CAINING A CHARA DILLISH

Thursday, 21st November saw the passing from this life of him, who, for the past two decades was the best regular contributor to this paper, Mr. Thomas (Todd) Flynn, P.C., and as a journalist he will best be remembered.

The grief felt at Todd's demise is experienced not merely by the neighbours of his natal parish but by people of all classes near and far. Those, too, and they are many, who knew and loved him in life, need no words to remind them of his beautiful and lovable personality. Many a mourner is saying for the past few days: "I have lost my best friend."

A fair for words, an exuberant command of them, a judgment comprehensively balanced, all these were his. He could wield the pen with a style and finish as unique as it was pleasing. One could feel the pressure and ardour of his mind as if he were arguing with one personally. Todd had a fine commonsense which made his counsel readily given whenever sought, invaluable. The wish to help others who needed his help seemed ever dominant in his mind. His wonderful unselfishness and humility never permitted him to see that he was in any way beyond the ordinary but all who are privileged to have known him can testify that he was a friend such as is very rarely met. The wisdom of his advice could always be relied on, but, it was his intense heart and personal sympathy, combined with his manifest aversion to aught of the egotistic ilk, which gave him such widespread influence. He was first in appreciation of other people's work.

Todd's colleagues prized the unifying forces that gave a zeal for progress—and his friends admired the steadiness of his resource. For least-prized work—the work for common ends. With his heart-broken widow sympathy in full measure is general.

Friends and Admirers, near and far, unite in saluting universally esteemed Mr. Sean Ormond, T.D., on his distinguished well-merited appointment to the Ministry of Posts and Telegraphs—made midway the present week. He is a gentleman, unfailingly courteous and kindly, a genuine sportsman and gay companion.

Most Rev. Dr. Daniel Cahalan Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, will preside at the Solemn High Mass marking the opening of the newly-built beautiful Church of the Sacred Heart, Rathgormack—a ceremony set for to-morrow, Sunday, 8th Inst. (Feast of the Immaculate Conception).

Late Mrs. Catherine Power, Carrigahilla, Stradbally—Waterford City hospital this well and popularly known neighbour answered the Great Call at an advanced age. Widow of Mr. William Power, Carrigahilla, who pre-deceased her some years ago, she was a familiar personality in the "Cove Village" district, being one of a family long associated with the agricultural, social and sporting life of the locality. She was mother of Mrs. J. Wall, Graigue, Stradbally; Mrs. J. Daye, Watford, Herts, England; Mrs. T. Buckley, Cork; Mrs. W. Gleeson, Thurles; Mrs. P. Mooney, Scotland; Mrs. C. Hennigan, Surrey, England; Mrs. Drummey, Dungarvan; Mrs. J. Power, (sic); and Mr. P. Power, do., and she was grandmother of Mrs. P. Tobin, Ballygarry, Kilmacthomas, and of the late Mr. John Cleary, who was killed in his 28th year when involved in a traffic accident at Southampton, England, on August 27th last.

Mrs. Power's remains were brought to the Parish Church, Stradbally, where a Wednesday morning of last week, Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. T. Draper, C.C. (sic), assisted by a large congregation of relatives and friends of the deceased. Burial took place afterwards in the adjoining cemetery. Fr. Draper again officiated at the graveside.—R.I.P.

Late Mr. Thomas Dea, Cutteen, Kilrossanty—This lovable character peacefully and resignedly yielded up his soul to his Creator following an indisposition of seven weeks duration

and while still in his late sixties. Kind and gentle and witty, to meet him was a privilege; to know him was an education; to lose him was a poignant parting. He lived in England for a long period. A staunch supporter of the native games and pastimes, he always harboured deep down in his true Irish heart a great grudge for Kilrossanty's every team of his time. Surviving him are his brothers, Messrs. Michael and David Dea of Cutteen, and his nephews, Messrs. Michael Dea, N.T. (Principal), Castle-dockerel National Schools, near Ennisceorthy, Co. Wexford, and Edmond (Med) Moroney, farmer, Currahaha West, Kilmacthomas, with whom, and the other relatives, sincere sympathy is widespread.

From Dungarvan District Hospital, where he died, his mortal remains were conveyed to St. Bridgid's Parish Church, Kilrossanty, and rested overnight therein. Subsequent to the celebration of Requiem Masses on Saturday morning of last week, interment was made in the family burial ground in the cemetery adjoining. The absolution at the graveside was given by Very Rev. J. McCarthy, P.P., Kilrossanty, assisted by Rev. P. Beecher, C.C. (do.), in the presence of a gathering that was representative of every family for miles around.—R.I.P.

Late Miss Catherine Power, Seaview Terrace, Bonmahon.—Following a comparatively short illness and at a moderately advanced age, above-named much esteemed lady succumbed at her residence and news of the sad event was received with feelings of deep regret throughout these parts. Sprung from an old and highly respected local family stock, she was well-known to visitors to Bonmahon from inland and Cross-Channel centres, and her demise is not alone a great loss to her nearest and dearest but to the community at large, whose respect and appreciation she earned over the years.

