Champ does it again

We are indebted to a Middleborough (England) reader for the following clipping from an English paper:

UP UP AND AWAY!!!

The withdrawal of food subsidies, dearer cigarettes, tobacco, petrol and beer, and greater allowance for workless children were the features of the Budget introduced by Dr. Ryan, Minister for Finance in the Dail on Wednesday.

The Minister, faced with the necessity of eliminating a prospective deficit of eight million pounds on current accounts, estimated that the most he could raise by way of increased taxation was in the region of £5,000,000.

Dr. Ryan announced an increase of a penny a pint on beer, twopence on twenty cigarettes and 2 1/2d. per ounce on tobacco and six pence per gallon on petrol and diesel oil.

Subsidies on bread, flour and butter, which cost over £3,000,000 a year, are to be abolished. There would be a complete de-control of butter and flour prices.

To offset the effect on food prices, there would be an increase of 4/6 monthly in children's allowances and one shilling per week on unemployment assistance.

Death by strangulation TRAGIC PASSING OF LOCAL MAN

THE story of what happened when a Dungarvan girl working in England sent home £3 to her brother, Mr. James Street of 12 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was told at an inquest held in Dungarvan Court-house last Friday night, to Dr. Di. Healy, Lismore, Coroner for West Waterford.

The young man told the jury of how he gave one of the three pound notes to his father, Mr. Patrick Joseph Street, who went out and got drunk and returned home and to his bedroom where he was last seen alive.

The inquest was held into the circumstances surrounding the death of his father, Patrick Joseph Street, who was found strangled with his leather belt around his throat in his bedroom on Thursday morning.

The wife of the dead man, Mrs. Hannah Street, told the Coroner that her husband was aged 48 years. She lived with him at 12 Cathal Brugha Place as did her son, James, and her daughters Marie and Nellie. She last saw him alive on Wednesday night at 11 o'clock.

"At 11 o'clock in the morning," she stated, "he went down town and returned again at about 2 o'clock bringing a pig's head with him which I cooked for the dinner. He had a good share of drink taken at this time. He had a cup of tea and some meat and left again at about 3 o'clock. He came home at the night at 10 o'clock and on this occasion he had a good deal more drink taken. Myself and my two daughters were there when he came in. He was shouting and started fighting me. I asked him if he would have a cup of tea which I prepared for him on the kitchen table. He did not have it but swept all the delph off the kitchen table, breaking it on the kitchen floor. He threw the tea mug which struck Marie and cut her over the left eye."

Mrs. Street continued—"During all the time he was shouting and using bad language as if he had lost control of himself. He then ran out to the hall door which was open and drove his right fist through the glass panel breaking the glass and cutting his right hand. He then went upstairs and kept shouting down above. Marie ran out for James who returned with her at about 11 o'clock. He asked his father to calm himself and come down and have some tea. He didn't come down but instead, commenced to throw things down the stairs. One of these things was the end of a heavy iron bed and this ripped the plaster from the wall as it came down. Nobody went up the stairs to him."

Witness went on, "at around midnight he calmed down a bit. During this period I threatened that I would send for the Guards. I did not send for them however. I had often sent for them in the past and they had often come to the house. If I had sent for the Guards every time I had cause to do so, they would be at the house very often."

"I asked why he had broken into the things and he said he did not break them. I saw he was drunk and asked him to come down for a cup of tea. He had done a good deal of work when I arrived. On that morning I had received a letter from my sister in England containing £3. I was down town with my father to sign (at the Labour Exchange) at about 11 o'clock. I gave him £1 to do what he liked with it but I warned him if he got drunk to come in quietly. I said this because of his behaviour when he came home drunk. It was usual for him to beat up the inmates of the house and break windows and other contents of the place when he had drunk taken."

