All because condemned houses were Re-occupied

A serious situation was disclosed in Dungarvan during the weekend when the Minister for Local Government informed the Urban Council that because 17 condemned houses had not been demolished as ordered, the Government subsidy of £22 being paid on 17 new houses is to be reduced by £11 on each house for the next fifty years.

This means that unless the occupants of the 17 houses at Davis Street and elsewhere vacate them immediately, the ratepayers of Dungarvan will have to pay an additional £187 or approximately 4d. in the £. in rates for the next 50 years—a total of £9,350.

It is possible that the Council will insist that steps be taken within the next few weeks to have the occupants of 17 houses evicted.

EX-SOLDIER BOUND OVER

A 67-year old former British Army soldier, John Fleming, of Knockmahon, Bonmahon, who pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking into the house of Mrs. Johanna Power and Waterford Co. Council, at Kilduane, at 3.25 a.m. on Sept. 14, with intent to commit a felony.

Mr. T. Kiersey, Solr., defending, said Fleming had six large bottles of stout in a local publichouse and had a black-out when he was going home and thought he was getting into his own house.

The Chairman pointed out the demolition orders were made and members of the Council had, therefore, done their duty without fear or favour. It was through no action of the members that brought about this shocking position showing a loss of £10,000—a very big sum of money to be imposed on the ratepayers and particularly on the tenants of new houses.

Mr. Kelly—There will be pandemonium over this in the town. As it is the people cannot afford to pay their rates; not to talk of slapping more on them.

The Chairman stated that it was the desire of all that full details of the case be made available. They wanted to know the names of the landlords, the names of the tenants and full details as to how the position came about. It seemed extraordinary to find that the Council should lose £10,000 for the want of carrying out the powers granted to it. "Or were we stopped by some outside source and if we were, then what source? I want to get the answers to the many questions involved in this."

The Chairman said that in addressing his remarks to the Town Clerk, they were in no way suggesting that the matter was his fault. He was in the awkward position of having only recently taken over. Any criticism they had made was not, therefore, directed at him.

Salesman on Embezzlement Charge

On the defendant undertaking to pay £2 a week compensation the case was adjourned in Kilmacthomas Court on Thursday for a month in which Edmund Power, Shanakill, pleaded guilty to embezzling £69 between Nov. 20th, 1956 and June 7th this year, received by him while he was employed as a van salesman by David Kiersey Merchant, Kilmacthomas.

Supt. Lyons, Tramore, said Power collected cash for goods sold throughout the countryside to about fifty customers of Mr. Kiersey. In June this year, the firm had occasion to examine his books and found some discrepancies. Mr. Kiersey had a conversation with defendant who admitted he had collected sums of money from customers and had not paid the amounts to Mr. Kiersey.

Already Power had paid back £10. The defendant was now working as a casual labourer.

The coffin was draped with the Tricolour and as the casket was lowered into the grave the mournful notes of the Last Post resounded through the cemetery.

The clergy in attendance at the obsequies which was presided over by the Ven. Archdeacon Power, P.P., V.F., were: Rev. Fr. Power, P.P., Kilgobnet; Rev. Fr. Farrell, C.C., and Rev. Fr. Byrne, C.C., Dungarvan.

Local Boxer's Great Display in Cork

On Friday night last at the City Hall, Cork, a record attendance witnessed the first tournament of the season. Three Dungarvan boxers travelled for this tournament, F. North, T. Sheehan and J. Woods. There was no opponent for North but Sheehan and Woods had bouts.

Sheehan was beaten on points by former Irish champions and Irish International J. Sweeney, British Railways, Dublin, while J. Woods made his first appearance of the season a winning one when the referee stopped his bout against J. O'Meara, Glen, in the third and last round.

Feature of the tournament was the form of the Dublin boxers, especially F. Teidt and H. Perry who scored rather easily over their respective opponents. Best opposition, however, came from the Dungarvan boxer, T. Sheehan, in his bout with J. Sweeney, an Irish champion and Irish international and what a close fight it was as many were under the impression that Sheehan was the winner.

