Live Stock Breeding Act, 1923 LICENSING OF BULLS

All bulls calving during the months of July, August, September, October, November and December, 1956, will reach the prescribed age on 30th September, 1957, and must be presented for inspection as to their suitability for licensing purposes before that date.

Applications for licences to keep such bulls (accompanied in each case by the prescribed fee of £1/2) are required under the provisions of the Act to be lodged with the Secretary, Department of Agriculture (Section 9), Dublin, not later than 31st July, 1957. Applications received after that date will be subject to additional fees which will not be refunded.

Bulls in respect of which applications for licences are received will be inspected during the month of August at approved local centres.

Two All-Ireland Medals will form New Abbot's Ring

Right Rev. Dom Finbarr C.R.S., who once played hurling or his native Cork, will be enthroned as Lord Abbot of the famous Cistercian Abbey of Mount Mellery on Tuesday morning next. And the blessed ring that will be presented to him will carry the gold of two All-Ireland hurling championships medals, won by the famous Cork hurler of a quarter of a century ago, Mr. Jim Hurley, now secretary of University College, Cork.

The former champion presented his medals to Dom Finbarr, his lifelong friend, as a bond of their friendship. It will be a big occasion in the life of the great Abbey. At least eight Abbots, three Bishops and an Archbishop will attend. The President, Mr. Sean T. O'Kelly and members of the Government have also been invited. The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity, T.D., will be unable to attend but will be represented by his son, Vivian.

The ceremony will be performed by His Lordship, the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. Most Rev. Dr. D. Cahanan, Assisting him when he hands the Crozier to the new Abbot will be the former Lord Abbot of Mount Mellery, Dom Celsus O'Connell, who retired recently due to ill health.

26 YEARS AGO. The Abbot of Mellery was last performer at Ballymore twenty-six years ago. It is one of the most dignified ceremonies in the Church. They open with the recitation of the Prætor who is met at the main entrance of the Monastic Church by the Abbot Elect and two assistant Abbots. The Abbot Elect hands the holy water sprinkler to the Bishop who sprinkles it all round. Then they go in procession to the side altar where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved for the occasion and kneel for a short prayer.

The lesser ministers enter the Presbytery. Then the Bishop and Abbot go to the High Altar. After vesting, the new Abbot and his assistants go before the Bishop. The senior assistant makes the petition for the Blessing. Other curates follow as in the Ritual and finally the Abbot Elect takes the required oath of fidelity. Then Mass begins.

The new Abbot stands at the Bishop's left. After a little time he goes and puts on his Mass vestments, gets the Missal and reads from it simultaneously with the Bishop, up to the Gradual.

Then the Bishop sits while the Abbot Elect prostrates at the Gospel side. The Seven Penitential psalms and Litanies are sung. The Bishop rises and prays over the new Abbot. Before the end of them, the Abbot rises to his knees and the Bishop imposes his hands on his head. At the end of the prayers, a copy of the Holy Rule of the Order is presented by the Bishop to the new Abbot. Then the Crozier is blessed and handed to him also.

Next the ring, presented by a friend of the Abbot and specially made to include the two All-Ireland medals of Jim Hurley, is blessed and presented to the Abbot. Then the Bishop gives Pax.

THE OFFERING. After the offertory prayer the Bishop sits. The new Abbot approaches followed by five monks with the offering of 2 lighted candles, 2 loaves of bread and 2 small caskets of wine. The new Abbot kneels before the Bishop and presents these gifts. Mass is continued.

The Abbot reads the Missal placed on a rest in the middle of the Sanctuary. He receives Holy Communion at the usual time on the altar step. After giving the Blessing, the Bishop takes his seat and the new Abbot kneels before him. He puts the Mitre on the Abbot, blesses the white gloves and hands them to him. Then the Bishop leads the new Abbot to the Choir, place him in a stall and hands him the Crozier. The Te Deum is sung by the Choir and when it is concluded the Abbot and his assistants walk through the Church, the Abbot giving his blessing to all. When he returns to his stall, the 147 Monks come forward in seniority to kiss his ring and receive his blessing.

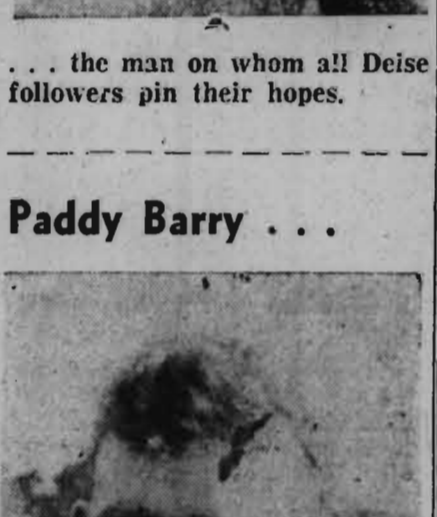

Remember '48!

CORK STOPPED IN SENSATIONAL FINAL

THE obvious relish with which we still speak of the county's memorable Munster championship triumph of 1948—the pride of our lone All-Ireland success—is probably the greatest illustration there is of the niche victory over our neighbours from the Rebel county enjoys in the huring recollections of Waterford's ever-faithful followers.

