"We must make a stand"—Clr. Curran Scandalous condition of bye-roads criticised

WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL

at the adjourned special meeting held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Monday, last decided by ten votes to six to provide in the estimate for the current year's road works scheme, the same amount as was provided in 1955/56, plus provisions for an additional amount to cover the increase in wages which was granted to road workers last year and for a smaller sum which may be awarded during the current year.

A proposition by Mr. H. Dewal calling on the Minister for Local Government to increase the grants for road works because of the higher cost of labour and material was passed unanimously.

Mr. M. Morrissey, Chairman, presided. Mr. Walsh—Is there any information from the Department as to the grant that will be available? Secretary—Not yet.

Mr. Walsh—I suggest that in the absence of that information we defer the question.

Mr. M. Harty said he thought that they were entitled to do a lot more for the Gaeltacht area. He added that the Minister should be called on to give immediate attention to the roads in the Gaeltacht area.

Ald. Kennelly—The Gaeltacht grant is allocated every five years. I think it is £5,000 in this county. Chairman—There is a suggestion that we defer this. If you continue deferring it you will find yourself bang up into the estimates time.

Ald. Kennelly—What time last year did you get notification of the grant? Secretary—It was on March 2nd.

Mr. Walsh—Certainly I think it would be bad business to pass this without knowing what the regional meetings last year. Why not have them again this year. At present, he added, they were only labouring in the dark.

Mr. K. Keane—I propose that we have a special meeting. The Co. Manager suggested that they go ahead with the proposals on the basis of last year's grant. The estimate had to be completed by the end of March and that was in order.

Deputy Ormond—Can we not arrange for the regional meeting to-day?

Ald. Kennelly—What had the ratepayers to pay for road works last year?

Manager—The gross total including the Dungarvan urban roads was £237,953 and that included the grant.

Ald. Kennelly—The Council put up £117,000. If we get our total commitments last year surely we can work on the same basis this year.

Chairman—There is an notice of motion for the next meeting for increased wages for road workers; we shall have to make provision for that.

bye-roads. It is a national problem. Some of these roads, which are used by the people who are the mainstay of the country are in a scandalous condition.

Ald. Kennelly—How much money is allocated out of the rates to the main roads?

Mr. Quirk—I am of the opinion that it is practically a waste of money spending on the main roads every year. It could be done every second year and it is also unnecessary to side-clean the main roads every year.

Mr. S. Lynch—I agree; I think that a lot of money spent in that direction should be diverted to the bye-roads.

Mr. Quirk—How much would we have spared last year if we had turned from side-cleaning of the main roads to improve the county roads?

Mr. Sheedy—You must side-clean the main roads.

Mr. Quirk—I think it is a waste of money to be doing it every year.

Mr. Fomes—Isn't it ridiculous to be side-cleaning the county roads; it does not take the water away.

Chairman—If you cut out side-cleaning you are going to have unemployment.

Mr. Quirk—You are not; I intended to divert the money to the bye-roads.

Deputy Ormond said that he noted that a number of councillors had proposed road works that would cost up to £17,000.

At this stage the Deputy proposed that a special meeting be held to discuss the road work scheme.

Mr. C. Curran said that not enough practical work was being done and that the public were of the opinion that too much money was being spent on machinery.

Mr. Walsh said the Council's machinery was paid for out of a grant.

Mr. Quirk—Why not do the roads that are bad, I am speaking broadly of the roads that are very bad and I think something extra should be done for them.

Ald. Kyme asked was there any area where the money called for was not badly needed.

Mr. Sheedy said there was not, but added that these questions should be discussed at the regional meetings.

Mr. Walsh—When this provisional estimate came before us last year, what did we do? We waited until we knew about the grant.

In reply to Mr. Lannon, Mr. Sheedy stated that the members could discuss all roads in their areas at the regional meetings.

Mr. Quirk—There is a certain sum going for each rural district and some rural districts better than others.

Ald. Kennelly—At least three-quarters of the money to be paid by the ratepayers is going on the county roads. The grant is much higher in the main roads.