Not a bit over-awed by the occasion, Sheehan went after his man from the opening bell and kept up the attack all through the round. The second round opened with Sweeney making a non-stop attack which Sheehan survived in good style but Sweeney's experience told in this round. In the third and last round it was Sheehan's turn and he landed some hard punches which had Sweeney down for a short count. Again Sheehan tore into his man and his opponent used the ring until Sheehan landed a hard right which had Sweeney again in trouble but before Sheehan could take advantage the final bell just saved Sweeney from being knocked out. Considering this was Sheehan's first bout of the season, he did very well indeed and was unlucky not to have got the decision.

The Woods v. O'Meara bout was a ding-dong fight from the beginning as both boxers gave of their best and surprisingly even though O'Meara was heavier than Woods it was Woods who had the harder punch and had his man down in the second round and pressed home his advantage in the final round. The referee stepped in and in order to save O'Meara from further punishment, Woods was awarded a well won contest.

On Saturday, November 23th the Dungarvan Boxers will have engagements in Limerick.

Not So Simple

Commenting on the Department's letter, Mr. Tom Lannen said that it seemed the official responsible had not done his duty.

Replying, the Town Clerk said it was not as simple as that. Before the demolition orders could be put into effect, the houses were re-occupied. The question before them as a result was "what could be done to get vacant possession?" There were no houses available to accommodate them and there was a lengthy priority list of applicants for Council houses. If houses were made available in the morning were those on the priority list to be by-passed to accommodate those who moved into homes that should not have been occupied.

Mr. Tom Lee questioned the position of those who bought some of the condemned houses and were living in them. He was told by the Town Clerk that as far as the Council was concerned, it was not aware of any sale of these houses. The Council had ordered their demolition.

Mr. R. Keane who stated he owned some of the houses involved pointed out that he purchased them before he was a member of the Council. He would like to know if the Council would still get the full subsidy if some of them were demolished now.

The Town Clerk replied to the effect that the Department allowed the Council a period of time to carry out the demolition and this was not done within the given time. It was not possible to do it.

The Chairman, Aid. Tom Kynne, T.D., stated that there was no doubt that the position was a very serious one for the people of the town and particularly for those on the waiting list of Council houses. "When we put people into new houses," he said, "we serve demolition notices on the owners of the houses they have vacated and insist that they go."

Town Clerk—Yes. Chairman—What proceedings do we take then? Who is responsible to see that our orders are carried out? That is what I want to get at now.

Take It into Court

The Town Clerk pointed out that the first consideration of the authority was to get the houses clear for demolition. They tried to get the keys of the houses as the old tenants moved out but they were "circumvented" by the tenants. They disposed of the keys. Legally, they should have handed them up.

The Chairman stated that there was nothing to stop the Council taking the case into Court now.

Town Clerk—If you are not in the position to enforce the demolition order is there any point in it?

Chairman—Supposing the Council rules that it is not in agreement with you that the officials have done all they should have done?

Mr. Keane asked if the Chairman would evict the people in the 17 houses to which Aid. Kynne replied that he would evict them rather than fleece the ratepayers and those tenants who have moved into new houses and who would have to pay that extra 4d. in the £. "The people who went into these 17 houses were trying to take a short cut to a new house. Will they have to be housed over the heads of all those on the priority list. They have come in here from outside, from God knows where. Why don't we carry out the law in this case. It would be awful to lose £10,000 in subsidies which would mean that every ratepayer and every Council tenant would have to pay an additional 4d. in the £."

Seek the Minister's Advice
Mr. Lee—This is very unfair. We are not doing our duty here. Chairman—I think we should seek the Minister's advice as to what we should do now.

Mr. N. Kelly—The Manager cannot be held fully responsible for this. The keys of the condemned houses should have been given up to the rent collector.

Chairman—If this was not done, then those concerned should have been prosecuted. I don't like to let £10,000 go away from us that softly and I won't either.

