### Late Mr. Redmond Bransfield

 It was with profound regret that friends and admirers learned of the lamented passing of Mr. Redmond Bransfield, an event that occurred at his residence, Lackensilla, recently.

The deceased gentleman, who had attained the ripe old age of eighty five years, was held in the highest esteem of all who had the pleasure of enjoying his acquaintance during life's journey, a fact that was reflected in the generous attendance both at the removal of the remains to Aglish Parish Church and again at the interment in the adjoining cemetery.

A highly progressive member of the farming community, he was also a keen ploughman and participated with good deal of success at several competitions in the early years of the century.

Accompanied by a cortege of friends, he was buried on Saturday December 22nd and was blessed and received by Rev. D. Slattery, C.C. assisted by Rev. J. Murphy, and Rev. Fr. Foley at the Church gates. On the following morning, following the celebration of Masses of Requiem, all that was mortal of the deceased was laid to rest in Aglish Cemetery.

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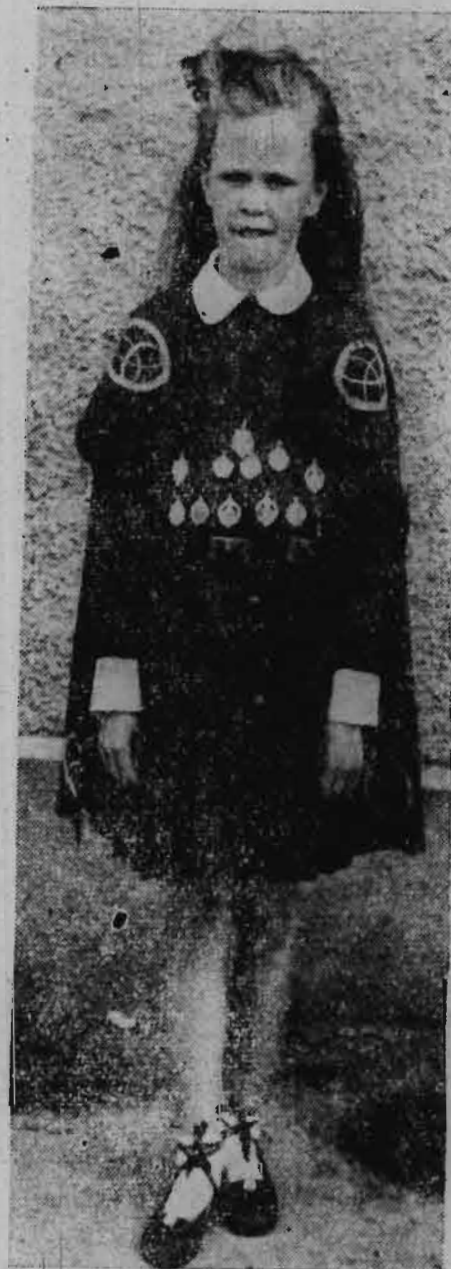