Ormond—You can

traveling over a road in this county for over thirty years. There was a bad bend on this road. When the bend was removed he had four court cases about it.

Ald. Kennelly—We have 800 miles of county roads and we are doing twenty-five miles every year. It is going to take twenty years to do the roads. The work on the road at Kilmacthomas was money well spent.

Mr. Harty—If the amount of money that was spent on the road at Kilmacthomas was spent on other roads in the county, we would not be where we are to-day.

Mr. Ormond's proposition was agreed by ten votes to six, and Mr. Sheedy's proposition was passed unanimously.

It was also agreed to appoint a member of the council in each electoral area to hold a public meeting to discuss the road works scheme.

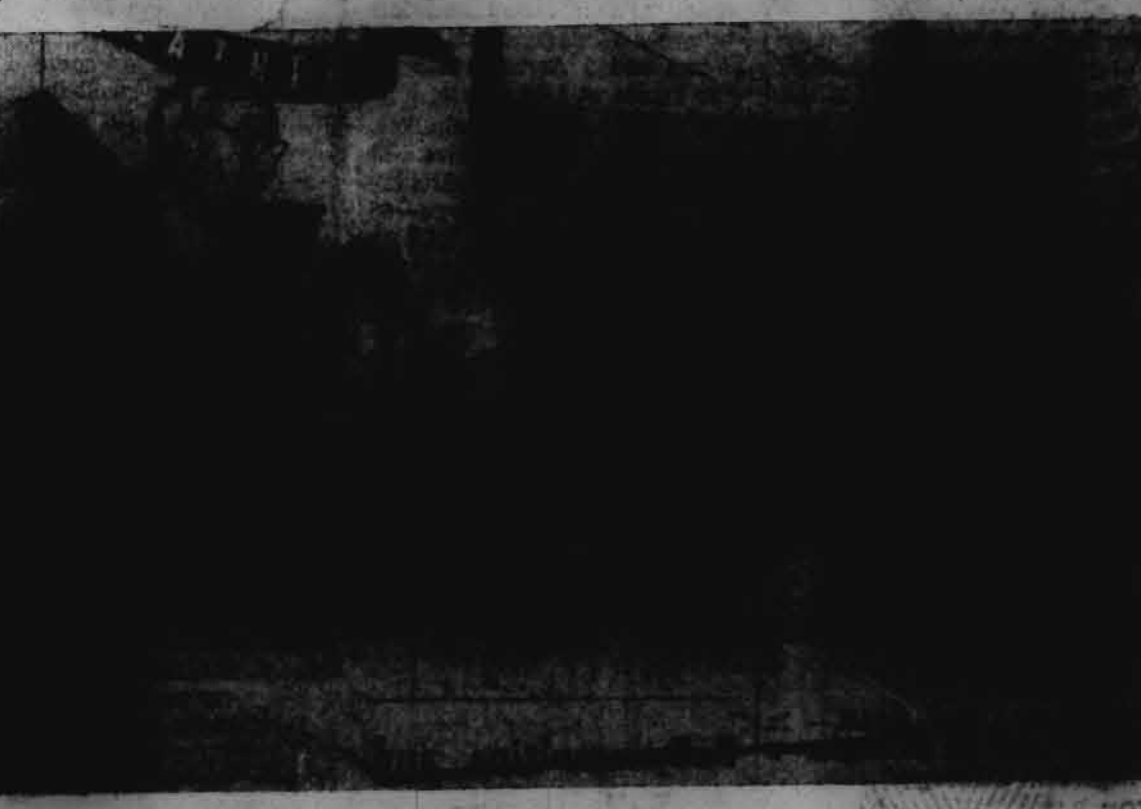

After the members had expressed conflicting views, it was agreed to adjourn consideration to a special meeting on Monday evening next when it will be decided whether or not the report is to be made public.

Retaining Fees—Station officer, £48 per year; sub-officer, £38 per year; driver mechanic, £28; firemen, £24.

Hourly Rates—For attendance at calls and fires—14 per hour for fire; 8 per hour for part...