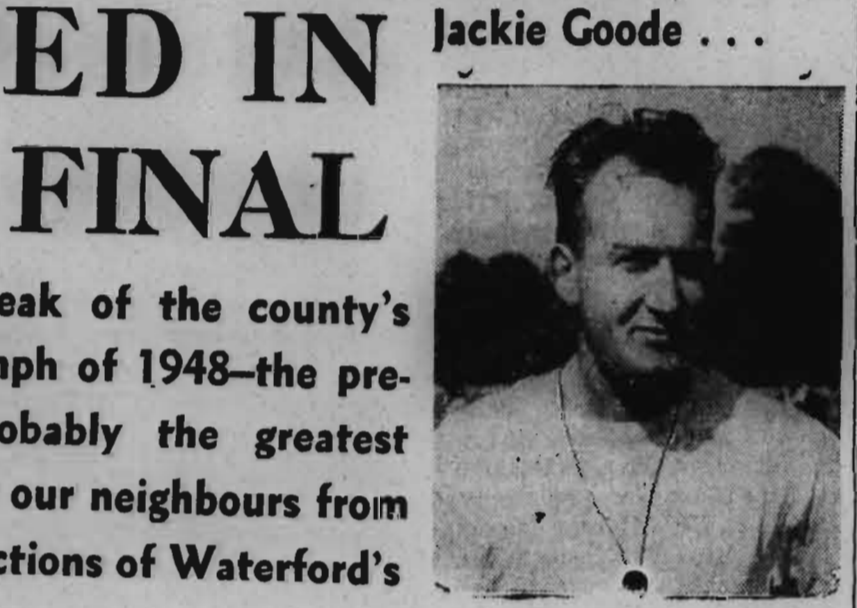
To-day, almost a decade afterwards, Sunday August 1st, 1948, is still exultantly recalled as the day we finally laid the red-jerseyed bogey in a provincial final.

The years between 1937 and 1944 comprise the generally accepted golden era of hurling in the Decies. Those were the days when Erin's Own, Mount Sion, Dungarvan, Portlaw, the Army, Tallow and Lismore sent out great teams and great men. There were tremendous battles for internal supremacy and the county invariably succeeded in putting a first-class fifteen on the "foreign" circuit.

But apart from 1938 when we buried their hopes in the rain-swept Frazer Field, Cork—or Limerick—inevitably had the Indian sign on us at the crucial hurdle. The Leesiders stopped us in the finals of 1942 and '43 and were again superior in the penultimate rounds of 1946 and '47.

And so to '48... and the great awakening. Clearly, our semi-final opponents, were not very highly rated. After an anxious last quarter we prevailed all right but the victory was not impressive. Sweeping changes were predicted for the decisive bout.

Second Thoughts The selectors' initial effort was poorly received. There was an immediate outcry. The much-abused mentors, now minus the wise counsel of John Keane who had resigned in protest, had second thoughts. The Clones youth, John Cusack, was called in to full-back, Andy Fleming reverted to the right and veteran Mick Hickey, about whose fitness there were conflicting rumours in circulation, dropped out.

plans struck again for a goal by veteran Lynch, nowadays the general Minister for Education, that momentarily seemed to herald the landslide outside folk regarded as inevitable.

This was what we had waited for. Twenty-five thousand hurling fanatics—well the big majority of them at any rate—were on their toes rooting for the underdogs, and the white-jerseyed brigade proceeded to respond to a defence of encouragement in gallant fashion.

Hurling Confidently Captain courageous Ware follied the great Lynch in a Cork breakaway and Waterford came back for a series of wides. Again Lynch was thwarted in a full-blooded Cork assault, this time at the expense of a seventy which Ring duly pointed, and again the confidently-hurling Decies men hit back for a similar score per veteran Keane.

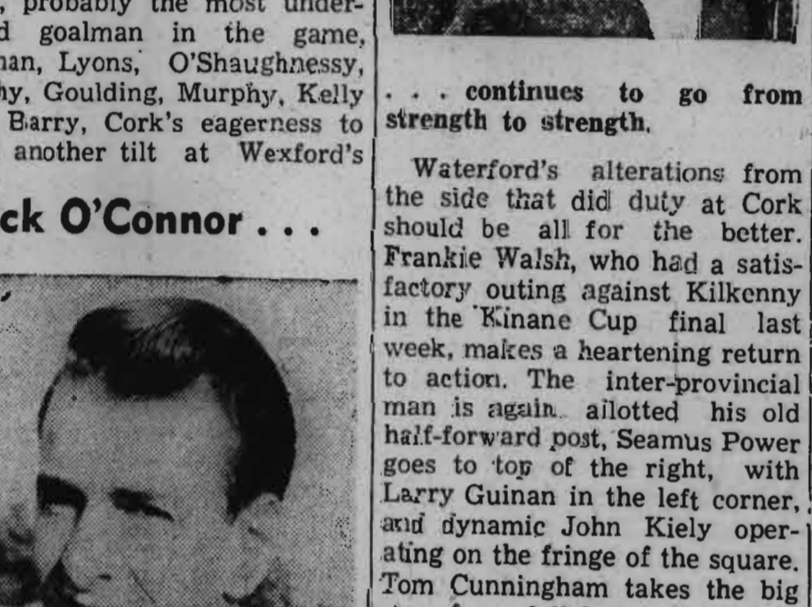
Thrills and Drama Let's live again in the ensuing commentary of the thrills and drama of August 1st, 1948—I almost said '57.

Most immediately the champions struck again for a goal by veteran Lynch, nowadays the general Minister for Education, that momentarily seemed to herald the landslide outside folk regarded as inevitable.

But it would be sheer folly to imagine that victory will be achieved without a full-blooded effort. Cork, be it remembered, are the greatest batters in the game and in a Munster final they remain a law unto themselves.

Potent Force The absence of Ring, still nursing a hand fracture, on top of Philpott's continued omission, is a severe blow, 'tis true. And the selectors' decision to again play chess with the redoubtable but ageing Willie John Daly—a defender against Tipperary, now listed as a forward—indicates a lack of suitable replacements.