Witness continued, "I attacked my father and would intervene on her behalf. On this particular night, I did not go near or touch him. I remained in the kitchen at the fire until around 3.30 in the morning. About 12.30 p.m. or 1 a.m. he shed down several times calling 'Boys' which was the name he called me usually. I did not reply. When I did not, then heard him call Marie when

ten. When he calmed down, the two girls and I were in the front bedroom and James was out in the kitchen. I heard my husband call Marie who replied 'what'. He then said 'will you do me a favour'. Marie told him she would and asked what it is."

"Mrs. Street added 'My husband often said things like this and I did not take him seriously. He also said to me that night that I would soon be carrying a bunch of lilies and he made the same statement to me a few days before that.'

At this stage, Supt. P. Flanagan, representing the Garda Authorities, produced a narrow leather belt which witness identified as her husband's. "He was wearing a belt," she stated, "as he was standing on the stairs that night. I saw the belt around his waist. I saw that it was and his throat on the following morning."

Concluding her evidence she said that what went on in the house on Wednesday night was one of the many incidents while her husband was alive and had drunk taken. She said that when he struck her no one ever struck back. She told the court how she found her husband dead in his bedroom shortly after 9 o'clock on Thursday morning.

Marie Street, daughter of the previous witness, supported the evidence given by her mother and added: "On the night of my father's death at about midnight, I heard him call my name a number of times. I did not answer for a while but he kept on calling me. Finally, I said 'what' and he replied 'will you do me a favour'. He was speaking from the top of the stairs and I did not see him. He said 'say good bye to all of them for me.' I heard him then walking back into the room. I saw him the next morning at 9 o'clock when my mother told me he was dead. I went in to his room and saw that he had a bed around his neck, the end of which was attached to the bed. We laid and shoulders were raised off the floor and his heels and out-socks were resting on it."

James Street, son of the deceased, stated in evidence that he lived with his father and no one else. He last saw his father around midnight on Wednesday last. At that time he was on the landing of the stairs and was shouting and throwing things down. Witness did not go up to him. He had a conversation with him. "I asked why he had broken into the things and he said he did not break them. I saw he was drunk and asked him to come down for a cup of tea. He had done a good deal of work when I arrived. On that morning I had received a letter from my sister in England containing £3. I was down town with my father to sign (at the Labour Exchange) at about 11 o'clock. Last year he celebrated his silver jubilee. In 1931 he was appointed to the College of St. Saviour and later of St. Saviour's. In 1947 he was appointed Prior and since then has endeared himself to the community and all who visit the Cistercian Abbey on the Knockmeadown.

The new Abbot has received messages of congratulations and good wishes from all over the world.

P.O.A. APPLIED
Supt. Flanagan prosecuted Michael John Walsh, Knocknacrocha, Cappagh, under the Game Preservation Act, with setting fire to gorse without notifying the authorities.

Garda C. Egan, Cappagh, said that he investigated a fire which occurred at Knocknacrocha, adjacent to a plantation. He interviewed Mr. Walsh who admitted without lights.

Garda Giblin, Farrall, Dungarvan, was complainant. A series of charges were preferred by Supt. Flanagan against Pk. Wall, Ballinacum, who pleaded guilty. The charges included: Obtaining £1 by false pretences from Bridget Power, O'Connell Street, obtaining £1 by false pretences from Rd. Moutray, O'Connell St.; obtaining £2 from Thomas Carroll, Mitchel St.; breaking and entering the premises of Mr. John Keane, Wry Street, and stealing £15; stealing a gent's bicycle value £7; waterproof overcoat, value £2-10-0; a message bag, value 4/6 containing meat, tea, sugar, cigarettes and rino, value £1-11-6. Total £11-5-11.

The Supt. explained that the accused had been drinking in Mr. Keane's public house on the day in question and returned later that night entering through the back and knowing where the money was kept, took it.

With regard to the larceny of the bicycle, the accused had been drinking in a public house, and when he came out he found the bicycle with the bag on it and took it.

The Justice after suggesting sending the accused to jail for six months on two charges to run concurrently, agreed, with the suggestion of the Supt. to a further six months to be added to the sentence to pay back the money which he profited to do.