It is my privilege to prepare and present this annual report for your consideration, and in reviewing the work of the past season let it be recorded that the year under review was by far the most successful in the history of the Deise Gaeldom. While it is gratifying to be in a position to report our greatest success, I do not wish you to be misled by a "yard stick" of finance, more important to my mind is the playing of our National games strictly in accordance with the rules of the Association. Admittedly, most of our games during the past year were played in a sporting manner but when we of the Association within the Deise County cannot play away from the fact that some of the games played lacked true sportsmanship and were not by any means a credit to the Association. Last year you will recall our County S.F. final had to be abandoned due to an encroachment of the playing pitch, luckily enough the game was deferred and a decision reached. We had a similar occurrence in the 1955 final and the County Board decided to abandon the game. Surely this is a matter of grave concern to the Association in the County. That decision was appealed to the Munster Council and the Provincial Body unanimously upheld the decision of the Board but the County Council were of the opinion that it was a matter of grave concern at such happenings in the County.

Our many commitments within and without the county were of a very congested nature but due to the aptly co-operation of the majority of the teams clubs and players it is gratifying to report that our entire programme was completed within the year under review. Reports from the Divisional Conventions for your adoption clearly show the healthy position in the divisions and both areas were organised and giving grand operation to the parent body.

The most noteworthy of our achievements during the past season was the solid foundations laid by the Juvenile Committee. The Avonmore Juvenile Committee was formed during the year for the first time with J. O'Connell, M.P., the leading light. The response was most encouraging and it was decided to run a juvenile hurling championship for boys under 14 years. A set of trophies for same was presented by the Western Board. The first round games were in the nature of preliminary rounds and the winning team in each case having the option of selecting from the defeated team in the competition proper. The idea was to assure that as many boys as possible would be introduced to the game. In all eleven games were played giving a total of twenty-three teams. The first rounds provided some great games and helped to give the competition a great start and also aroused a great public interest and enthusiasm. In the final Affane defeated Talloy by ten points. In the semi-final the team had senior league experience, but once again we were second best. Our Minor Footballers also failed to the Kingdom representatives in the first round at Dungarvan.

National Hurling League Our first game was at home to Kilkenny and the team gave a promising display to fall narrowly. Away to Meath in the fourth round we had our first victory in the competition. Away to Dublin in the concluding round the team gave a poor performance and were well beaten in a high scoring game. Abbeyside showed rare form in accounting for Ballyduff and 41 Sion had a high scoring victory over De La Salle, who had already accounted for the Meagher's. Abbeyside further enhanced their reputation with a win over Tourin and Clonsilla failed to the Champions. Mt. Sion, in a thrilling semi-final game at Dungarvan, the final created county wide interest and a record crowd witnessed the Dungarvan venue to help set-up a record in gate receipts. The final could not be described as thrilling, nevertheless, a grand exhibition of county hurling was witnessed and it was only in the closing stages that Mount Sion snatched vital scores to earn yet another title.

Motions provide food for brisk discussion

Mr. Lee commenting on the statements of Mr. Lannon stated that it was not fair to the members that they should be subjected to the attack that was made on them by Mr. Lannon. He protested strongly stating that he went among the workmen of the town and heard their discussions on the whole case and the managers of the council chairman had been held up to ridicule as very unfair.

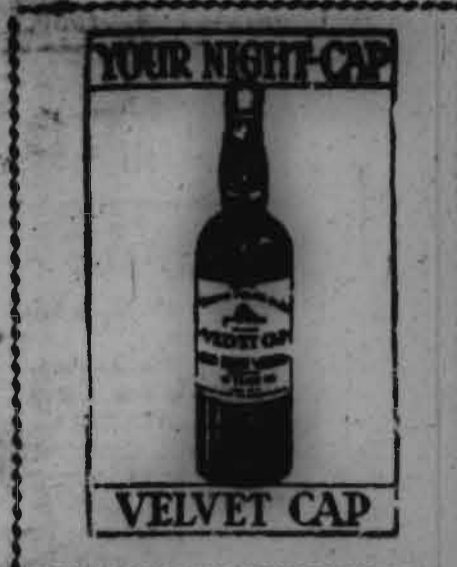