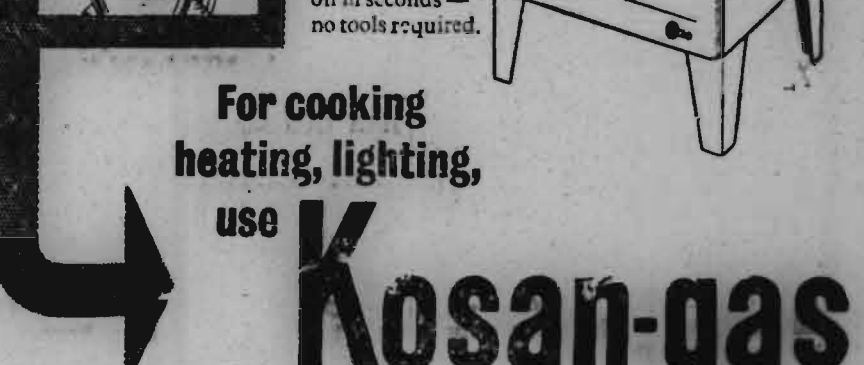

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (LICENSING OF PIG DEALERS) ORDER, 1957

PIG DEALERS TO BE LICENSED

Every person dealing in pigs will be required, under an Order of the Minister for Agriculture which will come into force on November 11, to hold a licence from the Department of Agriculture. The Order, which was signed by the Minister during a pig dealer as "a person by whom or on whose behalf pigs are purchased habitually or from time to time for quick resale."

Licence-holders will be obliged to conform to a number of regulations which include the keeping of full records of all transactions, whether buying or selling. They will also be obliged to keep their premises in a hygienic condition and to disinfect all vehicles in which they have carried pigs.

The Minister will have power to refuse or to revoke a licence at any time. The Garda may inspect pig-dealer's premises and vehicles which are being used to carry pigs and may question the person in charge, who may be required to show whether or not they are licensed dealers or acting for licensed dealers.

One of the main advantages of the new licensing system will be that in the event of an outbreak of contagious disease such as swine fever or foot and mouth disease, the records kept by the dealers will enable infected pigs and contacts to be traced without delay. A similar system was put into operation early this century and continued until about 1936, a period during which swine fever was of common occurrence in this country. This earlier system applied only to dealers supplying the Dublin area but the new arrangement covers the whole country.

Kilrossanty Qualify For Final, But Comeragh men far from impressive

Kilrossanty 1-5; Dungarvan 1-3

ALTHOUGH Kilrossanty, the proud architects of an unblemished twelve months run in competitive football, deservedly won their way to the final of the senior championship, the circumstances which hall-marked their semi-final triumph over Dungarvan at the Fraher Field on Sunday last certainly did not enhance the prospects of the blue riband again adorning the Comeragh sideboard within the immediate future.

Strangely casual and almost listless in their approach to the game, the wearers of the green and gold made exceedingly heavy weather of mastering what was loosely no more than a makeshift Old Borough fifteen.

This semi-final, of which so much had been expected, turned out to be a most disappointing show. The standard of performance hit a depth that was not even redeemed by the closeness of the scoring; the leather tended to perform unusual antics, there were tantalising errors of judgment by both sides and the general atmosphere made it difficult to realise that there was in fact a county final ticket at stake.

Indeed, outside of the sporting nature of the exchange and a couple of notable individual performances, the encounter was entirely devoid of any worthwhile features.

It demonstrated in no uncertain manner, though, that Kilrossanty, on this showing no more than a ghostly imitation of the greats which have kept the green and gold in the forefront of Waterford football over the years, will have to display a prodigious all-round improvement if the coveted championship crown is again to find a haven beneath the lordly Comeraghs.

Dungarvan, compelled to field a largely experimental team, turned in a fairly reasonable performance in the circumstances. The Blues made a whirlwind opening and at one stage—when four points clear—seemed all set to win another tilt at Mount Sion's championship laurels.

The Comeragh men found it exceptionally difficult to penetrate the defensive barrier of Cunningham, Hallahan and company, while the ground football of the tricky Old Borough half forwards often had a rearguard, which displayed unsuspected shortcomings in dire trouble. This was the pattern for most of the opening half.

Fortunately for Kilrossanty, Maty Lonergan was in tremendous form on the fringe of the square. While defensive colleagues were often "coddled" by the first-time methods of the opposition, the big inter-county man remained monarch of all he surveyed. No man made a bigger contribution to the victory effort.

