondence before the meeting. The complaint was that Nurse H. Ryan, of 18 Bailey's New Street, Waterford, had been in the employment of the board in the Fever Hospital, Waterford, from the 4th August, 1951, to the 4th August, 1951, as a temporary nurse. She would like to be interviewed by the board in connection with the fact that a vacancy arose in St. Patrick's Hospital, Waterford, and she applied for the appointment. She was interviewed by the matron of St. Patrick's on July 29th, and was promised the position, to take effect on the 31st August. Nurse Ryan then gave the usual notice to the matron of the Fever Hospital, which was accepted on Monday, the 6th August. The matron of St. Patrick's Hospital informed her that the vacancy had been filled and she could not, therefore, take her on. Deputy Kyne, Nurse Ryan's father stated that he would like to find out why this was done, pointing out that he understood that appointments were given on merit.

Mr. Ryan said that he was now of the opinion that "there was something carried on behind closed doors," and he wished to see that justice was done.

The Board of Assistance supported Mr. Kyne's call for an inquiry when the matter first came before them two months ago.

Mr. O'Hare, Secretary, informed Mr. Kyne that he was not in possession of the correspondence in connection with the case and, therefore, could not place it before the meeting.

Mr. Kyne—Would it not be possible to get it and put it before us? This is a very serious matter for all concerned.

The Secretary replied that it would not be possible to get it, as it was in the possession of the Manager and he was away that day.

Mr. Kyne—I suggest that there is an evasion of the fact that an inquiry was called for. But as long as I am a Labour representative I will make sure that when people make statements or complaints and when they are prepared to stand over those statements and even travel in doing so at their own expense, they will receive every hearing.

Mr. M. Morrissey suggested that the matter be adjourned to the next meeting to give the Manager the opportunity of being present when the matter could be dealt with fully.

Mr. Kyne replied that he felt that an effort was being made to "smother" this case privately, and he would not stand for that. He believed that the correspondence should be there before the board at their meeting, as it was the property of the board. He felt that a special meeting should be held to deal with this matter.

Chairman (Mr. T. Gallagher)—Are you in a position to get it to-day?

Secretary—No.

Mr. Kyne—We are in the position to demand it and to put what I am doing. After two months it should be before the board. The reply received by the County Manager to whatever inquiries he made should be here before us to-day, and I might mention that a very significant fact is that the matter is not even on the agenda.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

An Fear Mor, V.C., and subsequently Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above on Monday. Other members in attendance were—Messrs. M. Creagh, N.T.; Tomas O'Faolain, D.S.; Dr. Deane, Jas. Mansfield, J. Ormonde, T.D., M.T.; N. Kelly, N. Walsh and M. Hart.

Approval of Appointments.—Letters read from the Department approved of the part-time appointment of Sean Frenzel as teacher of Irish at the rate of 7/- per hour, and of the appointment of Ed. Greene as part-time teacher of woodwork and drawing at 7/6 per hour.

The committee decided to ask the Department to approve the latter as part-time teacher of maths.

A further letter from the Department stated the Minister is now prepared to sanction an allowance of £100, together with tuition fees to holders of Domestic Science Scholarships at Central Bridge Street, Dublin. The former allowance was £70.

55 Worth of Tools.—Correspondence from Messrs. Booth Bros. notified the members that James Rice, a pupil of the Ballysaggart Woodwork Class, had won one of their prizes in the 1950/51 Session.

The C.E.O. said the winner was a pupil of Mr. Murray, Woodwork Instructor, and the prize consisted of £3 worth of woodwork tools.

Chairman.—That is very satisfactory.

Insurance Contributions.—The committee, on the advice of the Department of Education, decided to pay to the Department of Social Welfare a sum of £153 5s. 6d. in respect of arrears of insurance contributions from part-time teachers. It was pointed out in the Department's letter that there was no point in the committee holding out any further; that the Department of Social Welfare would make arrangements to pay the arrears.

Adjourning.—The committee adjourned an application for an increase from 7/6 to 10/- an hour received from the Physical Culture Instructor, Mr. Frazer, Talow.

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

In the absence of the Chairman, and Vice-Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D., on the proposal of Mr. McCarthy, seconded by Senator Butler, presided at the Urban Council meeting on Friday last. Other members in attendance were Messrs. O'Dwyer and Lee.

Town Hall Improve.—The Clerk, replying to the Chairman, said the present position is that a licence for short dances was applied for and received. The licence for long dances to be applied for when the repairs are carried out.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.—The following applied to the Council for supplementary grants towards the erection of houses: William Burke, Bernadette O'Donoghue, Patrick Murphy, John O'Shea, Maurice Browne, P. J. O'Neil, and John O'Neil.

Chairman.—We catered for 30 houses in this scheme. How many applications are now received?

Clerk.—A total of 24.

Mr. Lee—I propose we accept all these applications.

Mr. Lee—I second the proposal.

Mr. O'Dwyer—Tell them straight that if they accept the grant, they must pay the full rate.

Chairman.—Yes, it's on this understanding the grant will be given.

CLUBS REGISTERED FOR DANCING.—Further applications from clubs to register for dancing in the Town Hall were read from Comrades and the Dungarvan Literary Club.

Chairman.—Connradh na Gaelsiúne is I take it, the same club as the Manager has already granted the Hall of?

Clerk.—Yes. The Manager granted the Hall in anticipation of the Council's approval, as this club had applied for a certificate.

RE-CONSTRUCTION GRANT.—The Town Planning Consultant, reporting on the application of Mr. P. O'Gorman, O'Connell Street, for re-construction grant, stated that eventual clearance and setting back of frontage line was desirable and accordingly he would not recommend extensive repairs or alterations.

A further report from the Consultant stated he would not recommend permission for such extensive work unless the Urban Council was not required to make a re-construction grant.