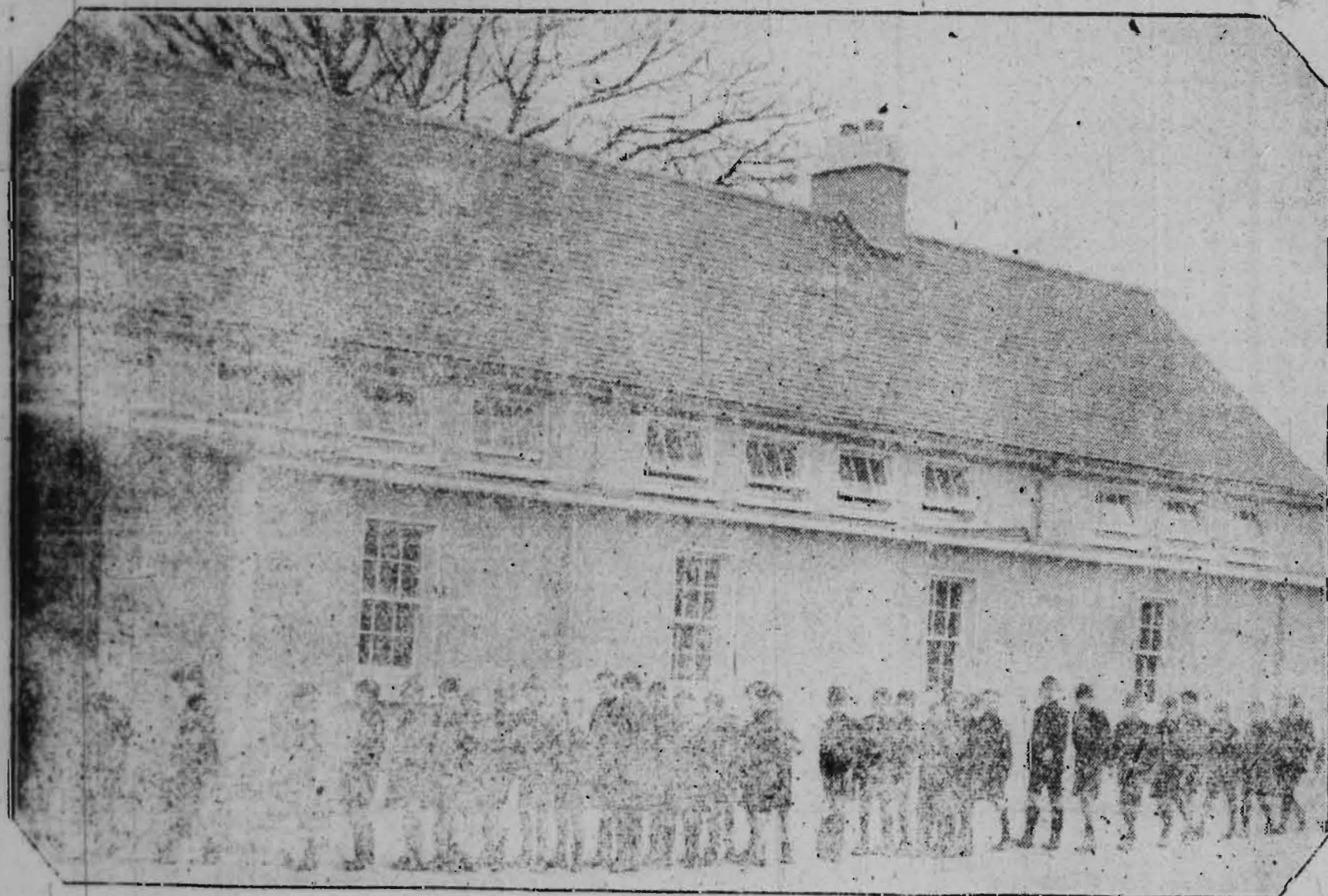

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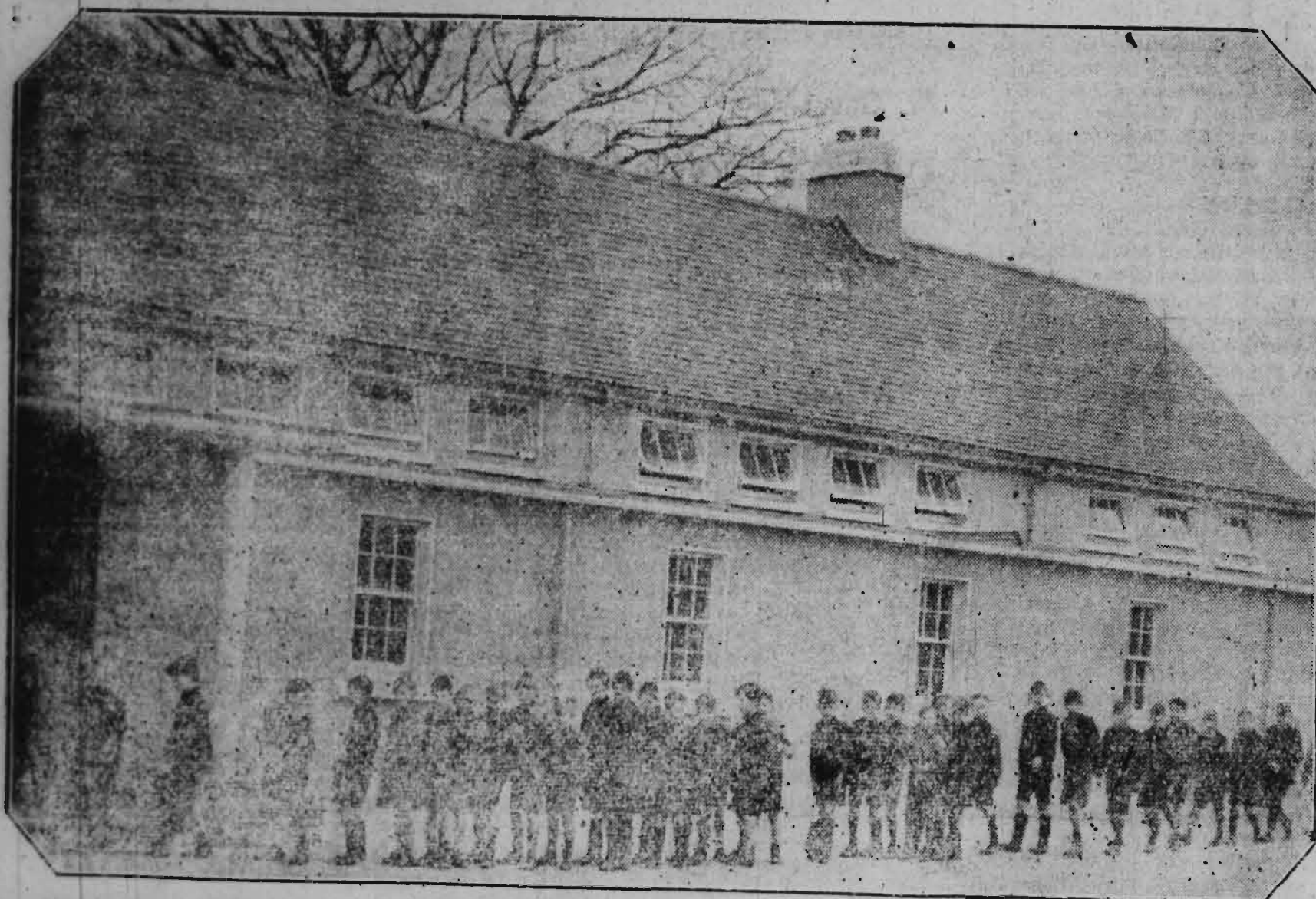
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