But great and all as Lonergan's performance was while the bossers called the tune, it was the switch of Mick Prendergast towards the close of the opening half that really perturbed the losers' resurgence.

All at sea in the foreign surroundings of a forward post—their eyesight dimmed by the rain—Lonergan and Pendergast were unable to detect the immediate influence on the trend of the exchanges. The latter the latter proceeded to gain and maintain the upper hand.

Specialist Services Order

The Minister for Health has made an order entitled the Specialist Services (Charges) Order, 1957. The effect of the order, which comes into operation on 23rd October, is to fix the charges which will be made for outpatient specialist services provided for persons who are not in the group entitled to medical care. The charges have been fixed at 7/6 for an X-ray examination and 2/6 for other specialist services. The charge for X-ray examination will cover a complete X-ray investigation in a particular occasion, even when it involves the use of a series of films, and if a person receiving services other than X-ray examination has to be seen by a number of specialists on the one day only one charge of 2/6 will be made.

Where the specialist services are provided in institutions maintained by the health authority the charges will normally be collected in cash from those required to pay them at the time the specialist services are received. An alternative arrangement is contemplated for the collection of charges for specialist services provided on behalf of health authorities by voluntary institutions. Under this arrangement the patient, when applying for the service, would submit an invoice for the amount of the charge to the form of application.

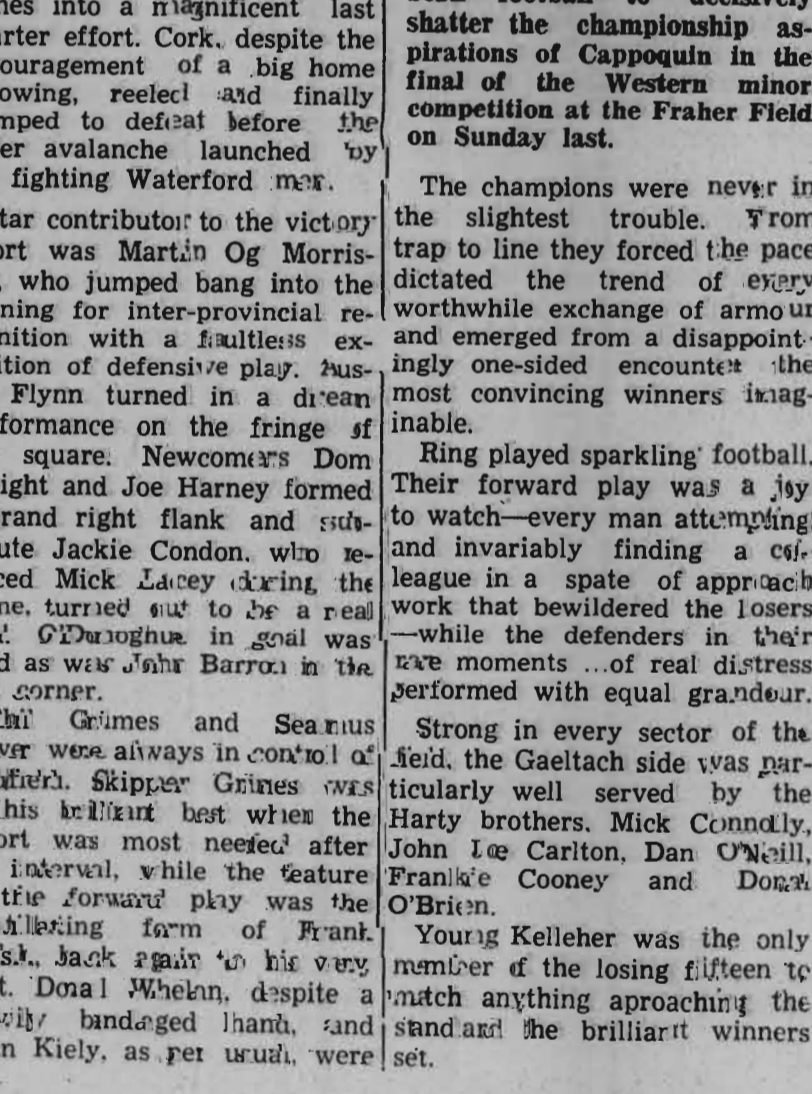