A cortege of imposing dimensions and very representative accompanied the removal of the remains last week-end to St. Anne's Church, Ballylnean, where on arrival, the coffin was received and blessed by the Rev. M. J. Russell, C.C. (do.), who also recited the prayers for the dead. Immediately after the 11 o'clock Mass on Sunday the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery amidst every manifestation of profound sorrow. Fr. Russell officiated at the graveside. BALLYDUFF FIRE

An outbreak of fire occurred at the farm of Mr. William Coleman, Ballinroon, Ballyduff, on Tuesday, Nov. 25th. A hay-barn, 80 tons of hay and a cow-house was completely destroyed. Fermoys Fire Brigade were first on the scene but on their arrival the fire had got a firm hold and all they could do was prevent it from spreading. WATERFORD CYCLING BOARD

Sports Meetings a "Dead Loss"

AT the annual convention of the Waterford Co. Board N.A.C.A. held at the Granville Hotel, Waterford, Rev. D. Slattery, C.C., Aglish (outgoing President) stated that other counties in Munster have surpassed Waterford in events. He appealed to members "Do not let us always be the Cinderella county."

He went on to say that the season under review was about the slacker experienced during the past twenty years. Recalling the deplorable fact that no county championships were held in 1957, he said this was the worst offence any county board could commit.

The outgoing officers did not seek re-election despite earnest pleas by delegates that they should remain in office for at least another term and the City members were re-named in their place.

In the course of his Presidential address, Rev. Fr. Slattery reminded delegates that the Co. Board was an important body and that they were the only people in the county who could talk with authority on athletic affairs. They sometimes forgot that, during the past twelve months they had forgotten their responsibility and had not carried out their duties as they should have carried them out.

Continuing, Fr. Slattery congratulated the clubs in the county, he said, were doing their best to keep athletics alive. He realised they were up against it. Generally speaking, sports meetings were a "dead loss," which was due mainly to the fact they did not get the full support of the public. They also had to contend with the weather, which, but they must keep on fighting the good cause. With "new blood" at the helm, they should do a lot better.

Mr. E. Stapleton, A.F.A., (outgoing hon. secretary) in the course of his report, stated that they found a great percentage of the public were very vague regarding the aims of N.A.C.A. The public also seemed to be unaware of—or had forgotten—the special circumstances that brought the Association originally into existence. Everybody craved for unity, but until that happy day when unity was once more honourably achieved they must keep on trying to overcome the many difficulties that were caused by the present rift in our athletic structure.

ATTENTION TO PHYSICAL TRAINING

It is a pity, said Mr. Stapleton, that physical training does not get the attention in the curriculum in our primary schools. Under British rule it was an essential subject in the national programme, but under the present programme it is merely an optional subject, and in the majority of our educational establishments it is ignored completely.

At the close of his report, Mr. Stapleton stated: "1957 has been a year of mixed fortunes for athletics in Waterford. Every club in East Waterford and the City has had successful sports meetings, in some cases two fixtures being promoted. I regret to say that the West has been almost blank. The very successful inter-primary school sports, run by Aglish A.C. and a few novice meetings run under the auspices of Ballyduff and Knockanore, were the bright spots in this part of the county."

He went on: "The number of clubs remained unchanged. I think the city clubs deserve a special word of praise for the energy they put into the organisation of athletic events during An Tostal period. Dunhill A.C. has also lost none of its fine old athletic stamina and tradition as was proved by their fine win in the County senior cross-country championship. Weather conditions were not too kind where some of the sports fixtures were concerned and adversely affected attendances."

Continuing, he said it was extremely unfortunate that the county championship events could not be held this year owing to circumstances of which the clubs were already aware. The Rev. Chairman had explained last year at the annual convention, the difficulties that had arisen in regard to the holding of the championships.

**BOARD OF FISHERY  
CONSERVATORS**

At the monthly meeting of the Lismore No. 4 Board of Fishery Conservators held at the Grand Hotel, Fermoy under the Chairmanship of Mr. R. G. Annesley, there attended Messrs. Major Maxwell, Major Partridge, Captain Clayton, Captain Benson, Messrs E. P. Lynch, S. Jameson, J. Healy, M. Greedy, D. Holroyd, Smyth, Inspector Woolfe and Joseph Power, Clerk.

The Inspector reported that since last meeting he performed the usual protection patrols on spawning rivers in the district. Since late in October he operated the Mobile Squad both night and day and was pleased to report that night poaching seemed to be very much on the wane. Heretofore more lights were seen in one night than were seen in the present close season. However, they came on one concentrated poaching drive on the afternoon of Sunday Nov. 3rd when he saw 21 men armed with gaffs and spears chasing salmon on the upper reaches of a small river in the Ballymore area. The surrounding hills were dotted with scouts, and so well were they organised that they succeeded in capturing only one man, and failed to find any evidence of salmon being killed. On the morning of October 29th they captured a man using a gaff at the Kanturk weir. Another man who accompanied him succeeded in making his escape. The year seem to be about average, but spawning took place at least two weeks earlier than usual.

The Clerk presented Power of Attorney granted by Captain T.O. Jameson of Ardara to his son, Mr. Shane Jameson of Turin, in which was found to be in order. The Chairman on behalf of the other members extended a hearty welcome to the new Conservator Mr. Jack Lyons of 26 Merchant Street, Cork applied for an appointment as distributor of rod licences for the Lismore District in Cork City. Same was granted as from the coming season and the Clerk was directed to arrange for the taking out of the necessary fidelity bond. The Marksman at Youghal Mr. Dominic Walsh reported that he killed four seals in the Ardara district on October 30th, Nov. 5th, 9th, and 12th. Read acknowledgements from the Department of Fisheries in regard to the decision of the Board to increase the Clerk's salary by 47% and the award for the destruction of cormorants from 2/6 to 5/- per head.