Mr. McCarthy said he strongly objected to the contents of that letter. This man made application in August last and now after four months it is refused.

Senator Butler—who made the report?

Clerk.—Mr. W. O. Morrissey, Chairman.

Mr. McCarthy—Did the clerk get a copy of this letter to read for the Council?

Clerk.—No.

Mr. McCarthy—That is very unfair to the Council.

Chairman.—There is no likelihood the frontage will ever be moved back.

Mr. O'Dwyer—This is the widest part of O'Connell Street. He complied with every regulation.

Chairman Yes. One paragraph in the report is extraordinary, that permission will be given if the Council are not asked to give a grant.

The Chairman proposed that a strong protest go from the Council to the Manager and this was agreed.

SHOP (HOURS OF TRADING) ACT.—A letter read from the Irish Tourist Association in connection with the proposal of the Minister to review the above Act, was on the suggestion of the Chairman referred to the Secretary of the local Small Traders for their views. The Council could then discuss the matter.

FLOORS AT LOUGHMORE.—Mr. Ormonde, B.E., in a report referring to the remarks of Mr. Lee at a previous meeting, stated that all floors are perfectly satisfactory and if not abused, should give a very long life. What Mr. Lee suggests could be done and while his suggestion will more than double the cost of the floors and reduce unduly the height from floor to ceiling, it will not prolong the life of the floors any more than the present scheme.

COUNCILLOR'S COMPLAINT.—Arising out of a statement by Mr. Kelly at a previous meeting that he had to employ a tradesman to stop leaks in his house at Murphy Place, Mr. Ormonde, B.E., reported that on an inspection made after two successive nights rain, the only sign of dampness was a small spot near the chimney, which could easily have been remedied if reported.

Mr. O'Dwyer—Mr. Kelly stated that he had to employ a tradesman. It may be after this that the inspection was made.

RENTS REDUCED BY 9d.—The Council were unanimous in their decision to sanction of the Department, applying the sum of 9d. to the rents of those houses. The Clerk said this would work out at a saving of 9d. on each house.

A suggestion by Mr. Lee that the reduction be given only to unemployed persons residing there was considered impossible to work.

LAVATORY ON SQUARE.—The Engineer's report only three sites available:—The Square, The Linn and at the Bridge. He estimated the cost of an over-ground lavatory in any of the three places at £2,500 and semi-underground on the Square at £3,000.

Mr. Lee—The Council should recommend The Square. Sewers on the Square are 10 to 14 feet deep.

Chairman.—The Bridge or the Linn are out of the way.

The matter was adjourned to the Estimates meeting.

RESOLUTION APPROVED.—The Council unanimously approved a resolution from Bunrana U.D.C. disagreeing with the present system of letting houses and asking that the Housing Regulations be amended so that houses may be let on the recommendation of the local dispensary doctor.

Mr. O'Dwyer, proposing the adoption, said its only right seeing the unfair way the houses had been let recently.

Mr. Lee seconded.

WELL AT SPRING.—A letter from the Secretary, County Council, informed the meeting that the above was being attended to.

LIGHT AT LOADING BANK.—The Engineer, reporting on the completion of this work, stated a public light is desirable, as the situation is rather dark after lighting-up time.

The matter was adjourned.

MEMORIAL.—The Council took no action arising out of a letter received from Dr. Nyhan, Sunnyside, Commons Road, Cork, suggesting the erecting of a suitable memorial to commemorate the memory of Dominic Collins, S.J., hanged at the Clock Gate, Voughal, in 1692.

SIMPATY.—Resolution of sympathy were passed to the relatives of the following:—The late Mrs. McGarry, Main St.; Michael Coleman, Davis Street; Wm. Sandford, Mitchell Terrace; James O'Gorman, Main St.; Michael Ronayne, Coolcarra; and James Havens, Loughmore, on the death of his daughter.

Assistance Officer's Action Questioned

Mr. Kyne asked Mr. Phelan, Chief Home Assistance Officer, would let the members know what constitutes the right of a person to receive Home Assistance. He said that from the Act the right appears very clear, but the practice makes it clear for the sake of the person who by lawful means was unable to support him or herself. He would also like to know if their officials had the right to demand a medical certificate from an applicant to see that the applicant is ill and unable to work.

Mr. Phelan replied that Mr. Kyne's definition was not correct. With regard to point number two, when an applicant applies for home assistance, he must fill up a form which sets out a number of questions concerning the health of the applicant in order to clarify the duration of payment. A certificate is usually necessary in this case.

Mr. Kyne—If a certificate is produced, has the officer a right to question it beyond that? Surely, the Home Assistance Officer is paid on the production of the Medical Certificate and surely a doctor's word on a matter of health should be taken before the word of one of our officials. I want to get it made very clear to all officers that they have no right whatever to question the certificate of the doctor concerned in the case.

Mr. Phelan—I doubt if it would be as easy as all that. If a young person applies it must be made known whether his or her complaint is of a permanent nature or not.

Mr. Morrissey thought that the doctor would have to use his discretion in certain cases. He pointed out that the doctor would not like to let a patient know what he suffered from as the knowledge might be harmful to the patient. The doctor could state the probable duration.

When Mr. Kyne asked for list of all of those being paid home assistance, a long discussion followed. He pointed out that he had received a complaint from a ratepayer which he had taken in the form of a challenge that people were being paid assistance at the expense of the ratepayers and were not entitled to it at all. Finally, on the suggestion of the meeting, Mr. Kyne agreed to ask the person who made the complaints through the Press reports to supply detailed charges by the Chief Officer for his attention and these would be soon proved right or wrong.

Attendance Returns

The class returns for the month showed an attendance of 80 per cent, which was considered very satisfactory for this period of the year.
